Love your neighbor as yourself

Dear Neighbors in Christ,

At last week's council meeting we had a very lengthy discussion about the impact of Covid-1,9 and the recent increase in cases at U of A, our neighbor, and in Arizona in general.

This information, coupled with advice from our synod bishop regarding in-person worship and Pima County recommendation of not gathering more than 10 people, added to the fact that Our Saviour's is not worshiping in-person, and led us to conclude that our sanctuary and chapel are closed in definitely.

I know that this is disappointing news to some and a relief to others, but this precaution is being taken out of Jesus command to love our neighbors as we love ourselves. Since we know that the spread of Covid-19 is truly unseen but is contracted as an aerosol and we need to take every possible precaution.

Here is some information that was recently shared with me from our bishop that was shared from other bishops. Thisnalso informs our decision. It reads in part:

"We continue to learn quickly about this disease, but there remain things we do not fully understand. We must continue to remain vigilant about its effects on our healthcare system and society, and also err on the side of caution. The data that support these recommendations are as follows:

• Already 200,000 people have died from COVID-19 in the U.S. (20% of all deaths) with almost 1 million deaths globally; yet the U.S. makes up less than 5% of the world's population.

• Our healthcare system remains inadequately protected with personal protective equipment as most hospitals continue to re-use trems meant for single use.

• 20-40% of people without symptoms spread the disease.

• COVID-19 lingers in the air and can spread likely much further than 6 feet, maybe up to 27 feet.

• Masks of all types prevent the spread of disease but may also protect the weater from contracting COVID.

• Children can be infected (>500,000 in the US), have severe disease (1 in 3 hospitalized children require intensive care), and have long-term complications we are still trying to understand (multisystem inflammatory syndromeMIS-C).

• A study in Germany found that 80% of those infected with COVID-19 could have long-term heart problems. In that study 2/3 of the people were never sick enough to be in the hospital.

So even mild disease may cause long-term problems. Long-term problems are also seen in the lungs, brain, and kidney. Until we have a national effective response based on science or an effective vaccine, we must continue advocating and thinking creatively about how to love God's people, protect one another, and minister to the suffering in the midst of COVID-19. We are in a new normal where virtual is best, outdoor is not safe but safer, and indoor is dangerous. Please continue to help our society.

As we approach flu season, COVID-19 is almost certainly going to flare up again, perhaps worse than last spring. COVID-19 magnifies our social inequities—racial injustice, poverty, educational gaps, public health deficits. The strong stance of the church can save lives. The church can take an even stronger stance to promote a unified Christian response to COVID-19 – masks and staying at home – to love our neighbors and reduce inequities."

In addition to this statement both Dr. Fauci and Dr. Osterholm both notable infectious disease scientists have alerted us to the fact that this fall we will likely see increased spread of Covid-19 coupled with the annual flu

So, please know that although the facility is closed for in-person worship the church continues to do ministry. Our weekly worship is fresh and new each week. Our daily devotions provide us with inspiration. We still have bible studies and pastoral care. We support our local, regional, and global missions. We truly are church together while we are apart, as we continue to love God, and our neighbor as ourselves.



With COVID-19, it is important for people 60 years of age and older to avoid trips outside of their home and to maximize physical distancing.


Requirements:
