Chief's Corner

I guess you call it reflections. I find it hard to believe that I have been working as the Chief for the Mosquito Fire Protection District for almost 20 years. I never thought I had it in me, being able to work at the same job for so long. We all have to have them, jobs, careers, professions or whatever you want to call what you do in order to make some bucks in order to buy things like groceries, a house, a car every once in awhile and also raise a couple of kids. I guess I lucked out, I actually found something I really enjoyed doing and I managed to get paid for it at the same time.

In looking back, again reflections, I remember the very first incident I went to as the new Chief. It was a car wreck at One Eye Creek. I responded all nervous and hoping to do everything just perfectly. When I got on scene I couldn't find the accident. there was just no sign of a wreck anywhere. It took me a few moments to realize that I had arrived at Jaybird Creek, no where near One Eye Creek. The bad thing about this was I had to drive past the fire station to go from Jaybird Creek to One Eye Creek and sure enough there were some people at the fire station watching me drive right by with my red lights flashing away. Fortunately, Dean Edson had responded to the right Creek and was already working the accident and taking care of the driver who was slightly hurt.

At this time the District had for a Command Unit a 1985 Toyota Pickup, it was white and had a toolbox in the bed for all the medical equipment I had to carry. The thing did get good fuel mileage and managed to start all the time but it did have one problem. If I was at an Incident with the headlights on along with the emergency lights whenever I keyed the microphone on the radio the motor would stop. If the thing had been running at an idle for a few minutes it would not start up again. One of the things I had to carry in that toolbox was a set of jumper cables.

For responding emergency equipment the District had a 1979 International 1 ¼ ton truck called a Squad used as the first out on all Incidents except a fire. There was also a 1964 International 2000 gallon water tender. It had a problem with the pump, it was driven by a chain, off of a power take-off unit on the transmission and if the pump was driven too fast the chain would come off. The last piece of equipment was a 1985 FMC Engine the District had bought brand new in 1985. It was terrific having a new engine and it responded to every fire we had and it still does. Even after 20 years and a few updates it is still responding for us and doing a very good job doing so.

The fire station was painted kind of a red rusty color. The station had been built in stages with the front half being completed around the end of the 70's and the back half with the upstairs finished in the middle 80's. All in all it was a nice fire station and besides some paint, no longer a rusty red, the remodeling of the offices, and the bathrooms, it is the same ole station

In the front of the fire station there was an asphalt apron that had an underground gasoline tank right where I usually now park the command unit. It had to be dug out and hauled off to Nevada because of environmental laws and the fuel building had to be built. That process took a good piece out of the annual budget. To the east of the fire station there was no room for parking and to the west was a large drainage ditch that flowed water from the parcels behind the station, the ones that use to be a campground for Swansboro property owners to use. After begging, stealing and borrowing some large diameter pipe to put in the drainage ditch I then managed to have dirt from the east side removed to cover the pipe in the ditch. That way there became some more room for parking, a ditch covered up and a parking lot put in. Over time some concrete and asphalt was put in behind the station. That had to be done because in the winter if we drove the fire equipment back there it would get stuck in the mud.

As far as money went the Districts annual budget was not very substantial. Seems that was a common problem, just enough money to keep things going but not really enough to expand or set aside for reserves for future purchases or replacement. Over time we managed to get voter approved parcel fees and that greatly increased the Districts financial capability and offer a greater level of services along with buying additional needed fire equipment. As I recall the first budget I had to deal with was around \$54,000. Today that amount would pay the Districts, worker compensation insurance, liability insurance, equipment and property insurance and medical insurance. At the least the insurance companies are doing alright.

The District has always had great volunteer fire fighters. At the beginning though training consisted of coming to the station once a week, doing a little training and then working on the equipment to keep it going. From a medical standpoint all we had to do was first aid and now everyone has to be an Emergency Medical Technician. It was very difficult getting the proper and new protective gear for the fire fighters, as the money was limited. I remember one of the untold criteria for a obtaining a new volunteer was he had to be about the same size as someone who just left so the gear could be passed on. There was also no Support Group, they were organized in 1988 and have been a valuable part of the fire department ever since.

There were not a lot of people living up here at the time either. Probably around 400 living in about 200 homes. If you had car problems and broke down on Mosquito Road it was almost guaranteed you had to walk home as I recall driving into or back from town and not seeing a single car. Now if you break down you will probably still have to walk home as no one will pick you up and when you get back to your car all the windows will be broken out of it.

Yes, reflections. It is something we all should do, for at the least it should show us that the good ole days were not really that good.



SCPOA REPORT

It's finally starting to quiet down a bit after all the activities of the summer. Johnathan has continued his hard work on clearing along the roads, improving drainage and hole patching as the weather and temperature allows. The new patch mix seems to be working well although it has the characteristics of molasses and therefore is very difficult to work with when cold. We will see how well it holds up when we get some good rains. Anyone who sees any potholes that need repair or significant drainage problems should call SCPOA at 621-0309 and let us know so Johnathan can assess and hopefully take care of the problem.

