



(An adaptation of my Easter Day sermon, from Luke 24:1-12)

Mary Magdalene, Joanna, Mary, and some other number of unnamed women who went to the tomb in search of the body of Jesus returned with empty hands, but filled with a calling: Remember, Go, Tell. The women go to the tomb on the first day expecting death, having prepared spices to anoint a dead body. Instead of the dead body of their beloved teacher, they find two messengers so full of life they shine.

Staring into the empty tomb can be a first step to rediscovering life. What living stories of hope do you remember? Who will you go to and how will you tell the story?

As followers of Christ, we are taught mercy, humility, and care for the most vulnerable. We are called to join God in the world responding to suffering, bringing healing and reconciliation, loving our neighbor and welcoming the stranger.

Right now, we see the opposite happening everywhere around us. There are people telling upside down stories about Jesus, even as they seize the highest places of power in our nation. We are witnessing the rapid growth of a regime that falsely uses Christian words and symbols to cause harm and destruction to God's creation. Those telling this lie turn Christian teaching upside down by attacking vulnerable people. Cutting off lifesaving medication and food from those in need. Acting as if the Earth is humankind's playground.

Too often Christians have been silent or absent in times of national crisis. If it were up to me, I might stay quiet or just talk with those I know who have seen what I have. But in this season of Easter, God's messengers meet us at the seemingly hopeless and empty tomb to fill us with courage and purpose, sent with a clear message: Christian people, the true story of God's love in Jesus Christ must be told.

Remember, go, tell – even if people think you are full of nonsense, even if they won't listen at first. Grounded in God's hope, **remember** the love you have received from Jesus, **go** to those who need stories of life, **tell** all about the way of Jesus – love, mercy, and forgiveness. Remember, go, tell.

Secretary May 2025

We started this month's meeting with a pot luck meal, to share time together and to say farewell to Council member Paige Marty. Paige and Michael Marty will be leaving in the next month for their new home in Austin, Texas. We wish them well and are grateful to both Paige and Michael for their generous service to the OSLC Community. We will miss them.

The Property Committee report had some good and not so good news. The good news was that the Rain Garden Project has been completed. Council thanks the volunteers, both outside and inside, who participated in the work day on April 12. The newly placed plants are being tenderly cared for while we wait for the rains to arrive. On the not so good side, unfortunately one of the two central HVAC units that service the main Sanctuary has failed. The cost to repair the unit was \$27,000 and the cost to replace with a new unit was \$32,000. Given the small differential and the age of the existing unit, it was recommended that a new unit be installed. Council unanimously approved this expenditure. The company doing

the work, will salvage usable parts from the unit being replaced for potential use in repair of the remaining unit at some future point.

Plans for the 80th Anniversary celebration are moving ahead and the date has been set for Saturday, October 25. A planning committee has been formed consisting of Patty Sirlis, Jennifer Strand, and Mary Lou Forier and initial plans are in the works. If you are interested in working on this event, please contact one of the committee members.

Following Greta's recital on May 4th a brunch will be served. It was recommended that the brunch be partially catered. This will allow those who typically volunteer to provide and serve food, to fully enjoy the concert, rather than be in the kitchen. There was a consensus among Council members to approve funds for this purpose.

With Paige's departure, Council will make an appointment of an individual to serve out her remaining term. If you might be interested in serving on Council, please talk to Pastor Amalia or Council President Patty Sirls.

Discipleship at OSLC - Pastor Glenn Schrader

May 2025



Paul's Letters to the Corinthians reveal a tension that centers on the challenges of discipleship when Christians are living in a society and culture that are contrary to

the teachings of Jesus. At times Paul seems rather "bull-headed" in his appeals to this "wounded" congregation to change their ways; at other times he seems genuinely pastoral in his concern that the church simply reflects the standards of the Greco-Roman hierarchy that seem inescapable. But Paul, raised as a devout Jew, doesn't want to turn the people back to the Jewish law either because he now sees that it separated him from God and brought him death.

What is generally accepted in society as good or bad and what our conscience approves or disapproves function in the same way. A "written code" that we are supposed to keep - regardless of who writes it – brings the danger that our attention is taken up with our success and failure in keeping it (although this can also occur with a "code" that is unwritten but is a societal "given"). Such things become "standards" against which to measure ourselves as successes or failures. Behind such "measuring" lies a selfish desire to rule our own lives and assert our independence from God by winning our own salvation. As God's reconciled children, our living must come not from some code of behavior authored by humans but rather from God whose Spirit "gives life" in Christ Jesus.

