IT'S THE LAW!

Even though we are still very much into the winter season now is the perfect time to be thinking about cleaning up around our houses and getting ready for the summer and the as usual threat of a wild land fire

As you know a great deal of work has been done on the major evacuation routes at the east end of the District. Those roads, Lupin Lane, Log Cabin Lane and Stope Drive are the main routes to take in the event of a large fire. Evacuation signs have been placed on those roads pointing traffic to the Swansboro Runway where people can be safely sheltered for a few hours.

Now that the roads have been done we need to start working on our own properties. It seems that I am always harping on people to cut the brush around their homes and often I am asked why. Not only is it the prudent thing to do when you live in an area that has a high risk for a wild land fire but it is also a state law. I thought I would take this opportunity to publish this law so that all of us know what the State expects. The following comes from the California State Public Resources Code Section 4291.

Any person that owns, leases, controls, operates, or maintains any building or structure in, upon, or adjoining any mountainous area of forest-covered lands, brush-covered lands, or grass-covered lands, or any land which is covered with flammable material, shall at all times do all of the following:

Maintain around and adjacent to such building or structure a firebreak made by removing and clearing

away, for a distance of not less than 30 feet (this was revised by state law to 100 feet that went into effect on January 1, 2005) on each side thereof or to the property line, whichever is nearer, all flammable vegetation or other combustible growth. This subdivision does not apply to single specimens of trees, ornamental shrubbery, or similar plants, which are used as ground cover, if they do not form a means of rapidly transmitting, fire from the native growth to any building or structure. Maintain around and adjacent to any such building or structure additional fire protection or firebreak made by removing all brush, flammable vegetation, or combustible growth which is located from 30 feet to 100 feet from such building or structure or to the property line, whichever is nearer, as may be required by the director if he finds that, because of extra hazardous conditions, a firebreak of only 30 feet around such building or structure is not sufficient to provide reasonable fire safety. Grass and other vegetation located more than 30 feet from such building or structure and less that 18 inches in height above the ground may be maintained where necessary to stabilize the soil and prevent erosion.

Remove that portion of any tree, which extends within 10 feet of the outlet of any chimney or stovepipe. Maintain any tree adjacent to or overhanging any building free of dead or dying wood. Maintain the roof an any structure free of leaves, needles, or other dead vegetative growth.

Provide and maintain at all times a screen over the outlet of every chimney or stovepipe that is attached to any fireplace, stove, or other device that burns any solid or liquid fuel. The screen shall be constructed of nonflammable material with an opening of not more that one-half inch in size.

Except as provided in Section 18930 of the Health and Safety Code, the director may adopt regulations exempting structures with exteriors constructed entirely of nonflammable materials, or conditioned upon the contents and composition of same, he may vary the requirements respecting the removing or clearing away of flammable vegetation or other combustible growth with respect to the area surrounding said structures.

No such exemption or variance shall apply unless and until the occupant thereof, or if there be no occupant, then the owner thereof, files with the department, in such form as the director shall prescribe, a written consent to the inspection of the whether the provisions hereof and the regulations adopted hereunder are complied with at all times.

There you go, the nuts and bolts along with the legalize on why we have to clear around our structures. Any violation of 4291 is seen as an infraction by the courts and results in a fine, the law specifies what the fine is and under what conditions. Since this is a State law it is the states responsibility to enforce it and that has been given to the California Division of Forestry and Fire Protection. Every year usually in the spring the CDF&FP is supposed to go out and inspect every structure on every parcel in every State Responsibility Area. I have just recently talked to a CDF Prevention Officer who said every attempt is going to be made this year to inspect as many homes as possible not only in the Mosquito area but also on the entire Georgetown Divide.

I consider 4291 to be a good law as it establishes a basis for common sense, that being if you live in this kind of area you should make your house as safe as possible. If you follow the requirements of 4291 then it does not have any impact on you as you are exercising good judgment. If you do not, then 4291 can be considered a pain in the wallet. If you do not adhere to the requirements then you can be found guilty of an infraction and fined, then you still have to clean up your property.

Take the next couple of months, cut some brush, trim some trees and enjoy living in the country. In the meantime it is still winter and the roads can get you, be careful.

FIRE SAFE COUNCIL POISED FOR ACTION

Fuels reduction work on our remaining priority evacuation routes is awaiting word from the U.S. Forest Service about our grant Concept Paper, submitted on Feb. 7 (four days early.) We should know some time in March if our concept has been accepted and we are invited to apply for a grant. This is a new step this year. I feel confident that we have among the soundest of all Concepts that the State Fire Safe Council has gotten, because we had a good head start and excellent results in our planning, and we showed great results (6 miles, 62 acres done last year) from our first grant. However, the appropriation for all of California is only \$2.2 million, and Mosquito is a small place compared to many others. My prediction is that we will be invited to submit a grant proposal, and that it will be funded at less than half of what we need to finish our routes. Half a brush-field managed to prescription is better than none, so we are proceeding to prepare for contract operations. And who knows? We may get most or all of it. One thing we know: we never get more than we apply for.

Another letter to landowners will be coming out, requesting a renewal of the permission granted last year to work either 50 ft. from the road edge (on Dogwood Lane only,) or 25 ft. on the other, non-through roads. Landowners who did not sign up last year are urged to consider the benefits and sign up when the package arrives. As a professional forester (retired) who invested many years in managing forest fuels on large and small projects, I feel better about our chances of surviving a major fire this year than last. We still have a long way to go. Please stay tuned to the Council's work, and pitch in with some recorded and reported hours of work on your own property, and in concert with neighbors. It is this "matching" of grant funds that helps to make our funding proposals stronger.

