Fire Safe Council

As I was sitting here at my computer trying to think of what to write in this months article, hoping that the two weeks of smoke from Forest Hill (Ralston Fire) would have prompted many in this community to really think seriously about defensible space, I smelled smoke. I naturally went outside to see where it was coming from and not only saw a lot of smoke but a light shower of ashes falling from the sky. I realized at that moment why I joined the FSC in the first place. Fire terrifies me! I could not live in the mountains that I love so much and be afraid all the time so I decided the more I learned, the more at peace I could be. It worked. After a few moments of panic I stopped thinking about all the things I didn't know, like where was it, can I get out, etc., etc. and started to focus on what I did know. Facts. The things that I have learned in the short time I have been involved with the Fire Safe Council are: Our firefighters KNOW what they are doing and they are outstanding in their field! The technology they use is incredible. They are able to spot these fires at the first puff of smoke and they are on it! I know that if I were in danger someone would come. I also know that even if I couldn't get off the mountain we have a great evacuation plan.

So as I rest assured that everything is being done that can be done I found myself saying OH NO! I haven't trimmed the branches away from my propane tank, the branches from my oak trees are still almost touching the ground! If the grass catches on fire it will catch the tree on fire then what?!?! This is a result of the defensible space training workshop I attended a couple of weeks ago. The things I learned and if applied will make all the difference in whether or not my house survives a wildfire. Was the Fire Department doing their job? You better believe it! Was I doing mine? NO. My property is my responsibility and mine alone, just like every other property owner. The information I received from this class will allow me to do my part in order to be fire safe and that is exactly the reason I want to start a committee to start home visitations on defensible space. When we come to your house please know we are there because we have your best interest at heart. WE CARE AND W ANT TO SHARE valuable information with you on what you can do to help save your house. We are not the fire police, we are not there to cite you, only educate you. If anyone is interested in being a part of neighbors helping neighbors and willing to spend a little time doing home visitations please contact me at 642-0695. Remember fire season is not over and the fire today at Rock Creek and Chili Bar is getting a little close. Be smart, be safe, its still to dry to start cutting right now but we can learn what needs to be done and be ready when the weather changes.

There will not be a FSC meeting in October. The November meeting date will be in the November issue of the Byte to schedule around Thanksgiving.

SCPOA

We would like to welcome Jeff Johns and thank him for his willingness to step up and fill the open position on the board.

All of the scheduled road work has been completed. Our treasurer Tee Steirwalt and our road committee chairman Tom Schmidt have spent countless hours. taken vacation time from work as well as time from their families to make it all happen. We owe both of them as well as the many other committee members who put in lots of hours a big thank you for what they have accomplished. We know there are many who are disappointed that work on their road was not done, the committee did the best they could deciding which roads were the highest priority and got the most done for the amount of money that was available. Johnathan has also been spending a lot of time on the roads improving drainage, filling pot holes and removing brush. We will be ordering a new type of cutback to fill potholes with that has a higher oil content, it is a little more expensive but has been used by the county in our area and found to be a better product for longevity. The committee will be looking at using cutback and slurry seal where needed next year since they will have a significantly reduced budget. The road committee will continue to meet on the second Saturday of each month following the regular SCPOA meeting.

The budget and long range committee will be looking at putting together budgets for the next several years to insure payment of the loan as well as continued funding of reserves and increasing the amount for road work. At this time the long range goal will have to include a very significant increase in dues if we are to keep up with the cost of our roads. This committee will also be meeting after the regular SCPOA meeting. The runway resurfacing has been completed. Repainting of the markings will be done by the pilots group and should happen in early fall once the surface has cured. We had some vandalism on the airport the evening of September 9th, most likely done by kids. One of the airplanes was removed from its tie down and apparently pushed down the runway into another plane, the rope tying the wing on the other plane stopped the first prior to contact but it was very close. One other airplane had some cowl plugs removed and the prop turned and the helicopter had some ties removed and the blades moved. This was a Friday night prior to 11:00 PM, the sheriffs department did respond. These actions constituted a federal offense and had the potential to be deadly if damage had been done and not found prior to takeoff. Not only is the pilot and any passenger in danger but if it caused the aircraft to go down it could be deadly to people on the ground, this is something we all need to be concerned about. If anyone saw anyone on the airport that evening or has any information pleases contact out secretary Lynda at 621-0309 or Kim at 621-1049. Several of the pilots will be installing surveillance equipment to monitor the aircraft in the tie down area and anyone caught will face federal prosecution. Look for the Neighborhood Watch meeting,

