MOSQUITO ROAD IS OPEN

Now that Mosquito Road is open, it is a good time to review the safe and courteous driving practices for our "new" road.

- Just because there are no yellow lines to mark the center of the road, does not mean that you should drive in the middle. When you see a vehicle approaching, move to the right side of the road as safely as the road allows and SLOW down.
- Remember, the vehicles that are going uphill have the right of way if backing up is necessary, the vehicle that is going down the hill must back up (backing uphill is safer because you have control of your vehicle) until it is safe to pass.
- Driving across the "White Bridge" requires drivers to <u>take turns</u>. When you are on the Placerville side of the bridge, wait up in the wide spot across from the waterfall if another vehicle is approaching the bridge. When you are coming from Mosquito/Swansboro, wait down by the bridge in the wide area, DO NOT WAIT UP AT THE TURN!
- Driving slow will enable you to get to your destination safely, however if there are vehicles behind you
 who want to go faster, please be courteous and pull over when it is safe to do so and let the vehicles
 pass. Just do not stop on a turn or a blind spot so that the vehicle(s) behind you can see that it is safe
 to pass.

The Department of Transportation will still be doing finishing up work on Mosquito Road for the next couple of weeks. The work will begin after "commute time" in the morning and end before "commute time" in the afternoon so watch for work signs and flagmen.

Chief's Corner

With the ending of July we are now about half way through the fire season. Unfortunately, the last half of any fire season is the worst half where the possibility of a large, devastating wildfire becomes extremely possible. Historically El Dorado County and in fact the State, experience the largest and most destructive fires in the months of September and October

Yet with the realization of wildfire being a part of life in California it is surprising how many people have a mind set that a wildfire cannot impact them. In a recent survey done in Los Angeles, Orange and Ventura counties eighty-eight percent of homeowners believe that it is "somewhat" or "very" unlikely their home will be damaged by a wildfire. This is surprising when you consider the serious threat of wildfire in those counties and how during the summer and fall the TV news shows a constant display of homes threatened or destroyed by fire. I am willing to bet that here in El Dorado County the awareness of wildfire is just as high as it is in Southern California but the attitude here is probably greater that it (a wild land fire) cannot happen here. It is just strange how people think that something bad always happens to the next guy and never to ourselves. I have learned over the years that stuff happens, and most of the time it isn't good.

Another interesting thing that came out of that survey taken in the three southern California Counties was that 73 percent of those who responded to the survey are very or somewhat confident they know what to do to be prepared for a wildfire. However, two thirds of them were not familiar with the term "defensible space," a key wildfire safety term that refers to the safety buffer created around a home by clearing brush and flammable materials. Here in our own fire district the majority of people know that the defensible space around their home is 100 feet, remember it use to be 30 feet. Yet, the knowledge of

having 100 feet of clearance around a house is not always practiced. It is funny how people are often resistant to clear around their homes until a fire is coming their way, then they are out cutting down everything with the only problem being at that point it is just a little too late.

Southland homeowners do not appear to be heeding the call to be personally prepared for a natural disaster. Seventy percent of survey respondents said they did not have a written evacuation plan to get their family to safety in case of wildfire. Only 28 percent have a written evacuation plan, and one third of those have practiced it. I wonder how many people in our District are aware of the District's evacuation plan and know where to go in the event of an evacuation? On the positive side, 60 percent of homeowners surveyed said they have assembled an emergency supply kit that includes enough food, water, medicine and other necessities to sustain their family for at least 72 hours. It seems that over the years people have gotten so use to having the government take care of their needs that they have forgotten how to take care of themselves. One thing to remember about a wildfire rolling through a community, is that it is different than a hurricane for most of the time there is no roof to climb up onto to show a big sign to the press helicopters asking for the governments help. No one should be able to take care of your family better than you! As proven in recent disasters, the government tries its best but often fails while doing that.

There are a few things that can be done to mitigate wildfire risk. One is to create defensible space by clearing dry weeds and brush from around all structures. Use caution with power tools as they should be used only early in the morning or late in the evening to avoid sending sparks into dry grass. Every family should write an evacuation plan. The plan should include an out-of-area contact family members can call if they're separated, familiarity with the Fire Districts fire evacuation plan, knowledge of the evacuation center, and provisions for evacuating pets. Another thing that my family has done over the years is develop a quick process for gathering important documents, pictures, and one important toy for each child. Also, think of being able to quickly gather enough water, food, and medicines for each family member for at least three days. Do not forget about having at least enough gasoline in one vehicle to get off the hill if that becomes necessary.

