CDF LIFTS BURN SUSPENSION

The Amador-El Dorado Unit of the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection (CDF) has lifted the burn suspension that has been in place since June 7th of this year. The suspension will allow burning during fire season with a **valid burn permit as long as the Air Pollution Control District opens burning for the day.** You will need to have a burn permit that you can pick up for free from your local fire station. You must call the Air Pollution Control District immediately before burning to make sure it is a burn day and your burn piles may *not* be any larger than four foot square. Burn permits will be required until the official end of fire season which typically ends in mid-November.

Please keep in mind the following proper burning techniques:

- ✓ Call the burn information number 530-621-5897 to make sure it is a permissible burn day, because the Air Pollution Control District still controls whether or not you can burn
- ✓ Never leave the fire unattended.
- \checkmark Make sure you have proper clearance cut to mineral soil around the pile(s)
- ✓ Make sure you have a shovel and hose on sight so that you can put out any fire(s) that may escape
- $\sqrt{}$ Do not burn on windy days, the wind can carry fire brands and set fires away from your original pile(s)
- ✓ Be considerate of your neighbors and where the smoke from your burn piles may drift
- ✓ Be aware of your surroundings, watch for spot fires and in case of an emergency, *call 911*.

EARLY CHANGE OF SEASON

Looks as though we were able to get through another summer without a large wild land fire. Seems as though we went from having a real warm Indian summer right into a wet winter and in between there were a few days of heavy smoke from the Fred's Fire in the Kyburz area. The phone rang constantly on the first day of that fire, everyone calling the station wanting to know if there was a fire in our District. I even had some individuals come to the station and ask when they should evacuate. Those that did ask about evacuation kind of disappointed me, they did not even know that signs about evacuation have been up all around the District. Fortunately, this was all a result of a fire taking place about 20 miles away.

One thing I have learned living up here on this hill for 30 years is that if you have not heard a rumor by noon, make one up. Well the latest rumor going around is that of a new bridge being built across the canyon. As far as I know that is just not true. In fact unless there is someone out there with about \$25 million in mystery money it is never going to happen. I do know the county has just barely enough money to patch about three potholes on Mosquito Road somewhere between the National Forest and US 50. We are lucky they inspect the Swinging Bridge once a year. Of course they have to do that in order to keep Cal-Trans off their back. One thing we can be grateful for, and we can brag about it to everyone who lives in El Dorado Hills, is that not only do we live in a gated community but we live in a two gated community.

Another funny thing I have noticed on Mosquito Road are the posters everywhere stating "lost dog" and right below them are posters saying, "found dog." Don't know why but that is just funny to me.

One of the volunteer fire fighters recently asked me why we do not have as many chimney fires as we used to back in the old days. Well, now I would venture to guess that about 80% of the houses up here are heated with propane and wood is just not the fuel of choice anymore. I told the fire fighter to be patient that as the propane furnaces get older there is a good chance they will become problems and cause a fire or two. Also with propane estimated to be about 22% higher this winter than last, wood stoves may become desirable again. If you are using or planning to use a wood stove now is a good time to get the chimney cleaned and inspected. I strongly suggest that it be done a professional chimney sweep. Not only do they do the cleaning but also they know what problems to look for and can recommend the best way to get them fixed.

Be aware of the first few rains of the season. The roads can be real slippery until the oils on the road

from the summer are washed off. One thing to do is make sure you have winter tires on your vehicle but the best thing is to slow down. It never fails to baffle my mind that when we show up on a car accident on Mosquito Road and there is snow on the road the first thing someone usually says is, "I don't understand, it is four wheel drive."

The other day I was driving around the District when I noticed someone in a pick up truck stopped on the side of the road. Hanging in the back of his truck was a hunting rifle. He was looking at five bucks, three small ones and two rather good size ones, standing about twenty feet off the edge of the road. The bucks just looked at us and didn't even bother to move away. Course just to the right of them nailed on a tree was an old sign that said, "Game Reserve." Fortunately for the bucks the guy in the pick up truck could read so he just drove off.

Enjoy the change of the season and be careful.

Our community escaped once again this fire season from a major fire, while we were reminded numerous times about how closely our homes and lives are bound up with this fire environment in which we live. The smoke that blanketed us for three days just before the rains certainly provided a realistic reminder of it.

Evacuation Route brushing work has been slower than expected due to red flag days, other demands for tree crews, and now rain. Work will continue until completed. Our funds will be exhausted when Segments 1-3 are finished.

Thanksgiving is coming up, and in order to avoid a conflict with the Thanksgiving Day Weekend the MFSC Meeting will be held November 20, from 2-4 PM at the Fire House. Among other things we will be discussing our draft grant proposal for 2005. An Agenda will be

SCPOA REPORT

Our normal October meeting had to be canceled at the last minute due to the lack of quorum. We did have a number of community members show up so we ended up having a community discussion. Concerns were discussed regarding the need for communication during an emergency such as a fire. The fire safe counsel is looking at several alternatives for this including the possibility of a radio broadcast. Another problem was brought up regarding barking dogs. This seems to be an increasing problem as more people move into the area. It is often difficult to track down the exact location of the dog in order to inform the owner of the problem. Anyone who owns a dog is encouraged to be courteous to your neighbors and keep them confined and indoors at night if they have a tendency to bark.

We were able to have a quorum present the following weekend so we could have a meeting to conduct some business that could not be postponed until November.

The most important issue was the need to borrow some money from our reserves in order to cover our excessive legal expenses. We are over our current budget for legal expenses by \$20,000 and needed to borrow this from our reserves to pay the bills through the end of the year. A motion was made to do this and it was passed. We will be repaying the money back to the reserve account in the next year.

We were scheduled to have work done on our roads and runway at the end of October but due to the sudden onset of winter this may end up being delayed. If the temperatures do not stay warm enough, the work cannot be done properly, so we will have to wait and see what the weather does. The pilots group has volunteered to provide both the labor and supplies to repaint the runway after it is resurfaced. This will save several thousand dollars.

Another issue that has come to our attention is related to the lack of culverts across driveways. Several places have been identified as having the potential to damage the road due to water drainage being blocked by a driveway without a culvert. Letters will be written to the individual homeowners advising them of the need to install a culvert or they will be responsible for any damage done to the road.

The water rights have been partially cleared up

regarding the Dogwood well but there are still a few questions that need to be answered. There was some discussion of the issue which will need to be continued when we get further information.

A resolution which will allow the temporary use of storage containers on properties during construction was approved and signed. This will allow the homeowner to move in a storage container to keep equipment in while the house is being built. It will have to be removed when construction is finished.

We are still in need of members willing to run for the board next year. We will have four vacancies that need to be filled.

SWEET AND SPICY NUTS

1⁄₃ cup sugar

2 teaspoons ground cinnamon

1/2 teaspoon ground allspice

1/2 teaspoon Seasoned Salt

1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg

1/4 teaspoon black pepper

1 egg white

3 cups mixed nuts -- cashews. almonds, pecans, walnuts -- any mixture you want

1. Preheat oven to 250 degrees. Combine first 6 ingredients in a medium bowl: set aside 2. Beat egg whites until foamy. Add nuts to egg white; toss to coat well. Add spice mixture; toss to coat evenly. 3. Spread nuts on a large greased baking sheet in a single layer. Bake 1 hour, stirring twice. Cool slightly, break apart, if necessary. Cool completely. Store in airtight container up to 2 weeks Makes ;18 servings (3 Tbs. each)
