NEWS FROM THE CHIEF

Chief Leo Chaloux

Here it is December. Not only is most of the month over but also so is the year. Same ole question, where did the time go? Seems like not too long ago the whole world was doomed with the

coming of Y2K, but then we all made it through in spite of ourselves.

SNOW

Now that we are dealing with the cold, rain and snow the thought of a wild land fire is quite removed. Yet in just about five months we could find ourselves gearing up for it and hoping once again to get through a summer without a disastrous fire. Now is the time to be preparing our selves, our houses and our land for that fire. Winter is the best opportunity we have for eliminating unnecessary ground fuels. If you have any questions or need information on how to best alleviate some of the serious vegetation fuel problems we have in this community please come to the presentation at the fire station on January 5 at 6:00 p.m.

Just the other night we had a rather surprising but adequate snowstorm come through the area. Kind of caught a lot of people by surprise by dropping in a very short amount of time some significant snow, especially at the east end of the District. When the snow was coming down at its heaviest I drove the District with my son, just kind of seeing how much there was out there and to check out how the new Explorer worked in the snow. During the process we were able to help several people who were not able to get home by giving them rides and a few others we were able to help push their vehicles. The pushing was done by hand as my son being a typical young stronger than smarter teenage boy loved doing that. Me, getting out in the snow and pushing a vehicle by hand is just not as much fun as it was about 35 years ago. Guess that is what they call, "maturity." Anyway, the Explorer worked great in the snow. These new hitech things they call automatic four wheel drive and ABS brakes are rather nice and are very able at getting in and out of a slippery situation.

DRIVEWAYS

One thing I would like to concentrate on this winter is driveways. Seems that many of the driveways in the community are getting rather narrow. Most of us do not notice, as they are always adequate for the vehicle we drive the most. Unfortunately, fire engines and ambulances are

somewhat larger than the average personal vehicle. What we need as fire fighters and EMTs who have to operate the necessary equipment to put out a fire or provide medical care is a driveway that will provide us with the proper width and height clearances. Here is where we need your help for the driveway to your house should be at least 15 feet wide and have a 15 feet high clearance. Now, that does not mean your driveway should have 15 feet of gravel on it. Ten feet of gravel would be great, and 2 ½ feet of clearance from brush on both sides would be terrific. As far as the clearance goes, any limbs that extend over the driveway less than 15 feet high should be removed. A light bar on a fire engine these days costs about \$2,000 and it really embarrasses a fire fighter when he tears one off on a tree limb. One way of looking at your driveway is to ask yourself if you could or would drive a \$150,000 motor home down it and how possible is it to get it back out. If you wouldn't because it might damage it realize that a new fire engine now costs all of us about \$150,000 and an ambulance is around \$110,000. More important than light bars, fire engines or ambulances is the time lost not being able to get to a house because of an inadequate driveway. We will do everything possible to get to you. If it means running hose the entire length of your driveway we will do it. If it means cutting down tree limbs with chainsaws we will do that. If it means walking in carrying all necessary medical equipment and then carrying you out on a stretcher we will do that. Also, realize that all those actions are a function of time and time can be critical.

If you have doubts about your driveway please come down to the station and we will give you a ride in the new engine to see if we can quickly and safely access your driveway. Or just give a call to the station (626-9017) and we will come up and take a look at it.

Hope all have a good Christmas and a better than last New Year. Be careful for winter is definitely here.

FIRE DANGER ON THE MOUNTAIN: YOU ARE NEEDED.

The past fire season was among the driest on record. Forest fire professionals observed that 1000 hour time-lag fuels (big logs to most of us) were at the lowest moisture levels ever recorded. All around us, huge fires raged, some of them of unprecedented size (examples are the Rodeo-Chediskie Fire, Arizona, 450,000 acres, 24,000 people evacuated

and the Biscuit Fire, Oregon and California, 500,000 acres; 20,000 people evacuated.) Count your blessings, neighbors. Somehow, we in the Mosquito Fire Protection District (MFPD) had no serious wildland fires in 2002; we dodged the bullet, and we should all be most thankful that our 186-or-so days without rain did not include dry lightning storms or significant winds. If they had, our community would likely be in ashes now.

Fire Chief Leo Chaloux wrote three articles for the *Byte* this year, warning of his deep concern about the dangerous amounts of forest fuel in the Mosquito-Swansboro communities. He spoke of his frustration at *knowing* he cannot protect most of the homes in the MFPD during average-worse fire weather, due to heavy fuel loading. And he asked for community involvement to abate the accumulated fuel hazard. Several citizens of the community noted and agreed with the Chief's concern, especially Battalion Chief Devery Minor and Fire-Safe Council Representative Walter Graves, along with several members of the pilots' Club and other community members, including this writer. Under the leadership of Chief Minor and Mr. Graves, the Mosquito Fire Safe Council has formed itself, with the explicit recognition of Chief Chaloux, and in affiliation with the El Dorado County Fire Safe Council.

