Chief's Corner by Chief Bob Davis

In June we had an unusual lightning event in Northern California. El Dorado County took several "hits" but not nearly as many as the counties to our north. As you heard and saw on the news, this weather phenomenon sparked over 1000 fires! You may have also heard that many of these fires were left unattended. It's unusual to hear this but with only a finite amount of resources you can only do so much and the decision was made to go after those fires that posed the most serious threat to life and property.

We were not exempt from the lightening attack. The fire on Gravel Road was the result of one of the lightning strikes. Lightning initially struck an oak tree branch which smoldered for two days. Then the wind coming out of the canyon hit the branch just right and the smoldering turned to flame. Here's a little insight on the incident from my perspective.

When I arrived on scene, the fire was about two acres in size and burning at a moderate rate of spread. The fuel, mostly grass, was keeping the fire on the ground. Thanks to the prevailing winds, it was burning away from the structures located on the property. The fire's right flank posed the greatest threat since a little stronger wind could send it running uphill into the Trail Gulch area. Engine 75 soon arrived and Firefighters Leo Chaloux and Jake Pritchard were assigned the task of attacking the right flank. Firefighter Chris Johns was right behind them in Water Tender 75 and began suppling water to E-75. Next to arrive was Firefighter Eric Pelham who was assigned to attack the fire's left flank. But to reach the left flank Eric had to traverse a cow pen which was enclosed by a 6' high fence. So the first order of business was to breach the fence. After we accomplished that, Eric began working the left flank.

Then the "Cavalry" arrived - two air tankers and a helicopter!!! Cal-Fire, other local resources and hand crews from Growlersburg were not too far behind. Now we had the much needed additional resources for a safe and aggressive attack on the fire. I soon got radio

reports that Leo and Jake had hooked the right flank and that Eric had hooked the left flank ("hooked" means that they had stopped forward progress of the fire in their area). The aircraft were knocking the fire down and allowing ground personnel a chance to control it. The fire was now looking a lot less threatening and we were obviously starting to get a handle on things. It is amazing what a couple of aircraft and a helicopter can do for your confidence level when you are the Incident Commander! A short time later the fire was totally contained and Cal-Fire (who has jurisdictional control over all wildland fires) and the hand crews were left to do the mop up.

Remember that I started this article talking about "finite resources". Well we were fortunate because there was still plenty of resources in the county on that particular day and at that particular time. Here's what was dispatched to our fire which was a relatively small event: One Chief Officer, One Cal-Fire Battalion Chief, all Mosquito equipment and available volunteers, two helicopters, two air tankers, Airco (the guy who runs the air show), one Cal-Fire Fire Prevention Officer, two Battalion Chiefs from County Fire, five local engines, ten Cal-Fire engines, one ambulance, two hand crews, one dozer and one heli-tender. It's this kind of aggressive response that helps to keep small fires from turning into big fires. And, it's this kind of a response that is very, very welcome.

We have just gone through one of the driest springs in 80 years. The grass and brush are as dry today as they would normally be in September. Enjoy the summer but PLEASE be careful out there and be "fire-wise".

Judging from some of the conversations I had at the picnic, there still may be some confusion about the different Organizations in our community and who/what they are about. Several people asked me questions which I really could not give good answers because they related to another organization. Here's a very abbreviated explanation of the 3 major community organizations. Please feel free to come to any of the organizations' board meetings (see Byte calendar) to ask a question or give suggestions.

<u>Mosquito Volunteer Fire Association</u> (MVFA) is a nonprofit, community-wide organization - if you live up here, you're automatically a member of MVFA. MVFA's role is to provide community support and community fire education. MVFA owns and manages the Finnon Lake property but their major source of funding is through donations and "fund raisers". MVFA organizes, funds and puts on the Christmas Pot Luck, Easter Egg Hunt, summer community picnic (which just occurred) and the children's Halloween Party. MVFA also publishes the Mosquito Byte and the Mosquito Phone Book. The MVFA also frequently purchases small tools, implements or medical equipment which they then donate to the Fire Protection District. The MVFA Board carries out the business of the Association.

