The new year rang in and that did not slow anything down here at Calvary. We welcomed Interim Pastor Jared to help guide us through this time of hardship and to continue the ministry of being disciples of Jesus. Council members whose terms ended had their last meeting and continued to work on preparing for the annual meeting. We had to say goodbye to some loved ones and friends but also got to watch little ones get baptized. We had five families become new members. Book clubs were well attended as they discussed what they read. The Unforgettables began practice again, and they had some new singers as well. What a time to be at Calvary. What's next? We ask ourselves how we are altered by the spirit. Lent is often a time of self-reflection, spiritual discipline, commitment, and community. Congregations gather to sing the minor harmonies of the way of Jesus on the road toward the cross. This Lent we are going to look at a kaleidoscope of stories from the book of Acts, with Revised Common Lectionary suggestions that pair directly with the theme *Altered by the Spirit*. We'll see the ways the Spirit alters our perspective, transforms our community, and consistently blazes a trail ahead of us.

# A NOTE FROM PASTOR JARED: "LOVE, LOVE, LOVE"



I have officiated and solemnized enough marriages to know that there are good readings in the Bible about love. And at those blissful moments of marriage, the feeling of love can be so palpable for the happy couple, their families, friends, and all others who are invited to celebrate with them. In the month of February, when many people will have their mind fixated on the love between two people, I want to draw your attention to the love of God



for us and through us to the world. It is this love from God that we strive to communicate and articulate in the community of faith through the proclamation of the Gospel. The love of the Gospel we proclaim is demonstrated throughout scripture, and most assuredly in the witness to the life of Jesus.

In a reflection on first century life, the apostle Paul in the letter to the Colossians, warns the community of faith against following human-made regulations, which merely have the appearance of wisdom (2:6-23) and at the same time urges them not to conform to the culture, but to be utterly distinct from the world around them (3:1-10). Paul urges them, and by extension us, to put aside or rid ourselves of old patterns of living. Embrace a new alternative way of living that is for all people, "Greeks or Jews, circumcised or uncircumcised, barbarian, Scythian, slave, or free, but Christ is all, and is in all."(3:11) And Paul describes this alternative way of living in the world as an action of "clothing" those who are "holy and dearly loved" with virtues. For Paul, God clothes the people with virtues of "compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience," bearing with one another and forgiving whatever grievances are held against others (3:12-13). And the virtue supreme, for the people of God to "put on" above all other virtues, is love. For it is love that "binds all of them together in perfect unity" (3:14).

In the Gospel according to John, Jesus is reported saying, "As the Father, has loved me, so have I loved you. Now remain in my love" (15:9). Jesus goes on to talk about obedience to his commands as the demonstration that his disciples are remaining in his love. Living obediently to Christ's commands might even be described as an alternate way of living, that might reflect the virtues that Paul outlined in his letter. For Jesus, "Greater love has no one than this, that [they] lay down [their] life for [their] friends" (15:13). For your consideration, I suggest that Jesus binds a virtue of self-giving to the virtue of love, through his ministry, suffering, passion, death, and resurrection.

While the Beatles were not specifically writing for a Christian audience with their song, "All You Need Is Love", the sentiment rings true. For a Christian community, it is the conviction that God is the source of love that enlivens and animates our lives. We are freed in Christ to love God, to love ourselves, and love others. This message about love and its source might resonate with people who have stayed away from church, as we practice the virtue of self-giving love which binds all other virtues together. Love, Love, Love...Love is all we need. The love of God is all we need.

#### **FINANCE - 2024 FINANCE REPORT**

December's giving was considerably lower than the prior year, but expenses were also a bit lower. A goal achieved in 2023 was the ability to fulfill the benevolences to local nonprofits and the synod. This goal was achieved after moving the mortgage interest out of the general budget into the building expansion fund as well as using some funds given for missions. In 2022, benevolences were not able to be funded fully, so we are thankful for the opportunity to fulfill this yearly goal.

