FIRE DEPARTMENT UPDATES Chief Leo Chaloux

I thought I would take this opportunity to give a report of the many things that have been taking place in the community and with the fire department.

First off the Fire Department was awarded a federal grant for \$154,000 to develop a fuel reduction plan for the Mosquito Community along with the physical removal of fuels within the plan area. The fuel reduction plan will be professionally developed with the primary goal being that of reducing the fire threat to the community. Since this is a federal grant the desire will be to reduce fuels on property adjacent to Federal lands. As I see it the areas of Swansboro along White Oak Point, Log Cabin Lane, Wildflower Court and Deer Canyon

Court have the highest threat to them due to Slab Creek Reservoir and Slab Creek. Any fire coming out of those areas would produce an immediate threat to many homes so if I get my way that is where the fuel reduction would first start. However, I do not know as much about fuel levels, fire potential and threats as some of these professional plan writers so we will go with the plan being developed. No matter where the plan states we should start first we will need the cooperation and support of everyone in the planned area. The key to this whole fuel reduction will be the buy in of everyone within the community, as all of us will be affected by it.

One thing to be aware of is a fuel reduction plan and carrying it out does not mean all trees will be removed. The majority of us live up here because it is a beautiful area and the many trees we have are a main reason for that beauty. The plan will be diverse with an emphasis on the removal of brush and ground fuels. We will be having a meeting at the fire station on Saturday, July 19th at 10 in the morning to discuss what this fuel reduction program will do for our area. We would like you to attend as we need your input and support and we would also like an opportunity to provide you with more information and be able to answer any questions or concerns you may have. It is extremely important that as a community we all participate in this process so we are planning on having additional meetings on the third Saturday of each month at 10:00 a.m. so that all of us can be informed and participate in this process. This grant provides us with a great opportunity to decrease the fire threat in our community and could be just the beginning of a comprehensive plan with action for many years to come.

I have to thank Len Newell, Walter Graves and Lynda Lima who have put in many hours of work along with their expertise, for they have made it possible for us to receive this grant.

During the last week in May many homeowners in Mosquito took advantage of a free chipping program offered by the El Dorado County Fire Safe Council. In fact the council made this program available to

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Pollock Pines, Camino, Rescue, and other areas. In total over 200 people used this service of which over 40 were those from Mosquito. The demand and support in this community was so great that the Fire Safe Council is planning on having the chipper come back out to do more work. I have been told this will probably happen in July, so as soon as I find out I will get the word out or if you are interested give me a call and I will put your name on the list.

The Mosquito Fire Safe Council with the help of the Swansboro Pilots Association is doing great work. They will be helping with doing the inspections on homes in the area. The California Division of Forestry and Fire Protection is no longer doing home inspections even though they are required to do so. Seems they do not have the time or money. So with the help of the fire safe council we will be doing it. This inspection process will be one of invitation only. If you want us to inspect your property for fire clearances and offer any advice to make your home more fire safe we will be glad to do so. If you do not want us on your property we can respect that also. Part of the reason for doing this besides meeting state laws for the 30 feet of clearance around a home is to gather information that will increase our capability to protect your home in the event of a wild land fire. For example the information we need is the length and width of driveways, turn arounds at the end of driveways, amount of brush around a home, propane tank locations, electrical service panels, and distance the home is from the nearest fire hydrant or water supply. This information will be maintained at the fire station in a computer database and will be utilized when we are dispatched to a residential fire. It just provides us with a little more information so we can be more prepared to fight a fire. If you have any questions regarding this program please call, if you do not want your home to be inspected or if you would like to help just call the fire station.

The Board of Directors of the Fire Protection District just completed and had approved by the El Dorado County Board of Supervisors the Districts Development Improvement Plan. This is a plan the District has to have as it collects money whenever a new home is built so capital equipment can be purchased. Since the fire district purchased a new fire engine last June it was determined that we have enough fire engines for our size and population but not enough water supplies. So the plan calls for the installation of additional fire hydrants in the EID areas of the District, the construction of a water pumping station at Finnon Lake, and money to be set aside for the purchase of a new water tender to bring more water to the areas in the District that do not have any water supplies at all. This plan is a long term one so the above improvements will take some time. However, with the help of EID we should be installing at least 3 new fire hydrants almost immediately and then 3 more later on in the year. The other two items will take time and as growth in the area continues to increase so will the money to carry these out.

