OUR BELOVED MOSQUITO ROAD

One question that keeps popping up is why are there not more accidents on Mosquito Road? The only response I can come up with and it is not a very intelligent one is, "beats me." Seems with all the cars going up and down the road and the way some people are driving we should be pulling out of the station at least once a day to deal with a vehicle accident. But fortunately that is not the case; in fact we haven't been dispatched for a car accident on Mosquito in several months.

One thing we can almost always count on is the first rainy day of the season. Usually that is when the roads are the most slippery and we kind of hang around the station just waiting for that dispatch to come along. This fall at the first rain we did not have one accident. Now there were signs of them all over the place, like skid marks going over the edge, brush bent over around some curves, mud kicked up and the occasional bark knocked off a tree. But fortunately again there was not one vehicle into another one that needed a 911 response.

Usually we get a few dispatches around three in the morning and lately we haven't even had one of those. What normally happens with those clowns is they manage to make it down the road from Placerville, across the swinging bridge after whacking the side of it a couple of times and then the great part of it is as they come up the first real sharp switchback they just kind of keep on turning their steering wheels until they simply turn all the way off the road ending up on their roofs down below. Even though I will hear the same car being described over and over and I know who it is I will not tell that to anyone. NEXT FIRE SAFE COUNCIL MEETING IS JANUARY 23

We were tempted to rest on our laurels in December, but kept on with needed Council work in preparation for 2005. Len attended a workshop for grant writing on the 8th, and Len, Leo, and Mary Joseph assembled before-and-after pictures, and wrote text, for a "Success Story" that is being forwarded to the state Fire Safe Council. It shows how Mosquito's top priority Evacuation Routes looked last September, and how they look now. We expect this bit of bragging to help us compete for another grant in 2005, in a much more competitive grant environment than we experienced in 2003.

The next applications for grants are due on February 4. Do you have concerns and ideas for improvement? This will be your chance to get them reflected in work plans proposed for grant funding. Review of our draft Grant Application will be the top order of business at our January 23 meeting, from 2-4 PM at the Fire Station. Are there some things you want to learn about making your own home more fire safe? We'll also discuss workshops to be planned to help you become more confident. Bring your most vexing questions, because those are the ones that hold everyone back. Many individual properties need reduction of fuels to promote owner and public safety.

Until January 23, Happy Holidays from the Mosquito Fire Safe Council.

SCPOA REPORT

We want to thank everyone who was able to attend our December meeting and give us their input on such important matters as the Dogwood well and the budget.

Our maintenance person Johnathan was able to attend and give us an update on all the work he has

been doing. He has been burning some of the piles of brush that have accumulated from all the cleanup that has been done, road patching continues as conditions allow and fence replacement will continue, about half of the fencing bought has been installed. Johnathan felt that a roller could be a valuable tool to have for compacting the road patch, he suggested that he would be able to make one to fit on the tractor for around \$300.00. This is significantly less then anything we might be able to purchase, he will fabricate a roller that fits with the box scraper and uses the down pressure to compact the fill. A question was brought up about the light in the pavilion being left on and should it be put on a timer. The bulb is currently burned out and after some discussion it was decided to replace the bulb with a fluorescent one and leave it on during the night for security. This will hopefully deter some of the vandalism that occurs, we will try this and reevaluate in the future.

Our secretary Lynda has our delinquent accounts down to three, there are properties that will be up for tax sale and we should be able to collect past dues owed on them after the sales. Lynda has worked very hard to get everyone caught up and to get the right paperwork done to get money owed after sales, and we want to thank her.

The budget committee has had to work overtime to try and get a reasonable budget for us in light of some of our rapidly rising costs. Tee and her committee had several proposals that ranged from a 15% increase to a 22% increase. Our biggest problems are our legal and insurance expenses, they exceeded our budget by \$36,000 this year and we can expect an increase for next year plus we have to pay back the money borrowed from reserves to cover this years costs. The association cannot run with a deficit, this would be irresponsible and only cause more problems in the future. At a 22% increase we would be just over breaking even but anything over 20% require a vote of the membership which also costs money. By reducing funding to a few areas that we don't anticipate needing as much the budget committee was able to put together a balanced budget with a 20% increase. There was a fair amount of discussion amongst the board members and from the floor but in the end we all had to agree that anything less then a 20% increase would be irresponsible. This will put next years dues at \$526 or an \$88 per parcel increase, we know that this seems very high to many who have lived here for a long time but it is still reasonable compared to most other associations.

The architectural committee has completed a review of two more sets of house plans and has another to review. The building boom seems to be continuing in our community.

We will have four openings on the board for next year, and at the meeting still only had three people willing to run. With a bit of begging and pleading the

committee was able to get five names on the ballet and a couple of probable candidates for the following year.

The website has had a few problems with the change in providers due to a buyout of the original company. The committee did some research and found several alternatives one would be less expensive and keep it local so it was voted to change providers. The site should be updated and running again.

The Dogwood well issue has been an ongoing discussion for quite some time, many issues have come up which needed clarification, legal questions had to be resolved but we finally had all the information to make a decision. Our biggest concern became the issue with liability, we have had enough costs due to insurance and felt we could not assume an unknown risk with the ditch. EID could not provide us with any assurances about liability should the ditch fail and cause flooding so the well and ditch offer were turned down.

The annual packet is due to go out this month and all items to be included were reviewed, the budget will be presented in an easier to read format that will include pie charts. The minimum amount will be sent out since most people don't seem to want the details and to save on costs, anyone who wishes more detailed information can request it.

We hope everyone has very safe and happy holidays and hope to see you at our first meeting next year on January 10th at 10:00am at the Fire Station.

YOUR PET QUESTIONS

Q: How do I know if my pet is in pain?

A: We know what pain feels like. I was trying to make some burn piles and while using my weight to pull some brush into place it gave way and I fell, resulting in a broken arm. I babied that arm, wrapping it in my tee shirt, placing a magazine around it then sling before heading down the hill to have it set. I could tell the doctors exactly where it hurt and what not to touch. I wanted all the help and sympathy I could get. Animals are different. They try to hide their pain, if possible. With obvious injuries such as lacerations, fractures or swellings, assume your pet is in pain even if not "acting" painful. Your pet may act grumpy (aggressive) or withdraw from you or others. He/she may refuse food or eat very little. Other injuries may not be as obvious such as joint pain, disk disease or internal pain. Look for panting while at rest, shaking or reluctance to move. Any behavior that is strange or different for your pet is a sign to make an appointment for an exam with your vet.
