Chief's Corner

Every once and awhile someone comes into the fire station or calls me on the phone asking about the difference between the Mosquito Fire Protection District and the Mosquito Volunteer Fire Department. Since many new people have moved up here in the past couple of years, I would like to take this opportunity to explain who and what the two organizations are.

In the late 1960's Mosquito was a sparsely populated, rural community with no organized fire department. CDF, whose primary focus was fighting wild land fires, provided our so called fire protection services and an ambulance from Placerville provided our medical aid response. After the Swansboro development was approved and homes began to spring up, a need was recognized and the "Mosquito Volunteer Fire Department" was formed. It was a somewhat informal organization consisting of local people who simply volunteered their time and skills and responded whenever there was a need.

In the early1970's, the Mosquito Volunteer Fire Department became more formal when it was recognized by the Secretary of State as a private, non-profit 501(c)3 corporation for the purpose of providing fire protection, community support and education. A jar was placed on the counter at the Finnon Lake restaurant and donations were placed into the jar to fund the new organization. As the jar got filled the money was used to purchase fire equipment. In fact the first fire engine up here was something the San Francisco Fire Department was throwing away but instead they sold it to the Volunteer Fire Department for a really cheap price.

Even though we had a fire engine and community volunteers who responded when available, there was no formalized, ongoing training either for medical aid or fire suppression and both of these areas were becoming more specialized and demanding. So in the late 1970's as Swansboro and other areas in

Mosquito started seeing more homes being built and a growing population, there became the realization among the residents that the "jar on the counter" at Finnon was simply not going to provide enough money to properly and legally outfit a fire fighter, provide the mandated training and purchase the necessary equipment to be a legal fire department. To get the funds needed tax money would have to be utilized.

California has a process whereby, with the consent of the residents, a tax supported "Special District" can be formed to provide a specific service to an area of need. So in 1978 the local voters approved forming the Mosquito Fire Protection District with the specific responsibility of providing fire suppression, fire prevention, public education and medical services. The "Volunteer Fire Department" donated all of its fire fighting assets to the "Fire Protection District" and the newly formed "District" assumed all fire protection and medical aid responsibilities. The Volunteer Fire Department, however, remained in existence and retained its name and 501(c)(3) status with the role of providing "community support and education".

So here is where there is a considerable layer of There is a Mosquito Fire Protection confusion. District and there is also a Mosquito Volunteer Fire Department. These are two distinct entities that have similar names but very different, yet supportive, roles. The Mosquito Fire Protection District is a taxsupported Special District charged by the State with the responsibility of providing fire suppression, fire prevention, public education and first responder emergency medical services in our community. The District's assets include the Fire Station, fire station grounds and the equipment. Its members are the paid staff (myself, Devery and Mary) and the men and women living in the community who volunteer their time as firefighters and support group members.

Equally important to the community is the Mosquito Volunteer Fire Department organization. This organization is funded through donations and "fund

raisers". Their bylaws state that every resident in the community is automatically a member of the organization. As I mentioned earlier, the Mosquito Volunteer Fire Department's role is to provide community support and community education. They do this through the various community events they hold (Christmas pot luck, Easter egg hunt, Summer picnic, children's Halloween party, pancake breakfasts, etc.), by publishing the Mosquito Byte and Mosquito Phone Book and by working with the Fire Safe Council to secure the recent fuel reduction grants just to name a few. They also frequently purchase small tools, implements or medical equipment and donate it to the District.

Confused yet? Well try this. All of the members of the Mosquito Fire Protection District (paid staff and volunteers) because they are "residents of the community" are also members of the Mosquito Volunteer Fire Department organization. That's why you will often see the same faces at a fire scene or medical emergency and also organizing a Christmas potluck, pancake breakfast or Easter egg hunt.

To add even more confusion to this matter, in 1997 the Mosquito Volunteer Fire Department acquired ownership of Finnon Lake for the specific purpose of providing public recreation and education. The property consists of 121 acres and the restaurant. The acquisition provided the Volunteer Fire Department organization with an additional income source from the rent paid on the restaurant and campground fees to supplement the fund raisers and donations.

Let me repeat again, the Mosquito Fire Protection District does not have anything to do with Finnon Lake; the Fire Protection District's task is to provide fire suppression and medical services.