So what?

So we now have the opportunity to get up to \$200,000 in Federal Grant Funds (through the Eldorado National Forest) for the purpose of solving our own fuels problem.

What's the catch?

We have to deliver credible, doable (in 18 months,) effective, and cost-efficient projects that reduce fuels in a strategic manner so that firefighting forces have a chance to save our homes and forests even when all of the worse elements favoring wildfire converge (yes, including dry lightning and very high winds with very low humidity.)

Why bother? We've done fine so far!

It depends on one's confidence in bullet-dodging; and considering what each year does to increase the odds against us, confidence would be, simply, foolish. Everyone acknowledges that the danger in playing Russian Roulette with a six-shooter is not the odds (which favor a live chamber only 1 in 6 times), but from the *consequences* of that 1 in 6. But how many of us who live in this forested community stop to remember that the natural fire cycle (the time it takes to build up ground fuels that promote rapid fire spread) in this part of California is between 3 and 25

years, and that the last major fire through here was the Chili Bar Fire of 1979, or 23 years ago. Are you with me here, Copernicus? Haven't we already taken at least one statistical first click on that six-shooter? We dodged the bullet this year. How many more do we want to take?

Three things are needed for any fire to burn: fuel, oxygen, and heat. Take away any one of them and the fire will go out. We cannot control oxygen supply or disperse heat except in a limited way by savvy, technical, and expensive firefighting. But we can control the fuels. They are on our property, and there are safe, effective ways to keep them within Fire Safe limits while maintaining the beauty and health of the forest.

Since we can do something about the fuels, then our destiny with regard to destructive wildfire is literally in our own hands, isn't it? If there isn't enough available fuel on and near the ground to propagate wildfire, then even very bad fire weather need not defeat us, especially with the quality of firefighting forces that we can call upon. I can't help but think that most of us here would like to see our homes and our forests remain about like they are. That's why we ought to seize this opportunity to help ourselves.

Where can I learn more?

There will be a special meeting of the Mosquito Fire Protection District on Sunday, January 5, 2003 at 6:00 PM at the fire Station, to discuss the fuels problem, and the solutions being proposed in the Draft Grant Application.

HELPFUL HINT

Remember how our dishwashers used to get before we had the pipeline across the river as a result of the minerals in the water? Well it was brown.

To clean our mineral infested dishwashers as a result of low quality water of the early 1990's here is an environmentally safe solution: 4 of G.G. Bean's Dishwasher Kleen Tablets through a wash cycle. These are available through G.G.Bean, Brunswick, Maine 04011 at <http://www.ggbean.com/index.asp> for \$7.19 for 20 tablets. If you order 3 or more 20 tablet packages the price reduces to \$6.61. SAVE the COST of a new DISHWASHER!!!

Cook over medium-low heat 20 minutes or until lightly browned, stirring occasionally. Remove to small bowl.

4. Stir spaghetti into boiling water, and cook 11-12 minutes stirring occasionally, until soft or al dente as you want.

5. While pasta cooks, add pepper strips to skillet and saute over medium-high heat until crisp tender (2-3 minutes). Stir in broth, chard and carrots. Cook 6-8 minutes until stem pieces are tender and leaves are wilted. Stir in onion.

6. Drain pasta, return to pot. Add vegetables broth, pepper and all but 2 T of crisp bacon pieces. Toss to coat and mix. Be sure all ingredients are well mixed into spaghetti.

Pour into serving bowl. Crumble reserved bacon on top.

How many of you read *Women's Day* magazine? Well, I have found many a good recipe in it. This one, even though it has bacon and chicken broth in it, can be easily changed to suit vegetarian tastes by omitting the bacon and substituting vegetable broth for the chicken broth.

This recipe makes A LOT, as I found out. It can be easily cut in half.

Serve with freshly shredded Parmesan. Yummy.

SPAGHETTI WITH VEGETABLES AND BACON

- 5 -6 slices bacon
- 2 Spanish onions, about 12 oz each or 1 medium to large red onion. Cut in half length-wise then slice thinly cross-wise.
- 1 lb uncooked spaghetti
- 1 yellow bell pepper cut in narrow strips
- 2 c chicken broth (canned or granules)
- 1 lb Swiss chard, stems cut into 1" pieces, leaves coarsely chopped
- 2 medium carrots, shredded or coarsely chopped
- 1 t freshly ground pepper
- salt to taste

1. Cook bacon until crisp and brown. Drain on paper towel. Reserve 1 tbs drippings in skillet.
2. Bring a large pot of salted water to a rapid boil.
3. Meanwhile, add sliced onion to fat in skillet.

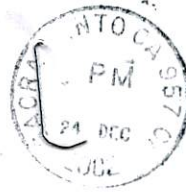
