Listening Deeply to the Prophets

This summer we are following an alternative pattern for our readings in worship in order to listen and learn from prophetic teachers in our tradition. Each week we will hear from Luke's Gospel and then from one of the Hebrew Bible prophets - Elijah, Elisha, Amos, Hosea, Isaiah, and Jeremiah. Through faithful reading, preaching, and listening deeply to the prophets we pray that we will grow in understanding how we can convey God's hope and grace found in Christ through the Holy Spirit.

Overview of Today's Scripture

This week's readings in our series on the prophets testify that holy callings can stir both conflict and healing. Luke reports on one of many healings on the Sabbath by Jesus. Conflict results as legalism and liberation collide. Jeremiah describes his call from God to serve as a prophet. The terms of that call preview the collision of judgment and hope in the ministry of Jeremiah.



*PRAYER OF THE DAY

FIRST READING Luke 13:10-17

Our first reading is from Luke.

This is one of several stories where Jesus heals on the Sabbath. Most lead to conflict, as happens here. Disapproval of Sabbath healing is not the view of all Jews, then or now. New Testament scholar Dr. Amy-Jill Levine warns against such biased assumptions. In our passage, neither Judaism nor Sabbath keeping is the problem. The problem is religious legalism that forgets the purpose of covenant with God: to restore life, to do good.

¹⁰ Now [Jesus] was teaching in one of the synagogues on the Sabbath. ¹¹ And just then there appeared a woman with a spirit that had crippled her for eighteen years. She was bent over and was quite unable to stand up straight. ¹² When Jesus saw her, he called her over and said, "Woman, you are set free from your ailment." ¹³ When he laid his hands on her, immediately she stood up straight and began praising God. ¹⁴ But the leader of the synagogue, indignant because Jesus had cured on the Sabbath, kept saying to the crowd, "There are six days on which work ought to be done; come on those days and be cured and not on the Sabbath day." ¹⁵ But the Lord answered him and said, "You hypocrites! Does not each of you on the Sabbath untie his ox or his donkey from the manger and lead it to water? ¹⁶ And ought not this woman, a daughter of Abraham whom Satan bound for eighteen long years, be set free from this bondage on the Sabbath day?" ¹⁷ When he said this, all his opponents were put to shame, and the entire crowd was rejoicing at all the wonderful things being done by him.

Word of God, word of life.

SECOND READING Jeremiah 1:4-10

Our sermon text is from the Old Testament book of the prophet Jeremiah.

This account of God's calling of Jeremiah begins the book bearing the prophet's name. Its structure follows other Old Testament call stories. The call is initiated by God, not the one chosen. The first response of the one called is resistance. Next comes a physical experience of call, similar to a rite of ordination. At the end comes the terms of call. Those terms here reveal that judgment and hope, conflict and courage, will stamp Jeremiah's ministry and life.

Hear God's call and commissioning of the prophet Jeremiah in chapter 1, starting at verse 4

⁵ "Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, and before you were born I consecrated you;

I appointed you a prophet to the nations."

⁶ Then I said, "Ah, Lord God! Truly I do not know how to speak, for I am only a boy." ⁷ But the Lord said to me.

"Do not say, 'I am only a boy,'

for you shall go to all to whom I send you, and you shall speak whatever I command you.

⁸ Do not be afraid of them,

for I am with you to deliver you,

says the Lord."


⁹ Then the Lord put out his hand and touched my mouth, and the Lord said to me, "Now I have put my words in your mouth.