Simply, be aware that it could happen to anyone of us at any time, so please be proactive instead of reactive. Someone out there is thinking that it "will not happen to me, but to the next guy." What if we are the "next guy?"

Our roads are still a big issue. We have a contract in place with Delta Construction for some road work and the runway but we need far more work then our budget allows. Our treasurer, Tee, has been spending many hours researching loan possibilities, meeting with banks, negotiating terms and came up with a plan that was presented to the board. When all of the details have been successfully worked out, funding for additional road work will be available. The road committee is working with Johnathan to prep areas (clearing vegetation and improving drainage) along the roads that will have work done to help cut costs.

The architectural committee reviewed and approved 1 plan last month with another plan pending review.

Remember that a California fishing license is required for fishiing in the ponds even though they are private. These people are trespassing on private property and the Sheriff will respond.

Our next meeting will be **Saturday August 12th at 10:00 AM** at the fire station. The road and budget committee will continue to have meetings following the regular SCPOA meeting to make it more convenient for everyone to attend.

Nugget Court Fire

I want to thank all of you who called the FD in the middle of the night to report the fire on Nugget court. Leo said that if they arrived just 15 minutes later, my house probably would have burned down. My exhusband & my 2 young children were sleeping in the house & would have been very possibly killed.

I am so thankful that they are all right! Every day since the fire I look at my kids & grab them & hug & kiss them, realizing what could have been...and thanking God that I have them. If it weren't for your calls, they seriously may not have lived. For that I am truly grateful!! Words cannot express the humble thankfulness I feel; typed words cannot express the emotion in my heart...It was all totally beyond my control-I was in San Jose when the fire started.

My ex-husband said that the night of the fire, my cat

was biting him & scratching him, trying to wake him up. He said he smelled a little smoke, but not enough to alarm him, or even really wake him up. The wind was blowing downhill, so he wasn't smelling it like you neighbors below me were. Leo pounded on the door at 3AM to get everyone out of the house.

The FD got the fire out, with NO damage to the house, even though the fire started 3 FEET from the house-GREAT JOB!!

I work in San Jose and only get home on weekends. A person I had working for me on the property was burning manzanita in burn barrels right by my house. I had no idea this was going on. On that night, he thought the fire was out in the burn barrel, but it wasn't and that's how the fire started.

The person no longer works for me and you can be assured, I am removing all of the trash & junk that has accumulated on my property from other individuals that I entrusted my land to in my absence. I am furious that my family almost died over someone's stupidity!!

I have lived in Swansboro since 1995. I am very aware of the danger of fire. I don't even like to burn during burn season. I can understand how upset everyone is when a fire starts. I just hope that my neighbors understand that I am taking control back of my property & making it fire-safe, & a BIG THANKS again to those that called the FD & to all our wonderful firefighters at Mosquito FD! Mars

The Red Planet is about to be spectacular! This month and next, Earth is catching up with Mars in an encounter that will culminate in the closest approach between the two planets in recorded history. The next time Mars may come this close is in 2287. Due to the way Jupiter's gravity tugs on Mars and perturbs its orbit, astronomers can only be certain that Mars has not come this close to Earth in the Last 5,000 years, but it may be as long as 60,000 years before it happens again.

The encounter will culminate on August 27th when Mars comes to within 34,649,589 miles of Earth and will be (next to the moon) the brightest object in the night sky. It will attain a magnitude of -2.9 and will appear 25.11 arc seconds wide. At a modest 75-power magnification.

Mars will look as large as the full moon to the naked eye. Mars will be easy to spot. At the beginning of August it will rise in the east at 11p.m.and reach its azimuth at about 3 a.m.

By the end of August when the two planets are closest, Mars will rise at nightfall and reach its highest point in the sky at 12:30a.m.

That's pretty convenient to see something that no human being has seen in recorded history. So, mark your calendar at the beginning of August to see Mars grow progressively brighter and brighter throughout the month. Share this with your children and grandchildren. NO ONE ALIVE TODAY WILL EVER SEE THIS AGAIN
