CHIEF'S CORNER

If you are a long time or even a short time reader of the Mosquito Byte, you've heard over and over from us that, "it's not IF but WHEN a wildland fire strikes our community." Well, that WHEN happened on September 13th with an intentionally set fire across the canyon in Pollock Pines.

By the 15th, that fire was heading our way at unbelievable speed and at 6:00 pm that evening the Sheriff's Department issued a voluntary evacuation order for the entire community. That was followed up the next morning at 10:00 am with a mandatory evacuation order. That began a long 11 days for not only the Firefighters and the Support Group, but for the entire community who was displaced for that entire time.

By now you probably know the fire story: it burned in a westerly direction through the Brush Creek watershed, down into the Slab Creek watershed area and was headed for the homes along Log Cabin Lane, and the associated courts. Thanks to some very aggressive air action, the fire was finally turned in a more northerly direction and burned toward Mosquito Road and Slate Mountain. That was the fire behavior that CalFire had hoped for but our community was still not out of the woods. All it would take was a reversal in the winds or a spot fire in the unburned area downslope from Log Cabin Lane and the severe threat would be right back.

Cal Fire's plan was to cut a fire break below the inhabited area from Slate Mountain all the way to the river. After the line was in, they planned to backfire the unburned area. It took a couple of days to cut this line and then we began the waiting game - waiting for the conditions to be just right for a backfire! Wind direction, humidity, ambient temperature, available resources, are just some of the things that went into a

backfire versus a no-backfire decision. Finally all of the conditions were just right and the backfire took place. Then a couple of days were spent mopping up and then the evacuation order was lifted and we got back into our homes.

The good news.... thanks to the efforts of our Fire Department, the Support Group and firefighters from nearly every city in California and nearly every state in the U.S., we all have our homes!!! At the height of the action up here, there were 1,008 firefighters, 15 bulldozers, 25 water trucks and 15 hand crews.

The members of the Fire Department would like to thank you, the community, for playing your part in this ordcal: evacuating when directed to do so, being patient until we (CalFire) could get the area safe to repopulate and for the tons of support you have shown us

The fire season is not over! It's still hot and dry so be careful out there.

Without the drive and foresight of Mark Egbert from El Dorado County & Georgetown Divide Resource Conservation Districts and Doug Veerkamp's generosity, this project would never have been done. I would also like to thank those who were not on the committee but came out to lend a helping hand when we needed more manpower to work on various projects.

We do still have grant obligations that will go on for years concerning the wildlife and the fisheries at Finnon. MVFA still has a wish list, hoping to someday have showers and RV hook-ups completed at the campgrounds, but this will take some time to accomplish. It's been a long four years and with this community's support we have achieved a great deal.

KING FIRE THOUGHTS

Fellow Mosquito Area Residents,

My name is Jarrod Infante and I am a volunteer firefighter with the Mosquito Fire Department. I am a resident of Log Cabin Lane, married to Sara and dad to Lilly and Abby whom you may know from the local Girl Scout troop. I'm proud to be a member of this tight knit community.

Working as a professional firefighter off the hill with almost 20 years in the fire service. I have responded to and participated in multiple Strike Team/State OES assignments including the Rim Fire, the Sand Fire and the Lodge Fire Complex. Now I am proud to say that I have been on the "other" side of a Strike Team assignment: that is being a requestor of assistance as opposed to a provider of assistance.

I am proud of this because I was able to witness firsthand how welcoming and supportive the Mosquito Fire Department, Support Group, our Mosquito Community, and Placerville Residents were as different agencies came to help us within our time of need. I am also very pleased with the professionalism outside agencies showed our community, how much they appreciated our assistance, and how efficient and focused they were while protecting all of us during this very scary time.

Saying "Thank You" to the many strangers entering our community is the least we can do as these people placed our needs before their own, helping to prevent the King Fire from decimating our community. I would also like to give a big "Thank You" to all of you, my neighbors and friends, for pulling together and giving an extra hand during these very difficult times. You are the glue that holds this community together so tightly.

Now you know a bit about me and how I feel about this fire and my community. Please allow me a moment to offer some helpful tips, should anything like this occur again. Some of these tips may seem familiar, but in light of the high risk we all experienced, please re-evaluate your efforts to support these suggestions.

