Take the Faster Internet Oregon speed test!

The Faster Internet Oregon speed test campaign is a statewide broadband mapping effort for Oregonians to report Internet speeds or a lack of connection at home.

The Faster Internet Oregon project will provide decision-makers with data that will:

- Identify Oregon homes that lack high-speed Internet;
- Clarify which households don't have an Internet connection and why;
- Provide cost estimates and assess competitive viability of a variety of technical solutions for areas with identified gaps.

This campaign will help secure infrastructure funding across the state and ensure the funding is equitably allocated so that everyone has access to fast, affordable Internet service.

The Board of Commissioners sponsored a 2018 assessment that looked at all aspects of the justice system from first encounter with law enforcement to court, jail and release back to the community. We learned that our system had adapted to cope with the smallest jail per capita of any Oregon County. Officers cite many people in the field and never book them and deputies are forced to release others from jail early. The space squeeze also eliminated any mental health, substance use or other educational programming from the jail. We chose a solution that increases preventative treatment and increases accountability for crimes committed.

Phase 1 includes a Mental Health Crisis Center (Corvallis) and a new Courthouse with District Attorney's Office, funded by county, state, and federal dollars.

Phase 2 is on the ballot on May 16th. We chose to locate all community safety facilities on a single site with the new Courthouse (north of downtown Corvallis) to minimize operational costs. The \$110 million bond measure will:

• Co-locate the Sheriff's Office with the jail to provide operational efficiency and staffing back-up for both Patrol and Corrections.

- Provide up to 120 beds in a jail with spaces to handle the needs of adults in custody, with mental health, wellness, and educational support.
- Expand Children & Families Mental Health services to provide crisis and routine care to children and youth investing up front in healthy families.
- Co-fund a homelessness navigation center in Corvallis, creating a one-stop resource center providing vital services and shelter to unhoused community members.
- Provide an Emergency Operations Center with essential communications tech and meeting space to serve all county residents in the event of wildfire, floods, & other emergencies, as well as for regular training needs.

With this investment, we will be able to hold offenders accountable for their offenses locally, rather than transporting them to Dallas or The Dalles. We will have more room, so law enforcement no longer has to cite people in the field and cross fingers that they will appear in court for their hearings. And we will help people with mental health and housing needs up front, so they are less likely to become involved in our legal system. What is Firewise? Residents Reducing Wildfire Risk

Firewise is a national program helping residents reduce wildfire risks.

Communities like ours join Firewise by forming a local committee to help neighbors learn the best ways to protect against wildfire. None of us is alone in this. Lowering the risk for ourselves lowers the risks for our neighbors as well.

How does Firewise help? Firewise helps by providing information. They provide pamphlets, videos, checklists, and a vast amount of material on their website at: www.nfpa.org/Public-Education/Fire-causes-and-risks/Wildfire/Firewise-USA. Firewise information includes things you can do when building a new home or changing your landscape design, and simple things every resident can do around their home and yard on a regular basis, including the latest "lessons learned" from

the most recent Oregon fires. It provides information about how to plan for your livestock, your pets, and how to get your kids involved.

What is happening in Oregon? In

Oregon, the State put wildfire front and center in its funding priorities. The State's goal is to help individuals and communities be prepared. The State sees the existence of Firewise Communities as a way to help meet that need. The State targets some funding for Firewise Communities because those communities are working toward the same goals. State funds already helped individuals here.

What is happening here? The South Benton Firewise Community got started just before the pandemic. The community is officially recognized by the national