Swansboro Country Property Owners Association (SCPOA) is the organization that governs the Swansboro Subdivision (which is a part of the Mosquito community). Their members are those people living within the subdivision. The SCPOA Board is responsible for managing the homeowners association business. They are funded by assessments on the property owners. SCPOA owns and maintains the airport, the roads within the subdivision, and the common areas such as Dyer Lake, Catfish Pond and Trout Lake

<u>Mosquito Fire Protection District</u> (MFPD) is a State of California created Special District charged with the responsibility of providing fire suppression, fire prevention, public education and first responder emergency medical services within District boundaries. MFPD is tax supported. The District's assets include the Fire Station, the station grounds and the fire equipment. Its members are the paid staff and the men and women living in the community who volunteer their time as firefighters, support group members or board members. The MFPD is governed by a 5 member Board of Directors who are "public officials" elected by the voters in the State's General Election for 4 year terms.

I hope this helps clarify the roles of these three different, but associated organizations.

SCPOA

Dave Najera from Aquatic Environments, was a guest at our last meeting to explain why we spend so much each year to keep our lakes "healthy". Dave explained the types of growth we get and why/what needs to be done to maintain the healthy state they are currently in. Some considerations for the future will be dredging, setting up an aeration system that will not be damaged by vandals and putting together a long range plan. The chemical treatments are the most expensive and we will need to continue with them but we may be able to eventually decrease the frequency. Since we are having a dry year we may also be able to have our maintenance crew clear out some of the bottom muck and dead cat tails as the lakes recede.

We also received a brief report from our Maintenance Lead, Johnathan, on the lake management class he attended. The good news is that we are doing pretty much what is recommended and our lakes are in very good shape. One thing that was emphasized was the clearing of the dam faces of brush and small trees to maintain dam integrity. Larger trees are better left alone since they have such an extensive root system. Johnathan and Tammy will be working on this as time permits but road patching and maintenance will continue to be their priority during good weather.

Our secretary, Lynda, reported that we currently have 43 accounts in collections leaving a shortage of over \$40,000, this is quite a bit higher then last year and will have to be taken into account in next years budget. The budget committee will be having meetings after each regular meeting now through when the budget is approved. This is your chance to get involved and have a say in what your dues are spent on.

The road committee will also be meeting to finish up the road survey and get the appropriate information together so that we can correct our reserve study and look at having some road work done this year. The idea of purchasing a sweeper for the roads was again discussed and it was decided that Tom would get the pertinent tractor information from Johnathan to get prices on what would be appropriate to purchase.

The runway committee will draft a letter to all property owners bordering the runway reminding them of their responsibility to clear any brush that encroaches on the runway safety areas. A few years ago the areas were cleaned but several owners have allowed growth to return. The website group is still working on improvements to the site and also exploring the idea of allowing advertising on the site for donations. They will report back if it can legally be allowed.

The idea of closing the runway for an event was also discussed. However issues of liability, insurance coverage additional costs, etc. have not been addressed. It was also brought up that using it for an activity other then what it was intended for may give people the idea that they can do it anytime.

Thanks to the hard work of our secretary, Lynda, our liability insurance options were examined. Lynda. obtained a quote from an A+ company that is taking on new clients which was almost half of what we are paying now for the same coverage! A motion was made and approved to purchase insurance from this company.

Our next meeting will be Saturday August 9th at 10:00 AM at the fire station and will be followed by the budget and road meetings.

NO Logging Trucks

Sierra Pacific Industries (SPI) has notified the Byte that they will not be moving forward (this year) with their planned helicopter-assisted timber harvest up in the forest off of Mosquito Road. Therefore, logging trucks will not be routinely using Rock Creek Road in August as was previously announced.

