I'm writing to you this month from a place that didn't exist a year ago. At this time last year, David and I had packed up our home in Decorah, Iowa and were driving across the country towards our new one in Tucson. Ahead of the journey, we'd joked about the romantic idea of packing all that you own in a truck and driving away. The reality of moving, of course, is that it can be a jarring and stressful time.

This kind of transitory or *liminal* space is something we talked at length about at the fall Bishop's gathering in October. This event gathered rostered ministers from around the Grand Canyon Synod for learning and kinship. One of our speakers used

the frame of *liminality* – the idea of threshold or in-between spaces. I first encountered theological conversations about liminality in a three-week borderland immersion course I took during seminary. The Rev. Jay Alanis, one of our instructors and guides for the course has written eloquently about liminality, grounding his work in the writing of Gloria Anzaldúa and her book *Borderlands/La Frontera: The New Mestiza* (5<sup>3 2 1</sup>). Liminality describes the exodus narrative of the Hebrew Scriptures, and the in-between "already-not yet" place of life in Christ.

Even as natural as liminal space is for all of creation, we are often in great pain to arrive at the next destination. Are we there yet? What's for dinner? What's next? We wonder and worry about how things will turn out, forgetting to pay attention to the way things are.

We are one year into our journey together and I join you in wondering (and sometimes, worrying) about the next steps. When we embrace the liminal space, we follow in the steps of Jesus, who stopped to look deeply, listened to people who were often ignored, told stories, and took time for dinner with strangers.

I've quoted this passage from Martin Luther at least twice already this year. I was given a framed copy of the quotation from the Board of Directors of Extraordinary Lutheran Ministries when I left my role as Executive Director to follow a call to ordained ministry. On a typical Sunday morning, I pause to read it before we begin worship together as a way of getting centered and reminding myself of the unfolding mystery of God and life in Christ:

"This life therefore is not righteousness, but growth in righteousness, not health, but healing, not being but becoming, not rest but exercise. We are not yet what we shall be, but we are growing toward it, the process is not yet finished, but it is going on, this is not the end, but it is the road.

As we begin a new year, may we see that we are growing, going on, and on the road.