The calendar at Calvary in December was filled with activities for all. Some of the special annual events held in December were the Thursday Music Club Christmas Musicale, Unforgettables Choir concert, Christmas Cheer, Sunday and Wednesday School children telling the Christmas story, Christmas Cookie Exchange and a Quiet Christmas worship service. On December 17, we welcomed Pastor Jared Carson as our interim pastor. Noisy offering for the last seven weeks of the year was collected for the Angel Tree gifts in the amount of \$2,583.77.

Year-to-date income was 4.9% lower than the five-year average, while expenses ended the year 5.5% lower for the same time period. As we look to the future, please continue to pray for the members of Calvary to continue to make the conscious effort to support Calvary in the ways in which they are called to be members.

- What is our in-office vs remote work policy?
- What is the approval process for staff schedules, remote work and vacation request?

#### HIstory of SOUPer Bowl of Caring came to be.

In 1990, a simple prayer: "Lord, even as we enjoy the Super Bowl football game, help us be mindful of those who are without a bowl of soup to eat" was delivered to a small youth group at Spring Valley Presbyterian Church in Columbia, SC, led by Brad Smith, who was serving as a seminary intern at the time.

This gave birth to an idea. Why not harness the energy and enthusiasm of Super Bowl weekend, a time when people come together for football, food and fun, to unite the nation for a higher good? Individuals and groups could collect dollars in soup pots and canned food for those in need and send every dollar and food donation DIRECTLY to a local charity of THEIR choice.

The first year, Tackle Hunger invited 22 area churches to join the team and collected \$5,700 with 100% of donations distributed to local area charities.

Since then, Tackle Hunger, with its signature Souper Bowl of Caring event has become a national, grass-roots, youth-inspired movement where ordinary people are doing extraordinary good. Over \$193 MILLION in dollars and food has been generated while benefiting thousands of soup kitchens, food banks, meal programs and other hunger-relief charities in local communities.

Thousands of participants including: churches, schools, youth groups, community partners, grocery partners, local businesses, media partners, NFL teams and passionate individuals have experienced for themselves, the joy and satisfaction of giving, serving and inspiring people across the country to follow their generous example.

#### What is SOUPer Bowl of Caring?

Each year, Tackle Hunger rallies participants by using the excitement of the Big Game with the Souper Bowl of Caring! Empowering communities to host their own donation drives to benefit a local food charity and inspiring a nationwide movement to make a difference!

#### What is Calvary doing to participate?

Calvary will be participating in the SOUPer Bowl of Caring and all donations will be shared with the local food pantry. On Super Bowl Sunday, bring nonperishable food items or monetary donations to worship. You will be able to "vote" for the team that you would like to win the Super Bowl by placing your donations on that side of the table display. We'll see who Calvary wants to win this year's big game! Together we can tackle hunger in Grand Forks!

One such instance is the story of a teacher from a small nearby school district who was on the search for prom dresses for her students who typically can't afford the cost of a dress. She was able to find many dresses and was willing to pay for them out of her own pocket, but the rummage sale volunteer just gave them to her. The teacher was moved to tears and said Calvary was the only place she'd looked that was willing to be that generous. Another is the story of a wonderful lady who was finding home décor, housewares, and linens in order to help people who were moving into independent living apartments to make their new homes more comfortable and warm. Yet another is a man who comes every year to find linens, towels, and housewares for nursing home residents who might not be able to afford those items.

It's wonderful to see young moms and dads walk out with bags of like-new clothes and toys for their kids. It brings a smile to the face of the volunteer who helps children pick out a favorite book or toy and be able to pay for it with their own money.

Another positive aspect is the community that is built when people come for coffee, caramel rolls, lunch, and treats and spend time sitting in conversation with old friends and new acquaintances.

At the end of the day, the donations that haven't been sold are then donated to the local mission and thrift stores to further help people in our community.

In our prayer before the opening of the sale, we asked for help remembering that in our work, we are not only the face of Calvary, but also the hands and feet of Christ. It takes many volunteers, hours of organization, and lots of muscle to make this happen, but it is truly a labor of love that reaches far beyond the walls of our building.

2 breakfast & lunch items


2 fruit items


