Chief's Corner

On October 21st the Office of Emergency Services dispatched our fire department to the fires in southern California. The request was for a Type 3 engine with a minimum of 3 fire fighters. Captain Bob Davis, Engineer Floyd Baumgartner and Fire Fighter Dave Erdman departed Station 75 at 2:30 PM an arrived at Station 85 in El Dorado Hills to meet up with the other 4 engines required to fulfill the strike team. They left at 5:00 for "Prado Staging" in San Diego County. Over the next week, they found themselves involved with protecting houses and fighting all kinds of fires. Bob has enclosed an article describing some of his experiences.

As we all know, when the "Santa Anna" winds, which can gust up to 100 miles per hour, start to blow in Southern California fires seem to start. And, when you combine those winds with the ever present brush and vegetation along with the fact that we are going through one of the driest years in California history, the odds of several large fires taking off were inevitable. But, the State of California has been dealing with these kinds of fire conditions for decades and over time has developed one of the best wild land fire fighting systems in the world! Part of that system is the State's ability to move fire fighting resources (apparatus, equipment and fire fighters) up and down the state to any emergency that develops. That is where fire departments such as ours come into play, we are classified as "local resources" designed to supplement state and federal resources whenever the need arises. The procedure is fairly simple. It starts with the Office of Emergency Services (OES) who has the responsibility to determine and acquire the most appropriate resources and then direct them as guickly as possible to the emergency. Once there is a determination of resource needs, dispatch centers around the state are notified and they in turn dispatch the proper resources. And at that point everything is off and running to the incident.

During the Thanksgiving week there was a great deal of media reporting about the state sending up to 85 strike

teams to pre-position for fires in Southern California because of possible Santa Anna winds. A strike team consists of five similar resources, it can be 5 Type 1 engines, 5 Type 3 engines, 5 dozers, 5 water tenders or whatever type of resources are required. A request for 85 strike teams means 425 engines and about 1,500 fire fighters will be on the move. The reason why 5 is the size of a strike team is that 5 is about the maximum limit one individual can manage. So with each strike team there is one strike team leader. Five strike teams are managed by one division leader and five divisions are handled by one group leader and so on. This command structure is modeled after the military and its chain of command system.

So what is a Type 1 engine as compared to a Type 3 engine? A Type 1 is designed to fight a structure fire while a Type 3 is set up for wild land fire fighting. In our case both of our primary engines can function as either a Type 1 or a Type 3 depending on the need. Also, all of our fire fighters are trained and equipped with personal protective gear that makes it possible for them to fight a structure fire and a wild land fire.

One other thing about the Emergency Response System created here in California is that as we go to someone else's emergency they also come to ours. There is a reality that there are times and incidents that happen within a fire district that cannot be handled by the district with out some help. So as a fire department we will help out whenever the need arises. We are fortunate in this state to have the best emergency response system in the world.

Winter, believe it or not is suppose to be here or at the least coming soon. Make sure your chimney has been cleaned if you use a wood stove, or your house heating system has been checked and is properly running. Besides being a safe thing to do it could save you some money.

Mosquito FPD in Southern California Inferno by Capt. Bob Davis

We left Station 75 at around 2:30 PM and arrived at the preliminary staging area in Poway, Ca. around 2:30 AM. After 5 hours of rest, we were sent to the city of Ramona for a briefing and to get our first assignment. Our assignment - "Stage in Rancho Bernardo (about 25 miles north of San Diego) for structure protection". After arriving at the staging area in Rancho Bernardo, we got a few more hours of rest and were then assigned to structure protection at the "Witch Fire" in Rancho Santa Fe. Rancho Santa Fe is an upscale neighborhood just east of I-5 between Encinitas and La Jolla and filled with million dollar homes.

To get to our assignment we had to drive through the bottom of a canyon just in front of the advancing fire. The wind was blowing about 20 mph and gusting to 40. We could see the fire in the distance so we didn't waste any time driving the 16 miles between Rancho Bernardo and Rancho Santa Fe!!

Our Strike Team Leader assigned us a house to protect that was at the bottom of the canyon. Floyd, Dave and I found a clearing by the house where we could safely park E-275 and began "prepping" the house and the surrounding area. We could see the fire coming but knew that it was still about ¼ mile away so we had time to complete the prep work. We pulled all flammable products away from the home - lawn chairs & tables, dog houses, barbecues, propane tanks - and then started to cut down brush and shrubs around the structure widening our "defensible space" as much as possible in the limited time than we had.

