## Chief's Corner

Seems hard to believe that 2005 has come and gone, but it has. From the Fire District's stand point the past year has been a rather quiet one. We have been very fortunate for this has not been much of a structure fire or wild land fire season. Despite all the predictions being made last spring about how bad the summer would be in the county, it turned out to be one of the slowest we have had in a long time.

The only serious wild land fire we had was one that took place on Rock Creek Road. That one was a real strange one. We were dispatched to check out a reported vehicle over the edge somewhere on Rock Creek Road between Rock Creek Bridge and Highway 193. It was kind of a vague dispatch with the reporting party being an airplane that had seen a vehicle off the road somewhere down in the canyon. Seems our dispatcher did not know whether to dispatch Mosquito Fire or Garden Valley Fire to this one so we finally ended up be the ones going down there.

Curtis and I took off in the engine and headed to Highway 193. On the way down we didn't see anything so we turned around at the White Rock Power House and as I drove back toward the station, Curtis stuck his head out of the window looking over the edge. He had just made a comment about how he felt like a Golden Retriever with its head stuck out the window when I noticed this large truck coming just a little too fast around the curve at Windy Point. Windy Point is that "narrow" place on Rock Creek Road that makes a real sharp turn, where the guardrail has been installed. Well anyway, this truck is coming way too fast around the corner and he's dragging this trailer behind that has some kind of a materials handler on it, something like a real big and ugly fork lift. I was sure glad I was going slow otherwise this truck would have been right in the face of a brand new fire engine. This guy saw us and cut the curve real tight dragging his trailer up onto the steep edge of the curve. I thought for a while that he

was going to flip the trailer and I would be dealing with this big ugly forklift running down the road right towards me. Fortunately, that did not happen but you should have seen the dust and dried grass flying all over the place. The truck passed on by with the driver avoiding looking at me as much as possible.

As Curtis and I came to the curve, I saw a small fire at the very edge of the road. Seems the axles on the trailer had hit a rock and sparked off a fire in the thick grass. I was stunned; as long as I have been doing this fire stuff this was the first time I had ever seen the actual start of a fire. I looked at Curtis and told him we had a fire and he kind of gave me this "yeah right" look. But when he saw me go to the radio microphone he knew I was rather serious.

Now, most of the time we are dispatched to a wild land fire with some basic information, like where it is and what it might be doing, etc. As we are responding we can look in the general direction of the address and see some smoke, its size, color and direction. This kind of gives me an opportunity while driving to the address to start developing some kind of a tactical plan and determine how many resources are needed and what other threats the fire may impose. However, in this case seeing the fire start right in front of me kind of threw me off especially when I saw this thing grow from the size of a dinner plate to about 10 feet in diameter before I could even get the engine stopped.

Then, suddenly a second problem faced me. I called dispatch and told them we were at scene of a newly started wild land fire. They asked for the address and there are just not a lot of addresses on Rock Creek Road. You see, our "highly technologically advanced" dispatch center computer has to have an address or a nearest cross street to come up with a dispatch protocol and Rock Creek Road is short on both of those. Finally I told the dispatcher the fire was 1 mile east of White Rock Power House, at Windy Point, at the south end of Shoo Fly Ridge, ¾ of a mile west of Nelson Canyon, where the big red fire engine was. They just could not get it going. While I was dealing

with dispatch trying to get them to start sending fire equipment towards us Curtis was out pulling a hose line to go after the fire.

Issue 3 - This just happened to be one of the days when Mosquito Road was closed because the county was working on the swinging bridge. In no time at all we had cars all over the place, along with a fire going up the canyon edge. Dispatch was still having a hard time trying to figure out where we were, because I just could not give them a stinking address. I ended up telling them to send me a few fire engines west on Rock Creek Road from Highway 193 and sooner or later they would run into us and if that didn't work they could look for the smoke. Back in the ole' days when there were no high tech computers I could call a dispatcher and tell him I was at Windy Point and he would know exactly where to send equipment. Not anymore, if it is not in the computer it just doesn't exist. That fire only did a couple of acres, I got frustrated with dispatch and wanted to choke out a computer and poor Curtis ended doing all the fire fighting by himself. So all in all it was a very slow fire season.

Now, on to next year. If time permits there are a few goals that we intend to set and hopefully we will be able to pull them off. One is the on going work with the fuel reduction program. I will be applying for another grant to keep the project going and with luck all the priority and secondary evacuation roads in the District will be completed. Next is an emphasis placed on homeowners in the District placing proper addressing numbers at the head of their driveways and on their houses. Remember if we cannot give dispatch an address they do not know how to get us there. Another goal is driveway clearances so that we can get our fire engines to your house as quickly and safely as possible. The new state requirement for clearances of 100 feet around all structures goes into affect January 1, 2006. I will publish the law in the February Byte along with additional information.

I hope everyone had a good Christmas and I pray that as a community we all have a healthy, prosperous and safe new year.

**SCPOA Report**

By now most of you should have received your annual packet and discovered the good news, the board voted not to increase the dues this year. This was actually voted on at the rescheduled November meeting, thanks to all who attended that meeting to give their input. We had several suggestions from no increase to another 20% increase which had all proceeds from the increase going to our roads but in the end it was decided to wait for a comprehensive review of the road paving plan to have a better idea of how much will be needed. As far as this year goes the only area we will probably overrun our budget in, is the legal expenses. We are currently at what was budgeted but still have two more months to go.

Our secretary Lynda has done another great job in collecting dues, having only one that has been sent to collections at this time. There was a discussion about changing collection companies. A proposed contract from the new company was provided for review and a decision will be made at the January meeting.

The Architectural committee has been busy, after a brief slow down, 6 more plans were approved last month and 4 more are pending.

A request was made to put up a new fence at Catfish lake to help delineate the common area from private property. With all of the new building going on, it would help both the neighbors who live along the lake as well as visitors. A decision was made to have Johnathan place logs along the property line rather than a fence.

The road committee has been very busy surveying and measuring the roads throughout the community. They are working on a paving plan for next year and starting to develop a comprehensive long term plan. Roads are the greatest expense we have and anyone who would like to participate in the process should attend one of the monthly meetings held at the fire station on the 3rd Saturday of the month at 9:00 AM.

The annual packet has a few differences this year and that is due to some changes made by the state legislature. Previously, everyone could send in a proxy, now you have a ballot. The ballot must be

placed in an envelope which is to be signed then placed in a second envelope. Please be sure to follow the directions and don't forget to sign the inner envelope.

Our Fire Chief Leo Chaloux gave an update on the Fire Safe Council's brush clearing plan. It is still on hold, we hope that the areas of concern will get resolved soon so the clearing can be done prior to our next fire season.
