#### **Listening Deeply to the Prophets**

This summer we are following an alternative pattern for our readings in worship in order to listen and learn from prophetic teachers in our tradition. Each week we will hear from Luke's Gospel and then from one of the Hebrew Bible prophets - Elijah, Elisha, Amos, Hosea, Isaiah, and Jeremiah. Through faithful reading, preaching, and listening deeply to the prophets we pray that we will grow in understanding how we can convey God's hope and grace found in Christ through the Holy Spirit.

#### Overview of Today's Scripture

This week's readings, the final ones in our series on the prophets, affirm God's call to discern and speak truth about our lives and the times in which we live. In Luke, the tone of Jesus shifts from a rabbi who teaches to a prophet who confronts. At stake is our understanding and living in the present moment with its challenges. In Isaiah, the task of speaking truth comes in the form of a parable. The story conveys God's lament when justice and righteousness are forsaken and lost.

FIRST READING Luke 12:49-56

Our first reading is from Luke.

You might think these words of Jesus sound more at home in the book of Revelation. Their imagery of fire and stark divisions may seem out of character with our usual take on the message and person of Jesus. But this story, as those that come right before and after it, are gospel, too. They all speak to the urgency of faith and vigilance in the times set before us.

[Jesus said:] <sup>49</sup> "I have come to cast fire upon the earth, and how I wish it were already ablaze! <sup>50</sup> I have a baptism with which to be baptized, and what constraint I am under until it is completed! <sup>51</sup> Do you think that I have come to bring peace to the earth? No, I tell you, but rather division! <sup>52</sup> From now on five in one household will be divided, three against two and two against three; <sup>53</sup> they will be divided:

father against son
and son against father,
mother against daughter
and daughter against mother,
mother-in-law against her daughter-in-law
and daughter-in-law against mother-in-law."

<sup>54</sup> He also said to the crowds, "When you see a cloud rising in the west, you immediately say, 'It is going to rain,' and so it happens. <sup>55</sup> And when you see the south wind blowing, you say, 'There will be scorching heat,' and it happens. <sup>56</sup> You hypocrites! You know how to interpret the appearance of earth and sky, but why do you not know how to interpret the present time?"

#### **SECOND READING** Isaiah 5:1-7

Our sermon text is from the Old Testament book of the prophet Isaiah.

Our sermon text is from the book of the prophet Isaiah. It is also one of the Old Testament's few parables. The prophet Nathan once told a parable to David. Its heartbreaking story led the king to unknowingly indict his own abuse of power. Isaiah begins his parable by saying it will be a "love song." Isaiah's "beloved" is God, and the "vineyard" is Israel. But Isaiah's parable, like Nathan's, leads to an indictment of Israel's breaking covenant with God. And the love song becomes God's fierce lament of what has been lost.

## I will sing for my beloved my love song concerning his vineyard:

My beloved had a vineyard on a very fertile hill. He dug it and cleared it of stones and planted it with choice vines; he built a watchtower in the midst of it and hewed out a wine vat in it; he expected it to yield grapes . . . but it yielded rotten grapes.

#### I will sing for my beloved:

And now, inhabitants of Jerusalem and people of Judah, judge between me and my vineyard.
What more was there to do for my vineyard that I have not done in it?
When I expected it to yield grapes, why did it yield rotten grapes?

## I will sing concerning his vineyard:

And now I will tell you what I will do to my vineyard.
I will remove its hedge, and it shall be devoured;
I will break down its wall, and it shall be trampled down.
I will make it a wasteland;
it shall not be pruned or hoed,
it shall be overgrown with briers and thorns;
I will also command the clouds
that they rain no rain upon it.
