MOSQUITO FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT, (MFPD)

It shouldn't be a surprise to anyone that we are in for another drought year. The lack of rain will pose additional risk this summer for another fire incident. Last year, we all experienced first-hand how a major incident can impact our lives. Are you prepared? Have you considered: +100ft clearance, evacuation plan, emergency supplies, medical kit, water, Grab-n-Go overnight bag, pets & livestock?

Now for the elephant in the room, what's the status of hiring a new fire chief? It's one of the hottest topics in and near the district. Here's the scoop: the District has extended an offer to a qualified candidate and is working through all the pre-employment steps and logistics. It might seem simple on the surface, but there are a lot of details that need to be addressed. Rumor has it we are getting close to making an announcement and introducing our new Chief.

One of the hot topics at the last MFPD board meeting was our budget and financial projections. I can tell you that we have some work to do to look for ways to trim our expenditures and increase our revenues. On top of our regular income/expenses, we need to figure out how to replace our aging 197x water tender. Our first budget workshop is on March 28 at 9am. Watch the website (http://www.mfpd.us) or sign up for email notifications (info@mfpd.us) of meeting announcements. Workshops and regular

meetings are open to the public and your participation is encouraged.

It's your department and you can help. Volunteering is a great way to help to cut expenses and generate revenue. Not all volunteers respond to emergencies. Professional/trade services, community representative to committees and councils, grant procurement, and volunteer recruitment/retention are all ways to volunteer. Karen Pullin has taken a lead role in creating a new organization to help manage these efforts. Introducing: the Mosquito Station 75 Firefighters Association. One of the core values of the new organization is to give the firefighters a larger role and influence in district affairs. The new association will be looking for ways compliment, not displace, the other community organizations' activities and efforts. To dispel any rumors, the new organization is not affiliated with MFPD. The MFPD does not have any governing authority within the Mosquito Station Firefighters Association. We do share some common goals.

FROM SCPOA (SWANSBORO COUNTRY PROPERTY OWNER'S ASSOCIATION)

It's been a busy month for the Board and its committees. In late February six of the seven Directors participated in a very helpful orientation session with our attorney. Treasurer Jerry Pullin and I also met with our CPA, who confirmed the need for stronger controls over the Association's finances. The suggested controls were approved at our March 19 Board meeting.

One of the most pleasant experiences of this past month has been the extent of member involvement in our expanded committee structure! It is true that more people means it takes longer to decide, but it is also true that more alternatives are proposed and so the recommended actions have been well vetted. The committees are composed of newcomers and old timers in the community who range in age from their 20's to their 80's. There seems to be a very strong learning curve.

The Communications Committee recommended to the Board a review of all the required disclosures to members so we can be sure we are in compliance with The Davis Stirling Act. The Board agreed to do so. In the June mailing we will make a concerted effort to get as many members as possible to opt into receiving their SCPOA communications electronically. We currently spend around \$3.00 of each parcel assessment on our two mandatory mailings and would like to reduce that. The Board also was treated to a mockup of a proposed new website that would be more interactive and user friendly, and joyously gave their go ahead to a six month conversion process.

The Architectural Review Committee updated the Board on its modifications to the methods of identifying existing building permits within Association boundaries and the forms and procedures to be used in generating Association signoff for new construction (main structure and other buildings). They expect to bring their completed recommendations to the next Board meeting.

The Common Areas Committee recommended a controversial plan to either exercise its water rights with EID or to utilize its existing well to fill Dyer Lake by the start of the summer. The difficult and controversial part of this decision is the use of water for recreational purposes in the midst of our serious drought. The committee will do more homework to discover what, if any, effect use of the well might have on surrounding properties and will continue its discussion with EID. A third alternative, siphon some water from Trout Lake to Dver Lake will also be considered. That committee will also look at the possibility of creating a several miles long riding and hiking trail along some of the currently inaccessible common area. That committee will also begin the process of creating a long term forestry management program for some of the inaccessible common areas.

The Roads Committee recommended and the Board approved putting out a request for bids to complete all remaining roads and road segments within the association. We will seek costs for each section so if the total costs exceed our budgeted amount we will be able to set priorities. The request for bids will be posted on several bid web sites as well as sent to those companies who have previously bid and those in the local area in order to generate an expanded set of bidders. The bid package will be ready for distribution by the end of March and will include an expected completion date of July 31, 2015.

The Policies and Procedures Committee discussed its ongoing examination of current practices as a first step toward creating written documentation on how the Board does its work. They look forward to bringing proposals forth to the next Board meeting.

The Budget and Long Range Planning Committee recommended, and the Board approved, the restoration of the role of the Treasurer to that which is written in the bylaws. As a result we will begin to see some of the activities currently conducted by the Association Secretary shift to the Treasurer. In response to our CPA's advice that

the Board establish firmer control over its finances, the Board approved the creation of a Finance Committee (made up of the Treasurer and three members) to review and reconcile the monthly financial statements. The Board also authorized an expenditure for the purchase of Quick Books Pro and a computer system to be held by the Treasurer so we can begin the transition of responsibilities and also better align our system with that of our financial services support team.

Regarding the Airport Committee, I owe the community an apology. My intention was to use it to create a community wide discussion about the airport. That is why I sought the chair position. In the past month, I had begun reading the available documentation on the airport and seeking guidance and help from pilots with a long history in the community. I was impressed by what I perceived as their willingness to educate me and their willingness to serve on the committee. Five pilots had agreed to serve on the committee, and in speaking with some of them I mentioned I was going to seek "intelligent skeptics" to round out the committee. Apparently in my earnestness and in my choice of terms, I created unintentional resistance to the process and a belief among some of the pilots that involving "skeptics" could create an adversarial situation. The apparent flash point was having a non-pilot as the committee chair and so I stepped down as committee chair and Kim Purcell, a pilot, took over as the chair. I am sorry for generating the resistance. But when I look back at last year's survey results, and review the issues and concerns raised during the last election cycle, I remain committed to causing the discussion. As the specifics of that evolve, I will share them with you.

Yep, it has been a busy month! I would be remiss if I failed to give special thanks to our colleagues at MFPD and the fire station. We have asked for meeting space at an unprecedented clip and they have been gracious and supportive in meeting our every request. Thank you, thank you.