Come & See is a weekly gathering of members of OSLC who are exploring faith and life through Bible studies and other readings. Since January, we have been focusing on Paul's Letters to the Corinthians which address the challenges, opportunities, and blessings of

this early Christian community. We examine Scripture together through conversation and discover many relationships to the context of OSLC and our daily ministries. As you may have noticed, there is now a small table in the narthex (just to the left as you enter the church) with materials about Youth On Their Own (YOTO) on it and a bin below it. This is an opportunity for you to donate food/household/personal hygiene items for teenagers who have no parent or legal guardian. As items are donated in the bin, I will deliver them to the YOTO site. A list of specific items that are currently needed is found on the table and will be updated from time to time. A more current list of items can be taken directly from the website, yoto.org. As of the date of this paragraph, the items most in need are

Food:

- Individually packaged snacks (chips, granola bars, trail mix, fruit snacks, jerky, etc.)
- Mac and cheese cups
- Ramen cups & pouches
- Dry pasta
- Pasta sauce (no glass please!)
- Canned fruit
- Shelf stable milk dairy and non-dairy

Hygiene:

- Toilet paper
- Body wash
- Shampoo (full-sized)
- Conditioner (full-sized)
- Face wash
- Shaving cream
- Chapstick
- Toothbrushes

Linens/Household:

- Full size bath towels (new only please!)
- Pillows (new only please!)
- Paper towels
- Multipurpose cleaner
- Toilet cleaner

TIHAN News: Poz Café is coming in June

May

As many of you know, Our Saviour's Lutheran Church supports Tucsonans living with HIV/AIDS through TIHAN (the Tucson Interfaith HIV/AIDS Network). Most of the people served by TIHAN (referred to as CarePartners) are socially isolated due to the stigma of HIV/AIDS and disa-



bility, and many are also low income and qualify for the federal Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, formerly known as "food stamps". Many CarePartners struggle to afford personal hygiene and household products which cannot be obtained through the federal program. Monthly POZ Cafes provide CarePartners with a hot lunch, an opportunity to socialize in a safe and accepting setting, play bingo to win prizes such as gift cards and household necessities, and receive a care package containing necessities they might not otherwise afford. As a CarePartner explained to us at a recent worship service, these items provide "a shred of dignity" to someone living in poverty.

Our congregation is co-hosting the Poz Café to be held on Thursday, June 19, 2025 in the OSLC Activity Building. Please note that this day is Juneteenth, a Federal holiday.

As a host congregation, OSLC has been asked to provide 120 each of the following items for the June care packages:

- Facial Tissue in the small cube boxes of 50 to 100 tissues, any brand
- Full-size shampoo in 12-32 oz bottles (no conditioner please)
- Disposable razors- multiple packs are ok
- No time to shop? We will gladly accept cash gifts to purchase needed items!

There will be a table on the patio on Sundays to collect your donations, or you can bring them to the church office Monday through Thursday during normal business hours. All items are needed by Monday, June 16th.

We also need a few volunteers to help with the Poz Café on June 19th:

- One person from 8-9:30 am to make the care packages.
- Up to 6 volunteers from 9:30 am to 1:30 pm to set up tables and chairs in the AB, help serve meals, clear tables, distribute care packages, put away tables and chairs, and clean up the meeting room and kitchen areas.
- We may be able to assign less active duties which can be done seated. Please let Mary know if you would like to explore this option.
- If you are unavailable June 19th but would still like to help, we are also seeking a volunteer on Friday, June 27th to help hand out care packages to CarePartners who couldn't get to the luncheon. This shift will require sitting and standing in a shaded area outdoors from 11:30 am to 2:30 pm at the Cornerstone Fellowship Church near North First Ave. and Glenn St.

"Par Saviour's" and ELCA Seminarians Win Again!

On March 17, the 2025 Ken Ahlstrand Fund for Leaders in Ministry (FLIM) Golf Classic was held at Oro Valley Country Club. This annual golf fundraiser brings 120 golfers on teams from over a dozen ELCA congregations in the Grand Canyon Synod for a fun day in the sun. Nearly \$20,000 was raised at the event to support the ELCA Fund for Leaders scholarship fund that provides scholarships to seminary students so that those recipients will not begin serving as a pastor of a congregation with indebtedness for their education.

And, for the third year in a row, Our Saviour's team, or, Par Saviour's as they prefer to be called, is bringing home a trophy once again! The team of Jeanne Gacke, Jim Phillips, Susan Sommerfeld and David Lester brought home the Mixed Team Trophy for the third consecutive year. Par Saviour's shot a sizzling 7 under par, beating the second-place team by 8 strokes. Team captain, David Lester, attributed the team's win to Jim Phillip's driver, Jeanne Gacke's short game and Susan Sommerfeld's unique celebrations of team birdies.

More information for next year's event will be shared with the congregation next February and learn about ways both golfers and non-golfers can contribute to this important event. Each year a select number of ELCA seminarians receive funds through these scholarships totaling over \$3 million annually. Pastor Amalia was a recipient of a full-ride Fund for Leaders scholarship to attend Wartburg Seminary in Dubuque, lowa. Current seminarian and Our Saviour's member Melanie Bowman has also received a Fund for Leaders scholarship.


