Council Corner - Ted Adams, Secretary

We welcomed to the Council Shelly Adrian. Shelly will be filling the seat vacated by Paige Marty.

The Treasurer's report shows that we continue to be in good financial shape. As of the end of June our giving was slightly ahead of the proposed budget. Overall income and expenses are also tracking very closely to the budget with income slightly above expenses.

It appears to be our year for AC repairs. The units above the Annex apartment and the Ramada Room were leaking and doing damage to the roof. To repair the roof, the AC units must be disconnected and moved. After careful examination, it was recommended that due to the age of the units and the cost to repair, it would be more prudent to replace the units. . We received a competitive quote for using heat pumps, which are more efficient and reduce energy use. The Council voted unanimously to approve the funds to replace rather than repair. We will explore to see if these more efficient units are eligible for an energy credit. The roof repairs will also be completed prior to placement of the new units.

Pastor Amalia reported that the outreach to gain more volunteers to support our altar care has been successful. Thanks to those who have stepped forward. More are encouraged to sign up on the sheet located in the narthex. There was also a very good response to both the Brunch Event and the Last Supper Club, which attracted 15 attendees.

Interviews for an accompanist have been concluded and a decision made. An offer letter has been sent and once formally accepted the candidate will be announced to Congregation. In the interim, music arrangements have been made through the end of August.

Planning for the 80th Anniversary event is pushing ahead. The committee is meeting weekly and the program for the day is shaping up nicely. In addition to the presentation portion of the program there will be a catered luncheon following. Anyone interested in assisting with the event planning should contact talk to Patty Sirls, Jennifer Strand, or Mary Lou Forier.

Pastor Glenn joined the Council meeting in person to share updates.

Bonn. Eternal life? Better times ahead economically? God's coming Kingdom on earth? Resolution of social injustices? Change in our political system? All of these So, Professor Sauter focuses on hope. But may be at the forefront of our concerns right now, but Professor Sauter actually explores the broader, challenging (at least for most Christians, including myself) topic of subject concern expectations of the end of the present age, human history, or the world itself. Almost entirely future directed perhaps offering an escape from dwelling on our current circumstances.


However, as Professor Sauter maintains in his book, eschatology cannot just look to "last things" or to better times to come.

What Dare We Hope? is Being entirely focused on what "comes afterwards" or trying to escape the present German theologian Ger-through spiritual visions of the future are not the point either. Rather, eschatology emphasizes the hope that is within Christians in the here and now. God surely has given us amazing promises, but God also calls us to live out our current lives even as we yearn for resolution of the tragedies, evil. and failures of this world.

why are we encouraged to hope now? The title of the book suggests that we must even "dare" to hope. It reminds me of a famous letter that Martin Luther wrote to eschatology. Often, discussions around this Philip Melanchthon. Luther admitted to his own brokenness and his captivity to sin but then claimed that through the justifying grace given to us through Jesus Christ, we as Christians must learn to "sin boldly". Through that same assurance of God's presence in our lives and in all creation, I believe that we can "dare to hope boldly" also.


