# **CHIEF'S CORNER**

Once again Mother Nature has not delivered the rainfall she promised. Winter is turning out to be one of the strangest and driest in a long time. We received some precipitation during the first part of February but we need much more. I sure hope the next few months bring us more precipitation. Even a little snow might be nice for those of us who don't mind it. Our area looks really majestic with a blanket of snow.

With this being a dry winter we need to take extra precautions when we burn our leaves and brush. Make sure you have cleared around your burn pile (10') and have a shovel and water near by. Be aware of the small winds that blow your hot ash from your burn pile to nearby debris. With average amounts of precipitation we don't normally have to worry about the hot ash as much because the debris has high moisture content. Since we have had a lack of precipitation, the nearby debris will not have the high moisture content and will burn much easier. With the right wind, your small control burn could turn into much more.

The U.S. Forest Service has been, and will continue (weather permitting), to burn off large slash piles from their fuel reduction projects just outside our community. Don't be surprised to see several large piles burning in the evening hours on your way home.

A Chipping Program is being offered by the El Dorado County Fire Safe Council. This program makes it possible for you to cut your brush, leave it next to a driveway or the road and a chipper and crew will come up and chip it. Forms for this program are available at the fire station, or go on line at El Dorado County Fire Safe council and take advantage of this program.

If anyone you know might be interested in becoming a fire fighter by joining our Volunteer Fire Association, now is the perfect time. If interested then I urge them to come down and see if it would be something they would like to do. We have trainings every Tuesday night starting at 1900 hours (7:00 PM) and observers are welcomed!

Being alone is one of the greatest fears older adults have as they grow older. The You Are Not Alone (YANA) Program has been credited with saving the lives of many older adults. This **FREE** service allows older adults to find comfort and security knowing that someone will be checking in on them on a daily basis and in the event something does happen, family or friends will be notified. ### **SCPOA**

Our maintenance crew has been continuing to remove brush from along our roads as well as continuing to work on the common area behind Dyer Lake. Several large tree trunks removed from the area have been turned into six nice benches which will soon be placed in the common areas for use. Some road patching has been done and will continue as we get days with higher temperatures.

The first lake treatments were done and lakes inspected, we will need some chemical treatment later but initial treatment with beneficial bacteria was started and will continue through the summer. DBI brought bacterial packets up and explained the procedure to Kevin who will continue the treatments. By having our maintenance crew educated and applying treatments it saves us from having to pay DBI to do it. They will also be installing an aeration system in Dyer but that may have to wait until the water level is lower to allow for trenching.

We still have just under \$46,000 in outstanding dues from last year. This is an improvement over last year so our efforts in small claims court seem to be paying off. We are also now able to accept credit card payments for a much more reasonable fee. One of our banks just restructured their fees so it's now only a \$10 up to \$3000. Unfortunately this change did not occur prior to sending out our packet so we were unable to include the information. If you wish to use your credit card to make your payment just contact our secretary, Lynda, at 621-0309 and she will be happy to help you.

Our association is due for a new reserve study so we will be approving a new contract with the Browning group to do this later this spring. This will review all of our assets and evaluate replacement costs over time so that we can incorporate this in our budgeting process.

Our budget year has ended and our CPA is currently working on closing out our books, once this is done we will have an accurate accounting of how much was left over from last years budget. We know we are under budget and we had agreed that this amount will be applied to road work for this year. Since we currently only have just over \$17,000 allocated, no road work was again projected in our reserve study. With the assistance of Jonathan and Kevin we came up with a list of roads most in need of repair. We will be speaking with contractors, evaluating funds available and weighing the benefit of borrowing from our reserves to come up with a plan of how much work to do and on which roads this summer.

Our next meeting will be Thursday April 18th starting at 7:00 PM at the firehouse.

### **Finnon Dam Restoration Project**

We last reported to you in July when the official function of the Finnon Lake Restoration & Habitat Improvement Project Subcommittee ended. I mentioned that there were still several projects that needed our attention. Since July of 2012, we worked to prevent erosion on the face of the dam and continued to clear brush from around the shoreline. We planned improvements to the facility such as a new bridge over the spillway and a swimming beach.

