THE KID ON THE ROCK

Well we went from one of the hottest Julys to one of the wettest Augusts. Funny how that works as we were teaching an EMT class during that time. On one Saturday we were outside using the jaws to take a car a part and it must have been 110 degrees. We were all dying inside that protective equipment we have to wear. On the very next Saturday when it was time to take the final test and be inside – it was raining. Just cannot win.

At the least the EMT class is over and everyone passed. We now have a fire department that has a roster consisting of all EMTs. I want to thank Jerry Okumura who put in many hours teaching this class and also all those who took it. They gave up two evenings a week and several Saturdays for four months just to take this class.

A couple of Saturdays ago we were dispatched, along with El Dorado County Fire Protection District, to assist the Sheriff with a rescue on the river. My son, who is now a volunteer fire fighter, and I responded along with Chris Johns and George Kellison to the south side of the river where we met up with someone who stated their son was trapped on a ledge down by the river. From what he was telling me his son was all right but was not able to get down from a ledge and he was only about 15 feet above the waters edge. Since it was around 6:00 in the evening I thought that I, Nathaniel and Chris Johns along with the father could go upstream and get the kid off. George remained on the road to provide communications and the fire fighters from County Fire decided to walk the canyon edge to see if they could find the kid. Now, I may not be the smartest guy on the hill but I do know that I'll choose going up the river over climbing through the poison oak, black berries and brush on the canyon wall. I would much rather get wet than all tore up.

About $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile up the river we found the kid. Sure enough he was stuck on a ledge but instead of being 15 feet up he was more like 25. He was on a ledge that was above an area in the river that is about 12 to 15 feet deep. So being the red necks we are we were trying to get him to simply jump in the river. I mean to me it was a rather simple solution. However, this kid had his back to the wall and refused to move to the left or to the right and he sure was not going to jump in. So now the rescue is on. The canyon wall above the kid was too steep for us to get him from above so a decision was made to call out the Sheriff's high angle rope rescue team. Now, the sun is going down and the canyon is getting darker so since Nathaniel is young and dumb I sent him back up the canyon wall to the Command Unit to get flashlights. Up the canyon he went and back he came in about 30 minutes with the kid still stuck on the ledge not willing to jump in the river.

Now, here we are on the river waiting for the Sheriff to get some people with ropes down the canyon. After about two hours here they came with one guy on the end of a 160-foot rope. Once he made it to the kid he had to tie him into a harness and then he and the kid were lowered down to the river. So after about five hours of waiting for this kid to get wet he ended up in the water any way. Once we got him out of the water and onto our

side of the river it was now a journey downstream. That canyon down there is one that demands a great deal of respect and to be walking out of it in the dark is kind of scary. The last thing I wanted was someone ending up with a broken ankle. The father and the kid were dressed only in shorts and sneakers so we had to be aware of the black berries and poison oak. But then as we were walking out of there I was almost tempted to look for poison oak to go through just as a means of pay back.

All in all around midnight we managed to get out of there and with no one getting hurt it was quite successful. If the kid had just jumped in the water though it would have still been successful but not near as long.

Be careful out there. We are still not through the fire season; in fact the worse part of the year is coming up. Seems that September is the traditional month that has the largest and most destructive fires for El Dorado County. Lets hope we make it through till we get at least a couple inches of rain.

MOSQUITO FIRE SAFE COUNCIL

The MFSC, or Council, held its first meeting of 2003 on January 5. That meeting's objectives were to (1) firm up the Council organization, including election of officers, and (2) review the draft application for the Federal Community Protection Grant. The grant application draft was further developed and reviewed, in consultation with Eldorado National Forest officials, and in Officer meetings held in February and March. Leo submitted the final application on time in

April, and we were given informal, unofficial word that we would receive a grant of between \$200,000 and \$150,000. On May 31, after the annual Fire Department Breakfast, Chief Scott



Vail of the Eldorado National Forest presented Chief Leo Chaloux with a facsimile check for \$154,825, signaling that the official word was on the way.

