# **Chief's Corner** by Chief Bob Davis

I hope everyone had a good Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Years. It's hard to believe that Christmas has come and gone and it's already 2011. Time just goes by too fast.

We had our first power outage of the year. Losing power up here is not as common as it used to be, but it still does happen and we should be prepared for it. Extra flashlights, candles, and lanterns should be available and functioning properly. If you haven't tested your lanterns lately, now is a good time. Remember to check the amount of fuel you have available. If your heating system requires electricity to work, try to obtain a backup-heating source or possibly a powerful enough generator. Before you use it though, it should be inspected professionally and the chimney cleaned.

I believe a large number of the homes in our community use propane as their main heating source. Besides paying the price, the only other resource is to use an alternative heating supply. A wood stove is a very efficient heat source for any home. Considering how many options are out there as well as the development and utilization of other energy alternatives, I'm sure you'll be able to find something to fit your needs.

If anyone is dependent on an oxygen generator to support their breathing or requires electricity for health needs, please let us know at the fire department. We have extra oxygen tanks at the fire station and can help.

One thing that increases during this time of year is vehicle accidents. When Mosquito Bridge was closed, Rock Creek road became somewhat of a highway. In total we had five vehicle accidents that were reported. On the first real good rainstorm we had a

couple of weeks ago, there were even more accidents. During the first rain, we always need to be extra careful and practice safe driving. The roads are especially dangerous in wet weather as well as when it is cold. Please be sure to always wear your seatbelts, practice safe speeds, and leave maybe a few minutes early for wherever your destination may be so you don't feel rushed and potentially speed.

Since the rains have begun people tell me how relieved I must be since the wildland fire season is over. I just tell them that its just one less thing to consider to be likely to happen during this seasonal weather. More than 70% of what we do is still medical related and it is a constant consideration. In fact, we seem to get more medical calls in the wintertime. This is especially true if we get a significant snowfall. People who are outside getting firewood, shoveling snow, or just dealing with the bad weather may over exert themselves or even succumb to the cold conditions. Vehicle accidents increase in winter as a result of weather conditions and how people drive in those conditions. Structure fires also increase this time of the year as heat sources in homes, such as wood-burning stoves, are properly maintained. used more and not Carelessness with holiday decorations can also contribute to an increased fire hazard. An improperly cared for Christmas tree that has dried out near a sufficient enough heat source can ignite and be fully engulfed in flames in less than thirty seconds. Please be aware of this concept every holiday season for your and your family's safety.

The probability of something happening is always there. If it does happen to you, please do not hesitate to give us a call. If there is any type of emergency, dial 911 immediately. For any other non-emergency situation you can always call us at the fire station (530 626-9017). Aaron, Mary, or I are at the station 7 days a week (one of us should almost always be there). I usually have two meetings a week and at

times we are out doing business in the district or helping someone out, but we do our best to be there.

I have been getting a lot of questions regarding burn permits. Yes, burn permits are required. Permits are required mostly because of the importance of burning safely and air quality control in accordance with new state regulations. You can get a burn permit at the fire station. They are free, but you do need to speak with a knowledgeable person to issue you the permit so that you can learn the proper safety precautions and specific conditions under which burning in this county is permitted. Burn permits are now tied to air quality control criteria, so don't be surprised when you decide that conditions are perfect for burning, but you call the number and are told it is a no burn day. We are part of the Sacramento Valley air quality control district in El Dorado County as are Yolo, Amador, and Placer counties. So usually if it is a bad air day in Sacramento, we can't burn up here; such as when there is no air movement or when it is foggy in the valley. If there is too much smog from vehicles, or agricultural burning is taking place, then no burning is allowed up here in the foothills.

Winter is here. Please check your heating appliances and make sure they are clean and working properly. Check smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors, and above all, be careful out there. Please remember to be vigilant with holiday lights and decorations.

Our Annual Christmas dinner sponsored by the MVFA was a big success. We had over 130 people attend. All had fun, Santa Clause showed with gifts for the kids. There was also singing and a bike give away. A BIG THANKS TO ALL THAT HELPED! THANK YOU MVFA BOARD!

It was nice to see so many people at our December meeting. I think this probably had to do with the fact that this is the meeting to make decisions on budgets and dues, but we really appreciate members coming to provide their input. We were able to have some basic budget discussions, but since we had just received the corrected version of our reserve study and nobody had the chance to really review it, we decided to reschedule the budget portion for the following week.

Kevin and Jonathan have been busy monitoring culverts as the rain pours down; our lakes are filling fast and as of this last storm are going over their spillways. With the rainy days preventing a lot of the outdoor work the guys turn to the maintenance of equipment. Kevin and Jonathan have been working on the Massey tractor. The engine needed some pretty major work and they have saved the association money by doing it themselves.

Lynda has been doing her best to work with owners who still owe assessments from last year as well as the banks. As of this month we still have 60 accounts that owe with 16 of these being due to foreclosures. We still want to encourage members to start a payment plan ahead of time with Lynda so that by the time the assessment is due it is either already paid or close to it.

As stated at the beginning we had to postpone the budget meeting but were able to complete it the following week. Our reserve study had recommended a 5.9% increase this year as well as continuing each year. We have several options including to do the recommended increase this year, a partial increase, or no increase at all. The options of decreased or no increases could lead to higher increases later on but after good discussion then input recommendations from everyone who attended the meeting the board decided to not do an increase due to the economic climate and reevaluate next year. Some of the changes that will be reflected in the budget include increasing the budget for roadside spraying to keep vegetation down as well as making Kevin full time. This was done based on past surveys where members overwhelmingly wanted more maintenance along our roads. Other areas were cut based on actual spending the past year, which included water for Dyer, legal, and insurance. This year's budget is very tight.

We still have plans to get road grindings to provide a base surface for our roads that are in the worst shape. This should occur sometime in the spring and will be all the roadwork that can be done next year. There is no other roadwork projected in our reserve study for the next several years so that we may build our funds up again.

Lynda is keeping our website up to date with meeting schedules and will be posting meeting minutes once they have been approved in hopes that this will help keep our membership more up to date.

We also had a discussion about changing our meeting day to a Thursday, it was decided that in January we would end up having two meetings to make the transition easier. The first will be on the second Monday, which is January 10th, and then we will transition to the fourth Thursday, which would be January 27th. So for next year we will have our board

meetings on the fourth Thursday of each month at 6:00 PM. We hope this will allow more members to attend them.

Rob Kirkpatrick made a suggestion from the floor to consider having an orientation day for new board members as well as community members to explain what the board is responsible for and how things are done. The thought is that maybe we can get more meeting participation if members have a better understanding of what and why the board does things.

Our next board meetings will be Monday January 10th and Thursday January 27th at 6:00 PM at the firehouse, and we hope you can attend.

# Southwestern Tortilla Soup

This will put a little warmth in you on those cold winter evenings

# **Ingredients**

8-6-inch corn tortillas cut in strips

2 ounces corn oil

3 cloves garlic minced

1 fresh jalapeño minced

(Add a little more if you like it hotter)

¼ cup chopped cilantro

16 ounces chopped tomatoes (canned)

16ounces vegetable or chicken stock

8ounces tomato juice

½ teaspoon cumin

½ teaspoon light chili powder

1 tablespoon lime juice

2 ounces cream

# **Directions**

In a medium sauce pot, heat the corn oil, add the tortilla strips and cook until crisp but not brown. Add all of the other ingredients (except the cream) simmer for 15 to 20 minutes. Place in a food processor or blender (be very careful the liquid is going to be extremely hot) and blend until smooth add the cream. May be garnished with grated cheese or grilled chicken and avocado