Another Fire Safe Article - one that can Save your Life and your Wallet

In case you hadn't noticed, our area is undergoing lots of change: new homes are still being built. Old homes are being sold. Lots of people driving around looking. New people moving into the area. Fire Department personnel. are changing. And this is Fire Season, yet as I walk and drive around, I am amazed at how many homes have no numbers out front, or only have numbers on the mail box - often faded or with a dropped a digit. How is anyone expected to report a fire?? In all probability the reporting party will be a stranger to the area - maybe a construction worker, or a prospective buyer, or a resident from different area driving around any delay in reporting the information means a delay in response time. A delay in response time can mean the difference between life and death or total destruction of a home.

On one block with 5 homes: one has numbers on the house itself that are no longer visible since the owner painted the home and the numbers no longer contrast - and they are about 50 ft. from the street and blocked by a tree that had a growing spurt. The next home has no number anywhere. Another had a little wooden sign tacked on a tree with the owners name - faded and not easily visible due to the height of the tree and low hanging branches that obscure the sign. The next one has the plywood board with huge numbers (for materials delivery) since it is new. but the board has fallen over on it's face several times. The last parcel across the street has a house but again no numbers. | know all my neighbors and really like each and every one!! although it is amazing the excuses I hear when I inquire about lack of visible address information.

So if common sense and concern for personal safety are not enough to motivate you to make sure your address is clearly marked, I will add a great motivator to the equation - \$. No, I am not offering \$ to people who run out and put up numbers, but I might be able to save you some money not to mention saving you from lots of frustration and heartbreak. Insurance policies may be impacted (which means 'lets the insurance carrier off the payment hook') if the home owner does not take reasonable measures to safeguard his/her home. In this era of computer interaction, it is not hard for information to be obtained. Mosquito/Swansboro has a great Fire Department and Fire Safe Council. Remember they do annual inspections which means information is being recorded. If your house burns down, AND if you had inadequate address signs. and if MFPD has a record which would be obtained by your insurance company during the course of investigating your claim, don't act surprised when the insurance company says you are at fault and that will affect their responsibility for payment. So please look at your home from a strangers point of view fleeing a fire with smoke in the air - can you find the house number easily?? because I sure wouldn't rely on a stranger to put their life at risk if you are not willing to take a few minutes to protect your home, loved ones, pets, wildlife, trees, and last but not least, your \$!!

Recipe of the Month by Evelyn Potter

Some time back I submitted this recipe for the Byte and since then have had many people request that I do it again. It is very easy to assemble and equally easy to eat. So for my very good friends who have requested it and you all out there in Mosquito/Swansboro land, here it is again.

Coconut Praline Dream Pie

- 1/2 c chopped pecans, walnuts or almonds
- 1/3 c margarine or butter
- 1/3 c firmly packed light brown sugar
- 1 BAKED pastry shell (9 inch), cooled
- 2 envelopes Dream Whip Whipped Topping Mix
- 2 1/4 c cold milk, divided
- 2 pkgs (4-serving size) vanilla flavor instant pudding and pie filling
- 1-1/4 c Baker's Angel Flake Coconut 1 t. vanilla
- Heat pecans, margarine and brown sugar in small saucepan until margarine and sugar are melted and mixture comes to a boil. Boil EXACTLY 30 seconds. Spread on bottom of pastry shell. Cool. BEAT whipped topping mix, 1 cup of the milk and vanilla in a large bowl with an electric mixer on high speed about 6 minutes or until topping thickens and forms peaks. Add remaining milk and pudding mixes, blend on low speed. Beat on high speed for 2 minutes, scrapping bowl occasionally. Stir in 1 cup of the coconut. Spoon into pastry shell. Refrigerate at least 4 hours or until set. Garnish with remaining coconut. Store leftover pie in fridge. Eat and enjoy!!! Makes 8 servings