This was enough to make the Council call a series of open meetings to discuss specifics for contracts to obtain (1) a Strategic Fire Safe Plan, and (2) an

Implementation Plan. These meeting were held on June 1, June 27, and July 19, and were variously attended by Council and interested community members. Participants and leaders expressed strong support for beginning the actual work of reducing forest fuels and performing other actions on the ground before the next fire season begins. We all know somewhere in our minds that Mosquito has been very lucky about wildfire so far, and now we want to depend more on our own actions than on luck. So from the timing perspective we agreed that we should be doing the planned work on-the-ground by the middle of next April.

This meant that Strategic Planning would have to be done by early November, so that there would be December-March to have the more detailed Implementation Planning done. Council members and others contributed ideas for both contracts, and the Request for Proposals for the Strategic Plan (which will tell us the most important areas that are to be worked first, among other things,) and the advertisement and Prospectus went out on July 22. On August 9, all prospective bidders were invited to a personal showing of the District by Leo and Council members. Two companies were represented at this showing, and several others have expressed interest. As of this issue, we are awaiting the bid deadline date of September 9. If we get three valid bids, we will make the award by September 12. The successful bidder will call a community meeting in October.

Thanks to every one who attended the meetings, contributed ideas and time, and have responded to the need for better fire safety in our community.

We may have gotten through another fire season without having a wildfire over a few acres in size. There are probably still several-to-many critical weeks ahead before we see enough rain to push the Fire Danger Rating to Low, so let's all remember to stay careful with fire, outdoors and in.

GOAT CENTRAL

In the Wildland/Urban interface, there are many challenges to providing and maintaining fuel load reduction to protect the urban environment.

Many techniques and tools are available to the reduction of fire fuels. Mechanical thinning, hand work, mastication, burning and grazing. Each has its own set of positive and negative aspects.

Goat Central uses goats for vegetation management. Browsing is an underutilized tool that

can be effectively used for management where mechanical means are impractical and at times where burning could be dangerous or chemicals not desirable.

Goats, properly managed, can reduce a heavily brushed area, making it easier for other tools to be utilized. Grazing brush reduces the vegetation, so that clearing is more easily accomplished. It reduces the amount of work required in human labor, makes access easier for mechanical needs. And goats work endlessly, without complaint. They can browse areas too steep for safe mechanical work. They are virtually silent. No significant noise is created. No fossil fuels are used and no noxious exhaust is created.

The work is flexible. Goats will eat all day and night, taking short rests. Their browsing behavior dictates coverage of a large area. Aggressive behavior in foraging and reaching up for vegetation that is located high creates a browse line to approximately 6 feet.

Mobbing behavior will break smaller branches. Poison oak is consumed, and if growing into trees, can be brought down with the mobbing behavior. Grasses can be reduced, with grazing and trampling, after seeds have set, minimizing reduction to the seed bed.

Small, smooth barked trees can be damaged by goats. Protection of such vegetation must be established in such a manner that it can withstand the effects of the goat behavior. Wrapping with tarps, or PVC pipe split in two on the long side, and reattached around a young tree can be effective in keeping goats away from it.

Because the work is "slow" in comparison to bulldozing, masticating, human thinning, the potential for soil erosion is minimized. Unwanted vegetation trunks can be left in the ground. By not removing a short trunk, the roots remain, holding the soil around it. The small stumps and roots can be left to decay. With minimized under story, more sun light and air movement is available, and dormant seeds can germinate.

Ground compaction can occur along the trails the goats use. Care must be taken to minimize ground compaction in these areas. Goat camps are the congregation area of the mob. They will visit a particular place several times a day. This can develop a significant level of erosion and manure buildup. Management techniques can be employed to minimize these problems. Goats manure is dry, and pelleted. It does not attract flies. The digestive system is highly effective, from mastication to digestion. The manure breaks down easily in rains.

Creating a defensible space can be easily

accomplished. However, maintaining that space can be difficult and time consuming.

Goat Central goats are medium in size. We use Kiko goats. Developed in New Zealand, they are aggressive foragers, have a high feed conversion and are a very hardy breed.

Goat Central clients have enjoyed the use of our goats on their land. After the goats have moved through a project area, the land owner can "see" the area that is now open, and make appropriate short and long term plans as it relates to the desired outcome. The outcome is most often for the protection against fire.

Predation management is accomplished with guardian dogs. Containment is accomplished with electric fencing and portable chargers.

