- 2. Have your **chimney checked** and cleaned by a licensed professional.
- 3. Obtain a **burn permit** here at the fire house and follow the instructions before you light burn piles. You must call the numbers listed on the burn permit before you burn and please listen to the whole message as it may limit you to certain hours for burning.
- 4. Please be smart and drive safely it's that time of year to have your vehicle checked out: tires, brakes, antifreeze and chains. Keep a blanket, gloves, bottled water and some nonperishable food in there too! If it's snowing and you're not an experienced driver in the snow, stay put! Stay home, stay at a friends, or stay at work. The snow will melt and you will get home eventually.

We are looking forward to seeing you all on Saturday, December 13th at 6 p.m. for our annual community holiday dinner – I've heard that Santa will be visiting too!

Nearly every Tuesday night at 7p.m., here at your fire department, we train our fire fighters to protect homes and save lives. Come on down, learn something new, and see if you would like to become a Volunteer Fire Fighter. You don't have to have any previous experience, we will teach you what you need to know.

NEW MOSQUITO BRIDGE

The Mosquito Fire Protection District Station 75 on Rock Creek Road was packed with almost 200 local residents on Saturday afternoon, November 15, 2014, for an update on El Dorado County's progress to replace the Mosquito Road Bridge. The County Transportation Division and their consultant, Quincy Engineering, presented a detailed explanation as to how they are currently evaluating seven alternatives and narrowing them down to the three alternatives that will be carried forward into the environmental document. The criteria upon which this analysis is based comes from a combination of documented community concerns from the 2013 Public Workshop, technical studies, and the fundability requirements set forth under the Highway Bridge Program (HBP). This bridge is 100 percent funded by the HBP, but the chosen alternative must still be approved by the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and Caltrans who administer program.

The seven alternatives consist of three basic themes: (1) The lower options that would replace the bridge near its current location; (2) The middle alternatives that would bypass the lower switchbacks; and (3) The higher alternatives that would bypass most of the switchbacks leading up the bridge.

The next public meeting is anticipated to occur in spring of 2015 to present the results of the criteria analysis and receive additional public input. The County is planning to complete the environmental studies and design by 2017, and construction by 2020.

LOCAL HISTORY

I'm a genealogist and in my research I came across this article that I found interesting. I don't know if anyone else will find it interesting but it is from our past. The following article (complete with spelling we would find erroneous today) was published in The Mountain Democrat in 1859. Mountain Democrat Editor Michael Raffety granted permission for it to be reprinted in the Mosquito Byte.

"THE WAY WE WERE, PLACERVILLE, Saturday, April 9, 1859.

Road to Musquito Canon - The survey and location of this road, ordered by the Board of Supervisors last month, has been made by County Surveyor E. W. Welton. The route selected leaves Upper Placerville and, passing west of Reservoir Hill, crosses the South Fork of the American River a short distance above the mouth of Rock Creek. whence it runs on an easy grade to the village of Musquito,- about three and one fourth miles from the river. The maximum grade is five degrees. We are informed that the route passes over favorable ground for road building, clear of rocks, and that a good road can be constructed upon it at little cost.

The citizens of Musquito are prepared to build that portion of the road on their own side of the river, unaided, and only desire assistance in building the bridge and about two miles of the road on this side of the river. It is to be hoped that the Board of Supervisors will make an appropriation in behalf of this improvement, as the amount required is the merest trifle, compared with the great benefits to be derived from the building of the road. There are some fine farms in the neighborhood of Musquito, but the lack of a wagon road has disabled the farmers there from taking their produce to market, and consequently they have had but little inducement for the cultivation of their rich fields. It is singular that a section of country like this, so valuable for its mines, its extensive forests of giant spruces, firs and pines, and its rich and fruitful valleys should have remained so long locked up within eight miles of this city.

We hope the "trotting up" grade will be soon complete."

MOSQUITO TRADING POST "As the Worm Turns"

For all you folks interested in participating in the Trading Post next summer, now is the time to prepare your garden beds for spring planting. We are hoping for more people to participate in trading their fruit and vegetables next year.

First, get a job! (To pay for the plants that the deer and gophers eat. Haha!) Seriously, we all are aware of the challenges to gardening but they are outweighed by the rewards. If you haven't already, put a tight woven wire on the bottom of your beds, and fence in your garden. The next thing on the agenda is to clean up old beds. If you have chickens, let them help you out by de-bugging your garden beds and eating some of the remains of garden plants that they enjoy. Another option is to start a compost pile with old vegetable plants. It helps to grind old plants before putting them into a compost pile.

Now you can work amendments into your soil. Some suggestions are sources of calcium and phosphorous. You can add bone meal, alfalfa meal, and fresh manure. Hunt down your neighbors who have livestock: they might be very happy if you cart off their manure. When done amending your soil with the material you want to decompose during the winter, cover with about two inches of mulch such as chipped wood, leaves, ground prunings, etc.

If desired, you can first sow a cover crop before mulching. In spring, you will till the cover crop into the soil to add a source of nitrogen. All of the above applies to fruit trees as well. If you have nectarine or peach trees, it is time to spray when leaves have fallen and again in late winter. Use a dormant spray product to prevent peach leaf curl. Products containing copper applied with 1% horticulture spray oil increases effectiveness.

Fall is the best time to plant trees and shrubs. November is when you should sow wildflower seeds and plant bulbs. Direct seed bok choy, fava beans, garlic, lettuce, mustard, onions, peas, radishes and spinach.
