Chief's Corner

Now that we are somewhat into a new year, I have had an opportunity to calculate the number and types of Incidents the fire department responded to last year. Fortunately it was not a very busy year; in fact we are having less incidents to deal with now than we did five years ago. That part I do not understand for we have more homes, more traffic and more people. And what a fire department does is normally a function of what people do, so to have an increase in population and a decrease in the number of incidents is very unusual. At this point I see no logical reason for it, except to call it an anomaly and soon things will turn around and we will be off and running. Lets hope not. I guess I could explain the down turn in the number of incidents are a result of my prevention program but then that would not be true, again it all boils down to what people do and what they don't do.

The largest number of incidents we went on last year was in the category of public assist. These are incidents where someone calls the fire station and has a need that is not an emergency, such as a cat in a tree. Yep, we still do get cats out of trees even though I have never seen a cat skeleton in a tree. Other public assist categories are like, "my kid is locked in the bathroom," or "I haven't heard from Grandma in awhile could you check her out?" Other public assist calls are where we have to inspect driveways, new construction clearances and setbacks. We have been doing a lot of that in the last year due to all the new homes being constructed.

The second largest number of incidents we respond to are medical aids. Last year we answered requests for medical aid 34 times, not very many for a community that has over 1500 people. Statistically, nationwide a fire department normally has about 1% of the population needing medical services. So we are quite far from that figure. I am sure that will also turn around and we will be responding to more requests. I hope it doesn't increase for I really do not like doing medical calls; I don't like seeing people feeling ill or having something traumatic happen to them.

The third category and again a surprising one to me are vehicle accidents. Last year there were only 14 accidents throughout our District. At least that is the number that was reported to 911. I am sure there were a lot more, just drive down Mosquito Road every other day and you would see a new scar on a tree or brake marks and a little glass on the road and then the brush mowed down off the edge of the road. Seems we get many fender benders and off the road type accidents that just do not get reported. With the way people drive on some of our roads we should be pulling out of the station at least once a day to dig someone out of a vehicle.

Illegal campfires were the forth category we went on and last year we put out 8 of them. These types of calls are always scary. They have such potential to go from nothing more than a fire where someone is cooking their hotdogs to one of 10,000 acres with many homes and lives being threatened. It seems that I can go down to Rock Creek at the bridge and put out a campfire at least every Saturday evening. There are so many people down there being idiots with their campfires that it is simply a matter of time when a large fire will come out of Rock Creek canvon and burn up an awful lot of land. We also get a few fires down at the swinging bridge at the South Fork, because of traffic across the bridge they usually get turned in quickly. And on occasion we go out into the National Forest to put out a campfire that someone just walks away from.

Smoke checks and illegal control burns also had us moving out 8 times. These are usually someone burning their brush piles around their house on days that are no burn days due to air quality control. I don't bust anyone for those types of calls unless they are being real stupid or giving me an attitude. I really want people to burn up their brush and get rid of it, but unfortunately with air quality control being a more powerful agency than the fire department they dictate when someone can burn.

Some of the other calls we got were: Finding a fiveyear-old boy who was walking down Rock Creek Road looking for his girl friend. I had an idea who he was but he keep giving me a phony name, and telling me he did not have a father but he sure did have a girl friend and he wanted to go see her. After a few minutes I managed to get the truth out of him and I took him home. His father wasn't too pleased and told his son to stay away from "girls." Another was a chimney fire. It was not a big deal as the chimney pipe did its job but I sure do hate going to them. You never know how good the chimney pipe installation was, how many fires they have had in the past and the worse thing is a failure in the pipe. That kind of a failure results in an attic fire and that will jeopardize the entire house and everything in it. We also had 2 calls for power lines down. They are not fun at all, all kinds of nasty things can happen with power lines down such as a vegetation fire, structure fire, or someone being extremely hurt. Fortunately, these calls were in the wintertime and no big deal came out of them.

Well so much for the last year. I am hoping this year will also be a slow and quiet one. However, I know that sooner or later the number of incidents will increase and we will be off and running.

As I am writing this it is really snowing quite well. We are still dealing with winter, so please be careful.

The engineering design team meet with DOT staff on February 13th, to review and discuss the repair plan draft. The "Soldier Pile" retaining wall with tiebacks has been chosen as the retaining wall system for the repair.

The decomposed granite covering the lower road has been removed and the contractor has completed the last of the cleanup effort. The installation of more erosion control and water mitigation materials is being completed. These materials include additional straw bales, straw wattles, and sand bags installed to secure the site from any weather related impact until the Soldier Pile retaining wall is in place.