- 1. <u>Defensible Space</u>: Please try to provide at minimum 50 feet of space from your structures to any trees or shrubs. 100 feet is preferred, if possible.
- 2. Prevent Ladder Fuels: A hot ember carried in the wind can land on dry grass or pine needles (the bottom rung of the ladder). As these small fine fuels burn, their flames can heat up and "climb" to taller, thicker fuels such as shrubs (middle rungs of the ladder). As the shrubs or low materials burn they can ignite taller, hardier fuels such as trees or structures. So: clear your shrubs, cut low hanging or dead branches off trees, remove lumber or firewood from around your structures and clear vegetation away from your propane tanks. Clean pine needles off your roof and out of your gutters as these can act as ladder fuels as well.
- 3. Be Prepared: Have copies of current important paperwork, items such as food, clothing, bedding, toys for children, medications and photographs in a container ready to be loaded into a vehicle quickly. Each family will have different needs in this area, specialize what your family needs and discuss it with each of the family members. (I was shocked at how many stuffed animals and "blankie's" were considered a necessity!) Find out more at the CalFire website: http://www.readyforwildfire.org/go
- Evacuations: There are two types, Voluntary and Mandatory. When the mandatory evacuation goes into effect Rock Creek Road will be shut down to outgoing traffic to allow incoming fire apparatus access. This means that during the mandatory evacuation the only road out will be Mosquito Road. If you have a boat or trailer that you plan on taking off the hill, do so during the voluntary evacuation. Remember trailers are not supposed to cross the bridge. I know many residents have the skill to travel across the bridge while pulling a trailer, but this is not advised and could cause a tense situation to escalate during a mandatory evacuation. Remember, please drive slowly and safely. We have a saving: "slow is smooth and smooth is fast," which applies very well in these situations. Take care, remain calm and don't cause an incident within an incident. Please remember a mandatory evacuation is MANDATORY. If you are asked to leave, please do so for your own safety and for the safety of ALL first responders.
- 5. Obey the Laws: Law Enforcement Officers will assist with traffic control and should be afforded our attention and cooperation. If an evacuation order is still in place, please don't try to talk your way past roadblocks. We understand that each of our neighbors have special needs or interests, but trying to get into an unsafe area only makes the situation more difficult for first responders. Drive safely and be courteous to other vehicles.
- 6. Damage Control: Rumors are horrible. During high stress situations information is extremely important. False information is extremely frustrating. When reading posts on social media sites be sure of where the information comes from, or take it with a grain of salt. Don't be afraid to ask questions, but please accept that sometimes the answers are "We Don't Know." Firefighting is a very difficult task with hundreds of variables that can change situations in an instant. This makes it extremely difficult to

- answer some questions because of all the variables involved. Also, please remember to be kind and considerate; just about everyone you come in contact with will also be stressed, frustrated, tired and emotional. Please don't add unnecessary fuel to an emotional fire.
- 7. Animals: None of us want to see an animal suffer. But we can't abide a person being hurt or killed while trying to care for their animals. Have a plan and be prepared to remove large animals during a voluntary evacuation. Try making provisions for smaller animals so they can become self sufficient if they are to remain on the hill. Consider automatic feeders and watering systems. Recognize that we will do our best to check on them if and when time is permissible, but please don't put yourself in harm's way for your animals.

Thank you all once again for your compassion, as well as helpful and considerate behaviors during this trying time. I'm extremely proud to be a resident of such a fine group of neighbors. Please continue to make this an amazing community by "hoping for the best, but preparing for the worst." Take care.

Things are beginning to return to normal after the chaos of the fire; we were very lucky to have sustained no loss of structures.

Our maintenance crew has been working on the repair of damage from vandals to the bridge at Trout Lake, as well as the formation of the off street parking area at Trout. They are also constructing a picnic table for Twin Ponds.

Our roads and runway were heavily used by lots of large equipment during the fire. While the runway sustained minor damage to some edges, the roads seem to have done fine. The board accepted an offer of \$6400 from Cal Fire for use of the runway; those funds will be used for the repairs needed. Cal Fire not only did an amazing job of protecting the community but also of trying to insure they left everything as good or better than when they came in.

We had a very informative budget meeting with our CPA in order to explain our financial reports and to go over the association finances and answer questions. While some changes need to be made in the report formats, overall our association is in very good shape.

A communication meeting was also held and some new ideas were presented as a way to attempt to better inform members. We currently have a website. (www.scpoa.net). this Byte article, as well as letters in each of our two yearly mailings. Many members still report difficulties receiving adequate information. A new idea was suggested. This would involve training

members in each of the units about their specific DC&R's after which they could interact with their neighbors to answer questions and facilitate problem solving. The Board will be looking for individuals who would be interested in participating in this program.

We will have several openings on the SCPOA board again this year. If you are interested in getting more involved in your community, please consider submitting your name for the election.