One noticeable side-effect of removing the brush was the discovery of so many discarded auto parts, appliances and other trash hidden beneath it. I notice that some conscientious residents have been cleaning up this accumulated trash, and these

people are to be commended for it.

Another, probably unrelated development is the discarding of new trash along most of our roads, notably the creek sides of Mosquito Road above Trout Lake, and along Lupin and Stope. I've even had a pile of fast food wrappers etc. left at the base of our mailbox. At the age of five years, I was helping my father clean up trash left by careless campers in the places where we went to fish. I have continued to do this necessary work for some 60 years. As manager of recreation on a large National Forest District for several years I supervised and enforced sanitation, order, and occupancy standards on contractors and visitors. Things have changed, folks. The volume of refuse today is about an order of magnitude (10 times) what it was even 25 years ago. It will take more active volunteers now to keep our community looking like we are proud to live here. We can't let the few true fools spoil it for the rest of us. If we don't clean up, it will make others think "so what? Everyone else does it." Then it will grow worse by the month. There will be no grants for cleaning up such a mess, so let's not let it happen. I have begun to use an hour on Thursday mornings to patrol a stretch of Lupin, from Stope to where Lupin again turns northwest (about 0.4 mile, Segment A4 in the Implementation Plan.) The stuff collected goes in with my trash for pickup, I get some exercise and it feels good to look at a clean neighborhood.

Finally, please take the blue flagging off of your trees if your lot has been treated already. I may be mistaken, but it seems that where there is lots of blue plastic showing there is lots of trash thrown. Plastic somehow attracts refuse? I think so.

SCPOA REPORT

February 12th was our annual meeting of the membership which includes the election of new

directors. We had a pretty good turnout.

The meeting was called to order and a quorum was confirmed, the inspectors of the election introduced and we want to thank Sharon Hern. Dick Rood and Pat Matheny for filling this role. We also want to thank Iris Saxon and Debbie Rood for assisting the inspectors and helping to make the election run smoothly. We had four vacancies on the board this year with five members running, two of which were current board members. There were no further nominations from the floor. Your new board members are John Cory and Jim Irving with Tee Stierwalt and Kim Purcell continuing.

Thanks to Rob Kirkpatrick for setting up a projector and screen and to both Rob and Tee Stierwalt for putting together a three part pie chart presentation of the budget for the next year. This visual presentation made it much easier to understand. The charts made it very clear that our legal and insurance costs are a significant portion of

our operating expenses. The architectural committee approved 30 sets of

plans over the last year. One set was denied since it was a mobile home. Two more are pending. This is an increase over last year when around 20 plans

were approved.

The budget and long range planning committee worked very hard last year to come up with the budget we have. It is not easy to try to fit in the large cost increases we have had to deal with in legal and insurance. This group will have another very challenging year ahead and anyone who is interested in participating is encouraged to join them.

The Bylaws and DC & R committee had about 10 complaints to deal with. This seems to be about

average.

The common areas are looking great thanks to Jonathan. He works very hard to keep things looking so good all year long. He has done a great job with the fencing and we will be placing another order soon since he has already installed what was purchased last year. We will be getting sand for the beaches early in the spring once some of the rain has let up so they will be ready for use once the warm weather arrives. We would like to remind everyone that our common areas belong to all of us. Treat them as if they were your own yard and help to insure that others do the same.

The nominating committee will be looking for members willing to run for the board next year. There will be three vacancies. It is never too early to start thinking about helping out our community by serving on the board. It is a challenging but rewarding experience.

The road committee will need to start holding meetings soon. They will have to look at the work that needs to be done this year and combine it with what was delayed from last year. This is another committee that is very important and anyone interested is strongly encouraged to join. There is a lot of work to do in planning how to best keep our roads in shape.

The runway projects are on hold for now due to weather and a tree problem. Recently a letter was sent out to everyone informing them of the imminent suspension of our airport permit due to trees. Many home owners have put a significant amount of effort and expense into removing trees and brush from the object free area along the side of the runway. All but one homeowner has complied with the requirement to do this. SCPOA has taken legal action against this home owner and will continue to vigorously pursue it in hopes of resolving this situation so that we do not lose this valuable asset to our community.

The SCPOA website is up and running and is being updated. Please take a look at it at scpoa.net. We will be looking at a new Internet provider since the old company was sold and we will be able to get the same or better service for less cost. Several companies were suggested and a decision will be

made at the next meeting.

Our next meeting will be held March 12th at 10:00 AM at the Fire Station. We will be forming the various committees and looking for volunteers to serve on them so please plan to attend and volunteer

QUICK RECIPE

This Byte I am happy to have a one dish meal that is stove-top and quick. Prepare all ingredients first. We really enjoyed this and it was requested that I fix it again, soon. This alone makes it a hit .So here it is. Cook, eat, and enjoy.

Dutch Kielbasa

3 ats water

1 cup uncooked egg noodles

1 cup shredded cabbage (about ½ inch wide shreds)

1 cup frozen chopped broccoli (optional)

½ cup chopped carrot

1 cup cubed fully cooked Kielbasa OR Polish sausage

½ cup shredded cheddar cheese

1/4 cup mayonnaise

4 - ½ tsp butter

In a Dutch oven, bring water to a boil. Add the egg noodles, cabbage, broccoli, sausage and carrot. Return to a boil. Cook, uncovered, for 8-10 minutes or until noodles and veggies are tender; drain. put into serving bowl. Stir in the cheese mayonnaise and butter.

You can vary the vegetables to use whatever you have on hand. 2-3 servings

I increased the amounts of noodles, vegetable and sausage by about half and had more than enough for 3. I also decreased the butter (margarine) to 2 tsp.

I hope you will try this and find that you enjoyed it, as did we.