One last thing, the Board of Directors just approved the preliminary Budget for the fiscal year starting July 2003 through June 2004. As long as the State of California leaves us alone we will be doing quite well. If they start getting into our pockets as they did in the early 9s things could get difficult. Biggest problem is not knowing what they are going to do, makes it real difficult to do any long term budgetary planning. Right now the biggest problem we are facing is the rapid increase in workers compensation insurance. Two years ago we paid \$12,000 for workers comp, this last fiscal year it increased to \$22,000 and our estimate for this fiscal year is over \$36,000. At this rate our entire budget will be going to an insurance company.

All in all things are quite well, at the least we are making it one day at a time. Fire season is here and if you have looked around you can see how dry the grass and brush are. It is going to get drier and more dangerous so please be careful with outdoor activities. And if you need us give a call.

Rice Krispies Treats Flags

3 T margarine or butter

1 pkg (10oz, about 40) marshmallows or 4 cups miniature marshmallows

6 cups Rice Krispies cereal

Blue and red frosting and star shaped candy sprinkles

1. In a large microwave safe bowl, melt margarine and marshmallows on HIGH for two minutes stirring after 1 minute. Stir mixture until smooth.

U.S. FOREST SERVICE GRANT

Saturday, May 31, 2003 was a happy one for the residents of Mosquito who had applied for a grant from the Community Protection Program of the United States Forest Service, to manage forest fuels adjacent to the Forest and the Community. Eldorado Forest Fire Chief Scott Vail and District Ranger Tim Dabney of the Georgetown Ranger District presented a check for \$154,825 to Devery Minor, Battalion Chief of the Mosquito Volunteer Fire Department. The funds will be used to develop a strategic plan and a management plan, and will provide the means to put the plans into action on the ground over the next 18 months to reduce dangerous fuel levels.

In the days before the Sierra Nevada area was

settled by descendants of Europeans, fire was a frequent occurrence in the forests. Caused by lightning strikes or deliberate burning by American Indians, these fires kept fuels volumes relatively low, and fire size and intensity were correspondingly low during this era. After settlement, however, all fires were suppressed with the result that fuels accumulated steadily. Today, under the worst weather conditions (low humidity, high winds and temperatures,) fires can get very large and burn very hot. The three factors that most determine fire behavior are fuels, weather, and topography. Communities wanting to protect themselves from fire cannot do anything about weather or topography, so fuels management is the key to success.

On May 31, U.S. Forest Service representatives brought an array of maps that show fire history, fuels loading in relation to homes and other structures. and printed information on managing fuels around buildings. One map showed that in much of the Swansboro Subdivision of Mosquito, there is no record of a fire over 5 acres occurring in the last 100 vears. (Mosquito Fire Chief Leo Chaloux reports that there was one fire of 40 acres in that subdivision during the 1990s.) This explains the high volumes of accumulated fuels so prevalent in the community, and underscores the wisdom of making the grant investment here. "The Mosquito Community and its Volunteer Fire Department have shown great initiative and foresight in applying for this grant, and are prepared to use it to help themselves to a more fire-safe future" Chief Vail said in making the presentation.

Walter Graves, Chairman of the Mosquito Fire Safe Council, after thanking the U.S. Forest Service, observed that, with the awarding of the grant "Now the real work begins. We've got to produce results on the ground, and we're eager to get at it." The community will work closely with the Eldorado National Forest to ensure that their work is complementary and mutually reinforcing. Ranger Dabney stated "We are happy to have this partnership in fuels management with the Mosquito Community, and look forward to a safer fire situation in both the Forest and the Community.

Regarding: School in Your Area

As you are aware, the Placerville Union School District was considering building a school in your area. In 1997, under the State guidelines at that time, the District was eligible for full funding for a necessary small school. A site for the school that was acceptable to the School District and the community could not be agreed upon. The District decided not to continue to pursue a school at that time.

In 2001 when I was hired as Superintendent, the Board of Trustees asked me to reinvestigate the feasibility of a school in the Mosquito area. Since 1997, the State has changed the funding guidelines and the District is only eligible for 50% funding from the State. After almost two years of pursuing other funding options, I have now determined that there is no way to receive full funding for a Mosquito school.

At this time, the Placerville Union School District is discontinuing the plans for a school in your area.

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Check Your Pets

We recently became property owners in Mosquito . While hikiing through the abundant grasses that the late rains produced I noted several types of seeding weeds commonly known as "foxtails" . These foxtails can enter any area in or on your pets . The most common area for cats is under the lower or 3rd eyelid . In dogs, it's their ear, nose, armpit and between their toes . These stickers go in one direction so once they enter an area they can travel deeper and may become a serious health problem.

Prevent exposure by cutting weeds before they seed and check your pet on a regular basis . Signs to look for are eye swollen shut, shaking head or head tilt, sneezing (especially if blood produced) and swelling between toes or on skin.
