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### SECTION 4) FIRST-AID MEASURES

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#### Inhalation

#### Unsuitable Extinguishing Media

#### Specific Hazards in Case of Fire

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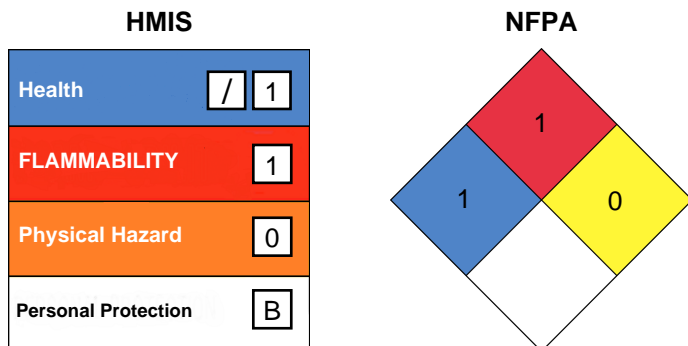