Again, it can not be stressed enough that using goats in vegetation management requires diligent, adequate management to be effective. Much thought and planning must go into a project. Timing can be a critical factor in what goats will eat. Age of the goat and physiological condition also plays a role in how the goats will work. The number of goats required for the treatment will have the most influence in determining cost. A mature goat can eat approximately 10% of their body weight of dry matter per day. This will impact how many goats, based upon the amount of vegetation, how large an area to secure, and how quickly the vegetation will be reduced.

A very important component to working goats is understanding the behavior and working with it. Goats can be very effective when used instead of or in addition to other management techniques. Using goats is not without challenges.

SCPOA UPDATE

Our maintenance person had to resign suddenly so we are currently in search of a replacement, this has unfortunately left several projects unfinished. John Skaggs will be filling in on as a temporary replacement until we can have the formal hiring process. The bathrooms have been trashed yet again and that will be one of John's first projects along with completing the fencing that was started along Rock Creek Road. The well pump went out at Dyer Lake so there has been no water available, a new one has been purchased and will be installed as soon as possible. We will be looking into security doors for the bathrooms at Dyer Lake so that we can lock them at night to try to prevent the constant damage, if this doesn't work we may be forced to consider closing them except for special events.

Our new secretary has been working hard to collect the unpaid dues for this year, we are still short \$12,000 but this should be made up with continued collections and interest on accounts.

We have probably all seen the news reports of the insurance crisis that is occurring in California and anyone who has been looking for insurance is very aware that many companies will not write policies here. Unfortunately this is now affecting us, our prior company is no longer insuring property associations and finding a new one has been very difficult. We have been looking since April and were turned down by all but one which is three times as expensive as our last one was. We cannot go without insurance so we will have to pay \$38,000 this year, just over \$25,000 more than we have in the budget. We will be borrowing this money from the future road budget to pay the immediate bill and sending out a special assessment of \$36.00 per lot to repay this loan. We are not happy about this assessment but see no way around it, we

cannot go without insurance.

The board has agreed to accept the water meter from EID for Dyer Lake at no charge and they have agreed to provide the water at the gravity flow rate instead of the pumped rate. We will still be paying more for water than we have in the past but instead of the estimated 1500% increase it is a 250% increase, our only alternative was to not get any water. We will also have pretty much agreed to take over the Dogwood well from EID which we should be able to use to offset some of the increased cost.

There will be three positions that need to be filled on the board this year and we need volunteers to do it. It is not always very easy but it gives you the opportunity to help out your community.

YOUR PET QUESTIONS

I didn't get as many questions as I thought for this month, but I now have a post office box available for those who don't email.

Q: My dog's teeth look dirty, but I can't brush off the stuff. Will it hurt to leave it on?

A: Teeth that are not brushed regularly form a crust of saliva, food debris and calcium salts on the teeth (tartar). As this tartar builds up, bacteria develops between this shelf of tartar and the gums. If it gets bad enough, the bacteria can enter the blood stream and seed the liver, kidneys and heart causing disease. Dry kibble helps slow down the build-up of tartar as the rough texture scrapes the teeth at each meal. Pressed food bones and firm toys for chewing also help. Real bones may help keep the tartar away but will wear down or even break the tips of the teeth. If your dog has visible tartar on the teeth that continues to build-up, I recommend having his teeth ultrasonically cleaned. After the procedure it will be easier to maintain clean teeth.

Q: We have a cat that keeps getting a sore in the same place. It will heal up for about a week, then break open again. It smells really bad.

A: It is hard to know for sure without getting further information or seeing your cat, but it sounds like an abscess. Typically when cats get into a fight, they will get a puncture wound from a tooth or claw. The skin will heal leaving bacteria to develop under the skin. After a few days you will see a swelling which may burst. If it does, the cat will feel better and the area may appear to heal. Unfortunately, the healing of the skin again traps bacteria and the swelling reappears.

To heal, this lesion needs to be drained, cleaned and antibiotics given to your cat. You'll need to take your cat to your veterinarian. Also, while there have them test for FELV and FIV as they affect the immune system and may complicate the healing process.

Q: We wonder if you have a practice up here. Would like to establish a relationship with a vet up here.

A: I recently acquired property in Mosquito. It will be at least a year before I will have any type of practice available up here.