Other activities include monitoring the health of the aquatic animals and developing fish spawning areas. According to our fish expert, Dave Angelo, bass and bluegill spawn in relatively shallow water and in gravelly soil. Before we stock the lake with bass, we needed to provide appropriate spawning areas to promote fish population growth.

This picture shows Dave Angelo pouring gravel into one of 85 spawning beds that were placed around the east end of the lake. Each bed is 2 and one-half to 4 feet in diameter and contains about 4 inches of gravel. The beds are placed where they will be 3 to 5 feet under water during spawning season.

In the next few months, we expect to stock the lake with "feeder" fish and crayfish to give them time to populate the lake before stocking with additional fish.



#### FIRE PROTECTION FOR COMMON AREAS By Deanna and Joe Snyder

We are working toward getting the downed debris in the Dogwood Common Area burned and cleaned from the last three winters. The area was done by hand crews that cleared from the road back 50 feet and then it was sprayed by Sears to keep the new growth in check for fire protection in the last few years. This has been a very heavily treed and brush area for fire protection equipment to come through safely. One of the former fire chiefs warned that he would have a hard time bringing manpower in if it were to catch fire; it was not a safe area for his crew. So if it is not safe for the fire crew and is left unchecked or waiting for airplane coverage a large fire could develop right in the middle of the subdivision. If your property should back up to Dogwood Lane especially between Mosquito Road and Stope Drive you may want to participate with the clean up because fire usually burns up the hill, not down.

Before Swansboro was developed, Dogwood Lane was logged several times by hand crews with horses but that has been forty to sixty years ago. The area was cleaned and cleared of brush about 20 years ago by local homeowners and a riding-walking trail was established for people and horseback riding to get them safely off the lane. We have continued to work in small work parties over the years with mostly the people who live on Dogwood and our friends helping us to keep it under check. But a lot of trees have fallen over the years that need to be cut and burned and to keep the blackberries in check.

If you like to run, jog, walk your dog, bicycle, do bird watching, ride your horse, take pictures or just use Dogwood to pass through for sightseeing you may want to join in. There are a large number of people who use the lane and the trail daily; we see them from our home on Dogwood.

We will have the help of the fire department for a water supply on April 13, 2013. We will be having our first official work day on April 11 and 12 at 9:00 am; we will meet on the lane about midway. If April 13 is not a burn day, we will reschedule to another burn day, but we can still continue to work at preparing the project for burning. So, if you can help...please bring your clippers, hand pruners, shovels, gloves, chainsaws, weed eaters, drinking water. etc. In the meantime, you may see small work parties already working on the trail as time and weather permit. If you decide to work on a common area in and around your own home, please contact the board and obtain the needed insurance form from Lynda Lima before you begin. #### **BREAD PUDDING WITH WHISKEY SAUCE**. Yields 6

#### **BREAD PUDDING**

3 ½ cups sugar, 3 tsp. ground cinnamon, 1 tsp. nutmeg, 9 medium eggs ,1 cup heavy cream, 4 cups milk, 1 tsp. vanilla, French bread, sliced thin

#### WHISKEY SAUCE

1 cup heavy cream, 2 cups whole milk, 1 tbsp. corn starch, 1 tbsp. water, 6 tbsp. sugar, 1/4 cup whiskey or bourbon

To make the bread pudding, first preheat oven to 300 degrees. Grease 8" square baking pan. Combine sugar, cinnamon, and nutmeg in a large bowl. Beat in the eggs until smooth, add the milk then work in the heavy cream. Add the vanilla. Arrange the bread slices in the pan and pour the mixture over the bread. Allow bread to soak up custard. Cover with plastic wrap and foil and place pan in a water bath.

Bake for approximately 45-60 minutes, uncover the pudding and bake until the pudding has a golden brown color and is firm to the touch. If a toothpick inserted in the pudding comes out clean, it is done. The mixture of pudding should be nice and moist, not runny or dry. Serve warm.

To make the whiskey sauce, place the cream and milk in a small saucepan over medium heat, and bring to a boil. Whisk corn starch and water together, and add to cream while whisking. Bring to a boil. Whisk and let simmer for a few seconds, taking care not to burn the mixture on the bottom. Remove from heat.

Stir in the sugar and the bourbon. Taste to make sure the sauce has a thick consistency, a sufficiently sweet taste, and a good whiskey flavor. Pour over the Bread Pudding
