Listening Deeply to the Prophets

This summer we are following an alternative pattern for our readings in worship in order to listen and learn from prophetic teachers in our tradition. Each week we will hear from Luke's Gospel and then from one of the Hebrew Bible prophets - Elijah, Elisha, Amos, Hosea, Isaiah, and Jeremiah. Through faithful reading, preaching, and listening deeply to the prophets we pray that we will grow in understanding how we can convey God's hope and grace found in Christ through the Holy Spirit.

Overview of Today's Scripture

This week's readings in our series on the prophets contrast what it means to welcome or to disregard God's gracious ways. Luke surprises us with a Pharisee who welcomes Jesus to his table. What may surprise us even more are Jesus' teachings there of gospel table manners. Jeremiah takes poetic flight on Israel's disregard of the Holy One. The God who brought life and land is cast aside for idols as impotent and worthless as cracked cisterns that can hold no water.



*PRAYER OF THE DAY

FIRST READING Luke 14:1,7-14

Our first reading is from Luke.

The gospels frequently tell stories where Jesus and Pharisees are at odds. In truth, Jesus had far more in common with Pharisees than with groups like the Sadducees or Zealots or Essenes. Our reading opens with a leader of the Pharisees hosting Jesus in his home for a meal. Jesus accepts his hospitality. But as places are taken by other guests, the dinner table becomes a teaching table. Jesus instructs guests and host alike in the table manners of humility and grace.

¹On one occasion when Jesus was going to the house of a leader of the Pharisees to eat a meal on the Sabbath, they were watching him closely.

⁷ When he noticed how the guests chose the places of honor, he told them a parable. ⁸ "When you are invited by someone to a wedding banquet, do not sit down at the place of honor, in case someone more distinguished than you has been invited by your host, ⁹ and the host who invited both of you may come and say to you, 'Give this person your place,' and then in disgrace you would start to take the lowest place. ¹⁰ But when you are invited, go and sit down at the lowest place, so that when your host comes, he may say to you, 'Friend, move up higher'; then you will be honored in the presence of all who sit at the table with you. ¹¹ For all who exalt themselves will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be exalted."

¹² He said also to the one who had invited him, "When you give a luncheon or a dinner, do not invite your friends or your brothers and sisters or your relatives or rich neighbors, in case they may invite you in return, and you would be repaid. ¹³ But when you give a banquet, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, and the blind. ¹⁴ And you will be blessed because they cannot repay you, for you will be repaid at the resurrection of the righteous."

Word of God, word of life.

SECOND READING Jeremiah 2:4-13

Prophets often employ the language of poetry. Their poetry seeks to stir imaginations with word patterns and metaphors to evoke fresh ways of hearing what is holy in life. And, what is unholy. In today's reading, the word "land" occurs six times in two verses to underscore its regression from God's gift to Israel's forfeit. Jeremiah concludes with a metaphor for what results from forgetting God in order to chase after idols: "cracked cisterns that hold no water." That was not true in a literal sense. The land of Israel was not then pocked with unusable tanks to store water. Rather, the phrase conveys the bitter truth of what Israel chose in place of covenant with God.

⁴ Hear the word of the Lord, O house of Jacob, and all the families of the house of Israel.

⁵ Thus says the Lord:

What wrong did your ancestors find in me that they went far from me

and went after worthless things and became worthless themselves?

⁶ They did not say, "Where is the Lord, who brought us up from the land of Egypt, who led us in the wilderness, in a land of deserts and pits, in a land of drought and deep darkness, in a land that no one passes through, where no one lives?"

⁷ I brought you into a plentiful land to eat its fruits and its good things. But when you entered you defiled my land and made my heritage an abomination. ⁸ The priests did not say, "Where is the Lord?" Those who handle the law did not know me; the rulers transgressed against me; the prophets prophesied by Baal and went after things that do not profit.

⁹ Therefore once more I accuse you, says the Lord, and I accuse your children's children. ¹⁰ Cross to the coasts of Cyprus and look; send to Kedar and examine with care: see if there has ever been such a thing. ¹¹ Has a nation changed its gods, even though they are no gods? But my people have changed their glory for something that does not profit. ¹² Be appalled, O heavens, at this; be shocked; be utterly desolate, says the Lord, ¹³ for my people have committed two evils: they have forsaken me, the fountain of living water, and dug out cisterns for themselves. cracked cisterns that can hold no water.




