Chief's Corner by Chief Bob Davis

Over the past month the Fire District has been a very busy place. We have had several "escaped" control burns. A couple were up in the forest on Sierra Pacific Industries land and the others were down here in the "inhabited" area. One of the fires serves to point out the importance of really controlling your burn. The property owner was eliminating brush around his property and in the process of doing so used a control fire to burn a stump. He thought his burn pile was out but unfortunately it wasn't. All it took was a strong gust of wind a few hours later and the sparks went flying. I can't stress enough the fact that once you start a control burn you have to attend it until there's no question that it is out.

Fortunately none of the fires were very large. They provided us with a great training opportunity to run some equipment, lay out some hose lines and actually do some line work around the edge of the burned area. But having these kinds of fires this time of the year is a little unusual. Normally the fuels have too much moisture in them to start burning, much less carry the fire to other adjoining fuels. Historically, March is the month that makes or breaks the amount of rainfall we receive during the wet season which in turn determines when the fire season gets serious and how long it will last. We have actually just gone through one of the driest March's in many years and it's looking as though this may be a long fire season.

Unfortunately, the longer a fire season the more opportunity there is for a large fire in the District. We have been fortunate in the past and maybe our luck will carry us through for another summer. But, as Leo once told me, "luck only seems to be there when you are having a good day in a Casino so prepare for the worse and hope for the best". I think that's good advice! Now, is the time to be clearing around your house and preparing for that possible "unlucky day"

when a fire does happen. As we all know, the State requires 100 feet of clearance around every structure. That means the removal of all ground fuels and the trimming of all trees to at least 10 feet high. Considering the area we live in, I also strongly recommend the removal of ground fuels in this 100 clearance area too. Also make sure all the pine needles and leaves are cleaned out of your gutters so you don't have a place for a spark to turn into a roof fire.

Let me say a few things about your driveway. First, your driveway is not only a means for fire fighting equipment or an ambulance to access your house, it is also the way **you** get out if you must evacuate! Second, it should be cleared to a width of at least 15 feet and a height of at least 12 feet so that we can rapidly get emergency equipment in and back out. Remember, while fires are definitely a possibility, the likelihood of a medical call is also there. We need unobstructed access for both.

There is a Chipping Program being offered by the El Dorado County Fire Safe Council. This program makes it possible for you to cut your brush, leave it next to a driveway or the road and a crew will come up and chip it. You have to sign up for this program and forms are available at the fire station. Come down, get a form and then take advantage of this program.

The Fire District's Support Group members will soon start doing annual fire evaluations. In the District If you need some advice or help on what to do around your house please give a call to the fire station (626.9017) and someone will come up and do everything possible to answer all you questions and concerns.

We had a small group attend our April meeting and we would like to thank them for their input. Current maintenance projects depend on what the weather is doing; when it is warm enough, Johnathan is patching potholes and when we get some rain to soften the ground, fencing work will begin. We had two transfers of crushed asphalt delivered and it is being used to do some of the larger pothole and road repairs. This product is being used in several areas and the board approved the cost of using a dump truck to relocate it to the appropriate spots. The black berries along Maidu will be sprayed as soon as the weather conditions are right and several dead trees have been removed.

After a review of the paperwork to provide both our secretary and maintenance person a credit card with a limit of \$500 to make required purchases easier, a motion was made and approved to acquire these cards.

Our new fire chief Bob Davis also wanted to let everyone know that they will be getting the fire safe program going again including home inspections to help everyone comply with the "100 ft rule". During that six month period the Board of Directors decided to hire Bob Davis to fill a permanent Chief's position. One of the tasks I was given was to help Bob learn the business of being a Fire Chief. I do not know if I am a great teacher or if Bob is just a good student, but he is catching on quite well. He doesn't know everything yet, but after all it took me about 20 years to figure out how to be a reasonable Fire Chief. I am willing to bet that if a fire chief from the bay area was to come up here to work as the Chief for Mosquito he would have less experience than Bob does. Experience is simply a function of time and place. Bob has the time and to him Mosquito is the place. We're fortunate to have him step up.

Being a fire chief in Mosquito is really quite different from being a fire chief in say, Davis. They have a large number of people, a major interstate freeway, a University, all kinds of money, all the personnel needed to operate a fire department and all the necessary equipment. But what we do have is a great community, Mosquito Road, a properly controlled budget, people who want to live here. dedicated volunteer fire fighters and the best equipment the community can afford. A fire chief here has to like people; after all, the people have access to the fire chief. He has to be willing to pull a fire hose or get a cat out of a tree. He has to drive a fire engine and sometimes he has to work on a fire engine. He must depend on volunteer fire fighters and support group members who will do anything you ask them but nothing you tell them. He has to have a good mind within one head that can carry many different hats. Above all he has to be willing to help, care, support, and love the community he lives and works in.

I have been asked how the fire department is going to do now that I am retiring again. The only answer is, just fine. The Board of Directors will continue to do the great job they have always done by assuring that the community has the greatest level of service with

the finances available. The Fire Chief will continue to provide the guidance and leadership necessary to fill the direction established by the Board. The Volunteer Fire Fighters and Support Group will respond to every 911 call and they will perform in a highly trained and professional manner. And above all the community will continue to support the Mosquito Fire Protection District as it always has.

By the way, I plan on staying up here for awhile longer so if Chief Davis can put up with me I'll be a volunteer fire fighter and the training officer. That is how I started in this business and I would love ending it that way. I'll be seeing you around, hopefully not on a 911 call.

Recipe for the Month – Grilled New Orleans-Style Shrimp - 4 servings

1 1/2 pounds large shrimp (21 to 25 per lb)

2 tablespoons olive oil

3 medium garlic cloves, minced

3/4 teaspoon salt

6 tablespoons unsalted butter

2 teaspoons chili powder

2 teaspoons black pepper

4 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce

1 tablespoon fresh lemon juice

Baguette

Lemon wedges

Cooking Directions

Snip shells of shrimp with scissors down middle of back, leaving tail and first segment of shell intact. Make an incision along length of back where shells are cut and de-vein, leaving shells in place. (Shells will prevent shrimp from becoming tough on outside when grilled.) Toss shrimp with oil, garlic, and 1/2 teaspoon salt and marinate at cool room temperature 15 minutes.

While shrimp marinate, prepare grill for cooking. If using a charcoal grill, open vents on bottom of grill, then light charcoal. Charcoal fire is medium-hot when you can hold your hand 5 inches above rack for 3 to 4 seconds. If using a gas grill, preheat burners on high, covered, 10 minutes, then reduce heat to moderately high. Heat butter, chili powder, pepper, Worcestershire sauce, and remaining 1/4 teaspoon salt in a small heavy saucepan over moderately low heat, stirring, until butter is melted, then remove from heat and stir in lemon juice.

Thread 4 or 5 shrimp onto each skewer and grill, covered only if using a gas grill, turning over once, until just cooked through, 3 to 4 minutes total. Push shrimp off skewers into a bowl, then pour butter mixture over them and toss to combine well.
