Fire and Fall Injury Prevention in the Home

Each year, more than 1.6 million older Americans go to the emergency room for fall related injuries. Among older adults, falls are the number one cause of fractures and hospital admissions for trauma, loss of independence, and injury related deaths. Since January 1st, 2015, in the United States, there have been 1751 civilian fire related deaths with over 17,500 civilian fire related injuries recorded in 2011. Cooking is the leading cause of fire related injuries, and the leading cause of fire related death is smoking.

Americans age 65 and older are 2.5 times more likely to die in fires than the overall population, and as Americans age, their fire risk increases. Contributing factors to fires and falls include medications, hearing/vision loss, loss of strength, balance, and mobility. It is possible to reduce your risk by reviewing these tips and changing or modifying your behavior, habits, and environment:

Fall Prevention Tips

- Clear the way, and keep stairs and walking areas free of electrical and phone cords, shoes, clothing, books, magazines, and other clutter.
- Improve the lighting in your home by using nightlights to light the path between the bedroom and bathroom. Turn on the lights before using the stairs.
- Use nonslip mats in the bathtub and shower, and install grab bars on the wall next to the bathtub, shower, and toilet.
- Use only throw rugs with rubber, nonskid backing. Always smooth out wrinkles and folds in carpeting and rugs.

Fire Prevention Tips

- The number one cause of kitchen fires is cooking left unattended. NEVER leave stovetop cooking unattended.
- Wear tight, short, or rolled up sleeves while cooking, and never use loose or dangling clothing.
- Use oven mitts or potholders, and never use a dishtowel as a potholder.
- If a pan catches fire, slide a lid over it, turn off the burner, and call 9-1-1.
- In case of an oven or microwave fire, turn off the oven or microwave. Do not open the door. Call 9-1-1.
- Don't cook if you are drowsy from medication. Plan meals around your medications.
- Keep clutter and combustibles away from your stove.
- If your clothes catch fire, STOP, DROP, and ROLL, or smother the flames with a towel or a blanket.
- Test smoke alarms monthly; replace batteries at least once a year, and replace smoke alarms every 10 years.

As part of its effort to improve communications with members, the Board at its meeting on October 15th, 2015, allocated funds to publish up to six newsletters a year. Paper copies will be sent to all members who have not opted into receiving electronics communications. The newsletters will include all legally mandated communications as well as meeting notices, an events calendar, reports from committees and board meetings, fire safety communications, and other pertinent information. We hope to get our first issue to you in November.

Heather Loyola was selected by the Board to be its Secretary. As Secretary, she will provide supervision to our staff and so be our main liaison with the Management Trust, Kocal Division for all matters relating to records, minutes, and required corporate signatures. We appreciate Heather's willingness to take on this additional volunteer responsibility on behalf of our community.

At our Budget Committee meeting, we noted that with current expenditure rates and the add-ins of our management firm, salary adjustments, and the above projects, we will end the fiscal year - next February - with a healthy operating budget surplus. Many thanks go out to our Treasurer, Jerry Pullin, and the Finance Committee - Heather Loyola, Barb Mikel and Barb Beacham - for their attention to and care of Association finances.

Your Board also approved a letter to be sent to the County Department of Transportation requesting improved signage notifying truck drivers of the limits on our bridge. Our hope is such signage might help decrease the damage done to the bridge and the delays caused to residents.

We will also put out a request for proposal and move in a timely manner to select a vendor to spray the ditch lines along our roads to control weeds that cause damage to the roads. As a part of that request, we will also begin a long term program to control the starthistle growth at Dyer and Trout lakes, which will allow the regrowth of native grasses. The first application of pesticide should occur shortly after the first rains. So moving quickly with the proposal is critical.

The Board also approved establishing a Dogwood Trail Volunteer Cleanup Project. Under the direction of our maintenance staff, volunteers will make the trail that parallels Dogwood Drive more accessible to community members. If interested in helping, please contact Kevin or Jonathan.

While on the subject, let me end with praise for our maintenance staff, Jonathan and Kevin. They have taken full advantage of the drought conditions to improve our lakes. Twin Ponds is transformed! Enough sand has been removed from Dyer Lake to not only expand the beach area there but to also transfer a load to building up the sandy area at Catfish Lake. We loved the October 17th storm and look forward to an El Nino winter!

These requirements primarily call for fish and wildlife monitoring (you'll see more on this in another article in this Byte) to ensure the health of the habitat for years to come. Recently, it appeared that a mating pair of Bald Eagles may consider making Finnion Lake home. A wet winter and spring will help the habitat immensely.