The last of the bills for the road work have been paid and all funds have been transferred to American River bank. The budget committee is finalizing the budget for next year and will be factoring in repayment of the loan as well as continuing to fund the reserves. In order to meet our needs it is very clear that we will have to raise our dues 20% again for next year. Ultimately we need approximately \$500.00 per year per parcel just to meet our needs to maintain all the roads in the association. Our operating expenses also run about \$500.00 per year so you get an idea where our dues ultimately need to be. This is not out of line when compared to other associations that have similar amounts of roads to maintain. We understand nobody, including the board members, like to have dues increases but we must maintain our assets. If you would like to have input with how the budget is put together please join the budget committee, they meet after each SCPOA meeting.

Thanks to Lynda's hard work we have very few delinquent accounts at the end of this year, those that are left have been turned over to Cimmeron for collection and we had one foreclosure sale.

Building seems to have finally slowed in our area, in the last two months there have only been two sets of plans approved.

The road committee has a bit of a break after the many hours that were put in over the summer planning and executing the road work. The work has only just begun since this is a long term plan and it's not to early to start looking at what will be done next year and beyond.

The runway has been remarked, more then 30 volunteers showed up to lay out and repaint the markings on the runway. The Swansboro pilots group donated the paint and labor with the assistance of several Sacramento 99's members. We were able to get most of the job done, with some areas that still need to be filled in. Over 250 hours of volunteer work was donated saving the association the more than \$8,000.00 it would have cost to hire it out.

The SCPOA website is still around but is in need of some volunteers to do some work on it. This site has so much potential for better communication with members and could provide a more convenient way for members to submit and receive information. If

you have the abilities and are interested please come to a meeting or just contact our secretary Lynda and let her know, we really need some help!

Included in the annual packet will be a new fishing resolution as well as revised rules for the common areas. We want to remind everyone that our lakes are for catch and release only so that we are able to maintain a good fish population that will allow everyone to enjoy. If you see people keeping the fish please feel free to remind them that they need to be released. We will also be instituting a curfew, due to the increase in vandalism in the common areas. Unfortunately those who are in the common areas late at night are usually the ones creating the problems so by having a curfew we hope to reduce our vandalism problems.

Our next SCPOA meeting will be held at the fire station on Saturday December 9th at 10:00 AM and will be followed by both the road and budget committee meetings, we hope that you will attend and give us your input.

Recipe of the Month

Hope all of you had a very happy Thanksgiving. This particular day always brings memories of my Mom and Dad. When we were kids, we thought the prayer before dinner would never end. It seemed as if she went through every day in the year thinking of things we should all be thankful for. I think that sometimes we don't think often enough about our blessings. If Thanksgiving is over, we hope you had a good one. Now, on to the recipe. It is a sweet potato one and very GOOD!

Praline Sweet Potatoes
1 cup sweet potatoes, mashed
2 T. milk
1 egg yolk
1/4 t. salt
Dash of pepper, optional

In a small mixing bowl, combine the sweet potatoes, milk, egg yolk, salt and pepper. Transfer to a greased shallow 2-cup baking dish.

1/4 cup brown sugar, packed

2 T. butter, melted

2 T. corn syrup

2 T. chopped pecans

In a small microwave-safe bowl, combine the brown sugar, butter and corn syrup until blended; cover and microwave on high for 1 minute or until sugar is dissolved. Spoon over sweet potatoes. Sprinkle with pecans. Bake, uncovered, at 350 degrees for 20-22 minutes.

I usually lightly mix the syrup into the sweet potatoes just after cooking or you can do it before cooking. 2 servings and can be easily doubled.

The Weed Report

Hello! I hope everyone had a safe summer. It is hard to believe, but Christmas is just around the corner. With the turning of the weather, the rain means new weeds, grasses, and bigger brush. I would like to encourage our community to realize <u>now</u> is the time to begin your weed control. For example, Star Thistle does not appear in June when most people notice it; it actually breaks ground as early as January. Do not let Common Mullen or Mare's Tail surprise you when it is four feet tall, take care of the problem as soon as it breaks ground or even before. We need to do preventative control now and catch the escape (weeds that survive) in spring.

Please give us a call and we can get a strategic approach in place. As you can see already, in early November, grasses and weeds are growing strong in our ditches. It will only get thicker with the more rain we get. As always, no single method is 100%, whether it is chemical control (which is what we do), mechanical or any other means. The best we can do is to have a good IVM (integrated vegetation management) approach to weeds, grasses and brush. Remember the key word is maintenance, because we will have another dry summer, another wet winter and it all starts over again! Please call us, we will talk about your personal needs and customize the proper approach for your situation.