Well, if you are still confused try being in my position. I work for the Mosquito Fire Protection District as the Chief and receive a salary for doing so. I'm also an active participant in the Mosquito Volunteer Fire Department and their activities. I do this on my own time as I have a large personal attachment to the Volunteer Fire Department organization; after all I have been associated with that organization since 1976.

I hope I was able to provide enough information to clarify the difference between the two organizations. I

guess a good way to put it would simply be folks involved in a medical aid or fire suppression activity are representing the Mosquito Fire Protection District. The folks (even though they are often the same) putting on the pancake breakfast, selling crafts, hosting a Christmas Pot Luck or maintaining the Finnon campgrounds and property are doing so as representatives of the Mosquito Volunteer Fire Department organization.

Please feel free to come to the station if you still have questions, not only about this, but anything else that relates to what the Mosquito Fire Protection District does and the services it provides.

Spring is here they told us and all we can hope for now is that the weather realizes it too!

identify the edge of the road. These paddles had been pulled up and thrown over the side of the road by persons unknown. Thank you for cleaning up our trash and helping to keep our road safer.

Fire Safe Council

As you may have noticed, the brush removal project is in full swing. The amount currently needed to finish fuel reduction on the evacuation routes is \$137,000. Unfortunately, our 2nd prop 40 grant has awarded us \$53,700 which is far less than we had hoped for. On the bright side, however, when we consider that there was only \$200,000 available for all of El Dorado County with \$100,000 going to Tahoe and \$100,000 for the whole West Slope, we did pretty darn good! Thank you Chief Leo and Lynda Lima for all your hard work! Mountain Enterprise is making amazing progress considering all this wild weather we are having and I would like to thank Joe Lima for overseeing their work.

Please note that in the very near future (hopefully early June) we will be holding an evacuation drill. This will not only be an excellent opportunity to reveal any "glitches" in our process that we may not be aware of but it will also give residents a little more sense of security in knowing what to do in case of an actual emergency. We will also be providing valuable information to help educate homeowners on several issues including the new 100ft clearance requirements. We are making progress on getting the permits needed to start our repair project. All applications have been filed with the appropriate agencies, the questions have been answered and we are awaiting final approval. If all goes well, we are looking at the end of April to get things started.

The restoration process is a sticky one and we will have lots going on over this summer and into the next. We hope you will all bear with us through this project. The first major step is to remove the soil

from just behind the restaurant building, north to the spillway and down to the bedrock. The soil will then be stockpiled in the dry lake bed to be used to rebuild the dam during the next summer.

The campgrounds will also remain open during this construction period. We will construct another access for those who wish to use our facility.

The runway committee was successful in acquiring 49 runway lights from the Lincoln airport at no cost. Steve Loree was kind enough to volunteer to pick them up and transport them back to our airport. Lincoln airport upgraded their lights and donated their extra older ones to us. We will be looking into the possibility of installing these for increased safety of operations during civil twilight hours, for helicopter medical evacuations at night and hopefully the eventual return of the night operation options.

This event is fun to watch and the members are very friendly and more then happy to talk about their boats and show you how they work. It is well worth stopping by.

Recipe of the Month

Hi, again. Last month I gave you plain waffles and syrup using brown and granulated sugars. This month I am going to submit another waffle recipe using club soda, and a syrup that is different and made for these waffles Yummy! Each of these recipes takes about 15 minutes to prepare

Lemon Poppy Seed Waffles

- 2 cups biscuit/baking mix
- 2 eggs, lightly beaten
- ½ cup vegetable oil (1/3 cup also works well)
- 1 cup club soda
- 1 T lemon juice (1 like 1 teaspoon more)
- 1 t vanilla extract
- 2 t poppy seeds

In a small bowl, combine the biscuit mix, eggs and oil. Add club soda, lemon juice and vanilla; stir until smooth. Gently fold in poppy seeds. Bake in a preheated waffle iron until golden brown. Makes about 12 waffles

Blueberry Syrup

- 1 c sugar
- 1 cup packed brown sugar
- ½ c fresh or frozen blueberries
- ½ c water
- ½ c blueberry preserves
- 1 t maple flavoring

In small saucepan, combine the sugars, blueberries and water. Bring to a boil; cook and stir for 2 minutes. Remove from heat; stir in the preserves and maple flavoring. Refrigerate leftovers.

Makes about 2 cups
