

### National Preparedness System (NPS)



Wise Oak Consulting helps tribes with all six NPS elements:

- Identifying and Assessing Risk: <u>Threat and Hazard</u>
   <u>Identification and Risk Assessment (THIRA)</u>
- Estimating Capability Requirements: <u>Stakeholder</u>
   <u>Preparedness Review</u>
- Building and Sustaining Capabilities: <u>Tribal Homeland</u>
   <u>Security Grant Program</u> applications
- Planning to Deliver Capabilities: <u>Emergency Operations</u>

### Fiscal Year 2023 THSGP Highlights

- Objective: Strengthen capacity to prevent, prepare for, protect against, respond to potential terrorist attacks
- Priorities to address in FY 2023
  - Enhancing cybersecurity
  - Enhancing the protection of soft targets / crowded places
  - o Enhancing information & intelligence sharing
  - o Combating domestic violent extremism
  - Enhancing community preparedness
  - Enhancing election security
- Supplemental guidance: <u>Preparedness Grant Manual</u>
- Supplemental guidance: 2023-2026 FEMA Strategic

## FY 2023 THSGP Project Focus & Priorities

- Focus
  - o Information sharing & collaboration
  - o Build culture of preparedness
  - o Protect against terrorism & other threats
- First-tier priorities
  - o Final scores increased by a 20% multiplier
  - Cybersecurity; soft targets; domestic violent extremism; community prep; election security
- Second-tier enduring priorities
  - Planning; training & awareness; equipment & capital projects; exercises
- Gaps identified in THIRA/SPR

## FY 2023 THSGP

### The basics



- \$15 million in total grant funding nationally
- 36-month period of performance (PoP): 9/1/2023 8/31/2026
- Application due May 18, 2023, 5:00 p.m. ET-ND grants time stamp
- Initial Application in Grants.gov February 27, 2023
- Anticipated Funding Selection Date: No later than July 21, 2023
- Anticipated Award Date: No later than September 30, 2023
- No cost share or match!
- Application forms and instructions are available on Grants.gov
- The registration process can take up to four weeks to complete.
- Multistep process
  - 1. Apply for, update, or verify Unique Entity Identifier (UEI) Number no more DUNS Number
  - 2. Update or verify System for Award Management (SAM) Registration;
  - 3. Establish an Authorized Organizational Representative (AOR) in Grants.gov;
  - 4. Submit an initial application in Grants.gov (preferably by May 15, 2023; and
  - 5. Submit the final application in the ND Grants system.

Note: Applicants are encouraged to submit their initial application in Grants.gov at least seven days before May 11, 2023

#### Who may apply?

Federally Recognized Tribes that	Criteria
Meet <b>ALL</b> 3 criteria	Located in the Continental United States
	Operate a law enforcement or emergency response agency with the capacity to
	respond to calls
	Tribal certification that the State has not provided Homeland Security Grant
	Program funds for the same purpose as the tribal submission
Also meet ONE of these criteria	Located within 100 miles of an international border or international waters
	Located within 10 miles (or have on tribal land) of prioritized critical
	infrastructure
	Located within or contiguous to one of the 50 most populous metropolitan
	statistical areas
	Contain 1,000 square miles of Indian country

Note: A consortium of Indian Tribes may also be eligible if each Tribe satisfies the requirements



### Additional requirements



- Implement the National Incident Management System (NIMS)
- Submit a Threat and Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment (THIRA)
- Submit a Stakeholder Preparedness Review (SPR)
- Submit an Emergency Operations Plan (EOP) during the Period of Performance
- Have a current multi-year Integrated Preparedness Plan (IPP)
- Environmental Planning and Historic Preservation (EHP) Compliance

## Opportunities / Tips

- Think in terms of capabilities in the five mission areas Prevent, Protect, Mitigate, Respond, Recover
- Link projects Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) funding priorities
  - o Cybersecurity risk assessments, infrastructure, training and exercises
  - o Soft targets / crowded places cameras, screening equipment, lighting, access controls, physical barriers
  - o Information and intelligence sharing and analysis identify assess and report threats of violence
  - Combating domestic violent extremism open-source analysis, information sharing, threat assessments, training and awareness
  - Enhancing community preparedness Community Emergency Response Teams (CERT); emergency communications such as the Integrated Public Alert & Warning System (IPAWS); youth preparedness; continuity training; financial resilience planning; tribal community planning
  - Enhancing election security Physical security cyber security; security planning
- Link projects to NOFO second-tier enduring priorities
  - o Planning security risk management plans; COOP plans; response plans
  - Training & exercises active shooter; security training for employees; public awareness / preparedness campaigns
  - Equipment & capital projects protect high-risk, high consequence areas identified in risk assessment; physical security; cameras; screening; lighting; access control; fencing and barriers; WMD; CBRNE
    - 21 allowable categories and equipment standards in the <u>Authorized Equipment List (AEL)</u>
  - Exercises response exercises
- THIRAs and SPRs are eligible projects
