Chief's Corner by Chief Bob Davis

Winter is just around the corner. And, with that first chilly morning or cold evening our first thought is to take the chill off with a fire in our fire place. So now is the time to check your wood stove and chimney to make sure it's operationally safe.

What causes a chimney fire you might ask. Generally, it's the result of creosote that's built up on the inner wall of the chimney being heated to its ignition point. Then it will continue to burn until either the oxygen is removed from the chimney or the creosote burns up.

Where does this creosote come from? Well, it's created when smoke and other gases given off by burning fuel wood condense on the chimney wall. The amount of creosote that forms on the wall is dependent on the type of fuel wood being burned, the temperature of the smoke inside the chimney and the last time your chimney was cleaned. Soft woods such as pine, cedar and fir produce a great deal of smoke and thus produce more creosote. Hard woods like oak, madrone and manzanita, produce less smoke and therefore less creosote. Wet or damp wood, regardless of type, will also produce more smoke as it burns and therefore the potential for creosote.

How do I know if I've got a chimney fire? There's no "one answer fits all" but here's some frequent signs. There's often a great deal of noise which some have described as sounding like a train running in the house. Smoke will actually come off the stove and the chimney itself. Often chimney fires spew flame 4 to 5 feet high out of the chimney. And, sometimes the pipe visible inside the house may be glowing bright red and the wood stove itself is actually bouncing up and down as it pulls in air to keep the fire going.

OK, I've taken the appropriate precautions but I still get a chimney fire, what do I do?

First, close <u>all</u> doors and dampers on the stove or the chimney pipe. This will take away the majority of the oxygen that the creosote needs to keep burning. Next.

call 911 so the fire department can be dispatched. Then please take all the advice given to you by the 911 operator and get yourself and all other members of your family out of the house. Make sure everyone in your family has a common and known place to meet so all can be accounted for.

The majority of the time the chimney, if it was properly installed and has not gone through a serious chimney fire in the past, will do its job and keep the fire inside the chimney. But one word of caution - do not throw water into the wood stove or fireplace! This might put the wood fire out and make you think that the emergency is over but often it's not; the creosote in the chimney could continue to burn. So call 911 in all instances of known or suspected chimney fires.

To avoid chimney fires, the best thing to do is simply have the chimney cleaned and inspected at the beginning of the winter season and again in the middle of the winter if you have been using your wood stove a great deal.

"Burn Season" is now open (dependent on air quality). Any outdoor burning requires a burn permit so please come to the fire station to obtain one. They are free and all you have to do is listen to our little speech on what is expected of you when you have a permit. Never hesitate to get a hold of Curtis or myself if you have any questions about permits, outdoor burning or anything else.

SCPOA

The SCPOA report in the Byte has been a month behind because our meetings were held just after the deadline for the Byte articles. We have moved the SCPOA meetings to the third Thursday of each month starting in October. This will allow current information to be published in the Byte as well as avoid having

meetings on holidays. We are trying to keep the meetings to 30 minutes in order to not take up the whole evening, we hope this will encourage more members to attend.

Jonathan and Kevin have been continuing to prep areas for road grindings, trimming brush, ditching and installing culverts where needed to insure proper drainage. They have finished placing grindings on Corder and most of Log Cabin, the next loads will go to Wildflower, Nugget and Pinecone. Once all grindings have been used a roller will be rented to compact them and we will be looking at finishing them with a chip seal next year as part of a road bid.

At this point we have received about 900 tons of road grindings and will be getting another 520 tons in the next week or so. A significant number of courts have had a surface placed on them at a fraction of the cost of the original road plan. We want to thank our treasurer Tee Steirwalt for her persistence and the many hours she has spent on the phone in order to find, procure and arrange transport for these road grindings. These have become a high demand item in these slow economic times and Tee has done a phenomenal job in getting these for us, it has saved all of us a very significant amount of money.

Our maintenance crew has also been working at Twin ponds to improve drainage. They have been able to build an attachment for the tractor that will allow them up to a 20 foot reach in order to remove cattails. This will allow them to open up the pond over time. In the past we have has bids of around \$20,000 to do this and they made the attachment for about \$200. Great job Jonathan and Kevin!

We had a brief budget meeting to discuss where we are in our current budget as well as what changes will need to be made for next year. We will be getting the final tally of all the courts that were done with grindings to our reserve study group next week to see how that will affect our needs for funding. We hope that the savings will offset the need for a dues increase. We plan to schedule a budget meeting prior to the next board meeting in hopes of finalizing a budget so that a vote can be taken at our November meeting.

At our last meeting we had a question from the floor about a dues increase and that since people are having a hard time it shouldn't happen. At this time we don't have all the information needed to make a decision and once we do it has to be based on what is best for the association. All of the board members also pay dues and many are also having a difficult time so if left to a personal decision we would vote for no dues at all but this would be irresponsible. We want to encourage members to come to the budget meetings, ask questions, make constructive suggestions and learn what is required for the budget as well as reserve funding. If you can't make meetings but would like information or have some suggestions you can contact our secretary Lynda at 621-0309, let her know you want to speak with a board member and one of us will call you.

Our next regular meeting will be Thursday November 17th at 6:00 PM at the fire station. Look for budget meeting signs prior. We hope that you can attend and look forward to your input.

Finnon Dam Restoration Project by Neil Matheny



We were all singing "Oh, no, don't let the rain come down." but someone else was doing a rain dance. Unfortunately, singing was booted from the talent show and the rain came down, bringing progress to a halt for a while, but work has been resumed. Unless we have unusually cooperative weather for a couple of months, the dam won't be completed before the contractor has to remove the heavy equipment for the winter.

Milestones:

All of the dirt from the old dam has been removed.

The "key way" was dug into the north side of the dam.

Concrete was poured around the inlet of the drain to create a base for the slide gate.

The state inspector approved construction of the remainder of the dam – with intermediate inspections still required.

The bare dirt surfaces "downstream" of the dam were treated by hydroseeding to reduce erosion (see picture previous page). This will have to be done on all bare dirt surfaces before the winter storms.

Bat and owl habitat boxes were installed as part of the requirements for Boy Scout Jay Revolinski to earn his Eagle Scout rank.

Brush was removed along the north shore to prepare the day-use and swimming area and a fire department training burn removed most of the brush at the east end of the camping area.

Both sides of Trail Gulch Road near the outlet were lined with rock to minimize erosion.