When we completed the "prep", I noticed that there was a stable across the road, so while Floyd and Dave made another cursory inspection of our assigned structure, I went there to make sure that there were no people around. As I was walking back to our assigned house, I heard someone yelling from one of the neighboring houses up the hill. I went to check it out and found a Sac. Metro Engine crew and the home owner frantically "prepping" that house. On it's current course, the fire would reach that house well before reaching our assigned structure so I gave them a hand. Just as we finished, the fire had reached the edge of the hill and was bearing down on the house.

We retreated next to the house for cover as the fire "blew over" us. (Fire burns where there's fuel. So, the strategy in this type of structure protection is to remove as much fuel as possible from around the structure so that when the fire approaches it will take a more fuel laden path and burn around and beyond the structure. When this occurs, it's referred to as the fire "blowing over".)

Just as the fire was blowing over, one of the owners came out of the house and said the garage roof was smoking. I went to the back of the garage, found a ladder and climbed onto to the roof with a garden hose where I found 3" to 4" of pine needles covering the back side of the garage on the tile roof. Embers from the passing fire had caught the pine needles on fire. I put the flame out but noticed that it was still smoldering. The smoke was coming from under the tile so I started to remove tiles. After clearing about half of the roof, I found more pine needles under the tiles where the fire was and put it out with the garden hose.

The fire had now run past this house and was heading down the hill towards another house just above "our" assigned house. I let the Sac. Metro Captain know I was returning to my engine and worked my way down the hill.

As I passed the 2nd house, I noticed that no Engine had been assigned to this structure. A quick look around revealed why. No one had done any defense prep work around the house and there was too much for a fire crew to handle in a very short time. I noticed that all the lights and TV were on. That concerned me, so I knocked on the door to see if any one was home. There was no answer but I found the door unlocked. I opened the door and yelled. Still no one answered. I continued into the house to make sure it was clear - it was empty. It was kind of eerie; it was like someone had abandoned the place in a hurry with out turning anything off. I went out the back door and saw the fire approaching the corner of the house that faced the canyon. I grabbed a garden hose to try to wet the corner down but the smoke was so thick I could not breathe or see. I went back into the house to catch my breath. After a few minutes I went back out and was able to water down the corner of the house but again the smoke was just too thick and I had to retreat back into the house to breath. I realized that my efforts were about the best I could do at the time and that the fire was going to soon be down at the house where Engine 275, Floyd and Dave were staged, so I went out the front door and worked my way down to the engine.

I can not stress enough the importance of "Defensible Space" around your home here in our community!

Things TO do while DRIVING Mosquito Road --

Wave to every one who is courteous. Leave a BIG space between you and the next guy - most of us stop for upcoming cars and wildlife. Keep to your right. Drive like there is always a car coming your way. Yield to uphill traffic. Dim your headlights. Check across the canyon for traffic at the "Great Wall of Mosquito" so you can stop above the last switchback going to town. Pull over in a safe spot when you have a car behind you and you are 1st in line. When stopping at night, turn off your headlights and leave just your parking lights on for uphill traffic so they can see. Let the person in front of you get all the way across the bridge before you get on. Call the person/place you are going and let them know you will be late if you have not left yourself at least 25 min to get to town. Enjoy the drive!

Things NOT to do while DRIVING Mosquito Road -

Leave home with 10 minutes to get to town (folks, it takes much longer). Talk on a cell phone. Watch television. Read anything. Take care of children/pet issues. Flash your headlights/honk your horn to get someone to pull over, they see you, and will pull over where they are comfortable. Pass a stopped car before the last switchback, they probably are waiting for upcoming traffic! Drive slowly down the middle of the road, please stay to the right. Stop by the beginning of the guardrail at the last switchback before the bridge when going to town - this impedes cars trying to make the switchback turn - just move on down to the wide spot just before the bridge.

Recipe of the Month by Frank Ethridge

Black Bottom Bourbon Pecan Pie

- 1-9 inch unbaked pie crust
- 3 whole eggs
- 1 cup light corn syrup
- 3 ounces bourbon
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup butter melted
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 cup pecan halves
- 4 ounces chocolate chips

Preheat oven at 350. Spread the chocolate chips evenly over the bottom of the pie crust and place in the oven for 5 minutes or until the chips have melted, spread smooth. In a medium sized bowl beat eggs, add the corn syrup, bourbon, sugar, melted butter and vanilla, mix until well blended. Spread out the pecan in a single layer and pour the egg mixture over the pecans, Bake pie for one hour or until a knife inserted 1 inch from the edge of the crust comes out clean. Let cool, serve with ice cream or fresh whipped cream.
