

Baptism and Birth Records in the UK



A baptism record is a any type of record or certificate that states the date and place an individual was baptised into a church. These records are available from 1536 onwards, and are recorded in <u>Parish Registers</u>. They are an invaluable resource for researching your family tree because the census and efficial records of birth, marriage and death do not go back further than 1537.

Until 1813, the amount of information given is very basic. This included:

Child's name
Father's name
Church/Parish where baptised
Date

If an illegitimate child was baptised, then the mother's name would be stated, with the word 'illegitimate' or similar in the margin.

Baptism Records after 1813

in 1913, a new pre-grieted parish baptism record book was introduced and because of this, entries became more standardised. However, there was still no information recorded about the date of birth, although some Clergymen added this information, especially where the baptisms was for

- Ragister entry number
 When Baptised
 Child's name
 Parents name
 Abode
 Quality, Trade or Profession
 By whom the ceremony was performed
- For records after 1837, you will have to look at Birth Records
