As you may recall, a year ago our congregation approved a truly balanced budget for the first time in many years. Now that our final numbers are in for 2020, we're pleased to let you know that—despite all of the unprecedented challenges we faced last year—we remained on budget and ended the year with a positive balance. This positive year-end balance was supplemented by a generous undesignated bequest of \$500,000 we received at the end of the year. As we discussed in our recent Sunday forums in which we reviewed details of the proposed 2021 budget, we recommend using a portion of this bequest to pay off the remainder of our last property mortgage early in 2021, which will save the congregation's general fund approximately \$75,000 in interest. (Line 7600 in the proposed 2021 budget reflects this plan.)

Although we won't be able to hold our Annual Congregational Meeting in person this year, you will still have an opportunity to vote on 1) OSLC's 2021 budget, 2) the minutes from our 2020 Annual Meeting, and 3) the slate of new Council Members for 2021. Ballots will be mailed out by February 1; please do take a moment to fill out your ballot and mailed back to the church office (postmarked by February 10).

Thank you for your continued generosity as we move forward together; please consider completing a Stewardship Pledge for 2021 if you have not done so already. And please join us in praying for our congregation and community as we continue to worship together from afar.



We will continue our practice of distributing Ashes (see the accompanying article) to remind us of our mortality and our complete dependence on God's love in Jesus Christ for life and forgiveness.

We will also continue our practice of a mid-week Lenten worship service that will help us focus on our need for renewal and reconciliation. We invite each of you to participate in these opportunities to prepare your hearts and lives as we journey toward Holy Week and Easter.

This will be an important time as we continue to move through the transition reflecting on "Where is God Calling Us?"



Our Saviour's was recently notified by the ELCA Foundation that Our Saviour's is the beneficiary of a generous bequest from an anonymous donor in the amount of \$500,000.

According to our congregation's gift acceptance policy, ten percent (10%) of such undesignated bequests are to be shared with the Grand Canyon Synod, with the balance (\$450,000) to be utilized at the discretion of the congregation council.

In preparing the 2021 budget another portion of this generous gift would be used to eliminate the balance of our mortgage payments and reduce the congregational debt to zero. The balance will be invested as plans are being developed and considered.

God continues to shower Our Saviour's with abundance and grace, and we are grateful and celebrate the abundant generosity of this anonymous donor who shared their blessings to advance the mission and ministry of our congregation.