The Educated Construction Consumer (4 of 4) by Erik Pelham

To review: 1. Use licensed contractors; 2. Have an extensive and thorough "Scope of Work"; and 3. Get multiple bids and references. The fourth in our series will prevent you from paying for something that you are not getting. Your down-payment should not exceed \$1000 or 10%, whichever is less. This is called "Earnest Money" and is a token amount to seal the contract. It is a violation of state law for a contractor to accept more than this amount. This is to protect you from "prepaying" and the contractor disappearing or doing substandard work. This is your leverage to get what you want. Murphy's Golden Rule: "Whoever has the gold makes the rules."

Going forward from the contract signing, the exchange of money should be covered in a contract document that parallels the "Scope of Work". The "Payment Schedule" is set up so that you pay for work that has been done, or materials that have been delivered, to your job. Before you make a payment, you can clearly see whether or not the pre-agreed to terms of the "Payment Schedule" have been met. If you owe \$1300 upon completion of the drywall installation, then you can look at the project, determine that the drywall has been installed, and make the appropriate payment. If the drywall is not installed, then the contractor should not even be asking for that payment, and you should not be making that payment.

In these four articles, I have covered some of the basics of your consumer rights. There is no substitute for you doing your homework at the website run by the Department of Consumer Affairs (www.cslb.ca.gov). If you rely on someone else to protect your rights, don't be surprised if you find yourself in a less than desirable situation.

Homeowner Assistance Program by Taffy Warner

Property Tax Postponement Program. If you are having difficulty paying your property taxes, make sure you contact the State Controller's Office Property Tax Postponement Program at their website: www.sco.ca.gov or by telephone (800) 952-5661 or (916) 327-5587 to see if you qualify for this program. There are 4 basic criteria:

- You are at least 62, or blind, or disabled; 1.
- 2. You own and occupy your home;
- You have a total household income of \$35,000 3. or less:
- You have at least 20% equity in your home. 4.

Applications for the program may be submitted from May 15th - December 10th each year.

Taxes continue to accrue but repayment is not required unless you move; sell the home; a lien such as a mortgage becomes delinguent; or the homeowner dies.

Pruning Ponderosa Pine Trees

Chief Davis' constant warnings are made only too clear, if that's the proper word, by the recent smoke levels. As such, I started looking at the suggestions for clearing the potential burn areas around my house. We've one particular Ponderosa Pine whose lower branches touch the ground, and I wanted to trim it to about 10-12 feet.

When pruning your Ponderosa pine tree, live branches should only be pruned during the dormant season (Dec - Feb). You can prune dead branches anytime. Pruning in the dormant season will avoid attracting beetle pests that can harm and even kill the tree, making it more susceptible to failure during a storm.

Cutting your tree's branches and leaving stubs is called topping. Never top your tree! It is ugly and harmful to its health. Pruning your tree properly will extend its life.

To prune the correct way, partially undercut the branch you are removing approximately 6" away from the tree's trunk. Next, cut the same branch from top to bottom, further out. Finally, remove the stub that remains by cutting at just outside the raised area that surrounds the branch at the trunk.

Recipe of the Month

Green Beans in Tomato Vinaigrette

In addition to being delicious, this recipe can be made ahead-not, alas a full day in advance, but at least a few hours before you eat dinner. You can leave the red onion out of this dish if your children-like mine--shriek with disgust at even the tiniest fleck of onion.

Recipe Ingredients 1-1/2 Ibs fresh green beans, washed and trimmed 3 tbsp balsamic vinegar 1 tbsp Dijon Mustard 1 large garlic clove, minced 6 tbsp vegetable oil 2 tbsp each minced fresh basil and Flat leaf Parsley Salt and pepper to taste 1 lbs plum tomatoes, seeded and chopped ¼ cup minced red onion

Steam the beans for 5 minutes. Rinse quickly in cold water to stop the cooking. Drain well. In a large bowl, whisk the vinegar, mustard and garlic. Gradually whisk in the oil. Add the herbs and salt, whisking thoroughly. Add the vegetables and toss everything together.

Let the beans marinate, unchilled, for at least 2 hours. Serve at room temperature. (If you prepare them earlier in the day, go ahead and chill them. Just make sure to take them out of the refrigerator at least 2 hours before dinner.) Makes 6 servings.


