Council Corner - Ted Adams, Secretary January 2025

During December's Council meeting a good deal of time was focused on Congregational finances and scheduling of important Congregational meetings.

As reported by our Treasurer, for 2024 to date, our total expenses are within \$1000 of the projected budget. Weekly giving is slightly under budget but December contributions are typically higher, so we expect a strong ending to the year. We anticipate that for the year 2024 our income will exceed expenses.

The 2025 Mission Spending Plan prepared by the Finance Committee was presented to Council. A high-level overview was conducted before delving into more specific items. Several adjustments and changes were made and refinements will continue over the next few weeks. In early January, Council will hold a special meeting to finalize the Plan and vote to move it forward for Congregational review and approval at the Annual Meeting.

Leading up to the Annual Meeting, several important sessions will be held to provide information on items to be voted on at that meeting. As previously reported, the Council reviewed and approved updates to the Congregational Constitution. On January 12, 2025, a Sunday Forum will be held to review the changes to the Constitution. In addition, at that session, there will be an introduction of a slate of nominees to fill upcoming openings in Council membership. On February 2, 2025, a Sunday Forum will be held providing members a preliminary look at the Mission Spending Plan. There will be opportunities to ask questions and give members a chance to discuss the Plan in detail.

The Annual Meeting has been scheduled for February 9, 2025 immediately following our worship service. At the meeting the Congregation will take a formal vote on approving the Mission Spending Plan, the updated Constitution, and the slate of Council nominees. Don't worry Super Bowl fans, we promise to have you home in plenty of time to get your chips and dip set out next to your favorite chair before the big game starts.

We hope to see you at these important gatherings. This is your Congregation and your insights and participation add value to the conversation and strengthen us as a Community in Christ.



Discipleship at OSLC - Pastor Glenn Schrader

The other day I got an interesting AI response on the internet when I asked what "discipleship in end times" means: "The practice of following Jesus Christ as a disciple, with a particular focus on living faithfully and actively in light of the belief that the end of the world is approaching, emphasizing preparedness, vigilance, and a strong commitment to sharing the Gospel message with others." The response seemed to me slightly more "artificial" than "intelligent", since it clearly is a rather bland blend of intentions that might fit many expectant eras in the history of Christianity. But in our times,

in the aftermath of two world wars, the Holocaust, the development of nuclear weapons, ominous threats of ecological disasters, powerful movements of social unrest and revolution in nearly every part of the world, and scandal and corruption across much of American society, should we now read <u>our</u> "signs of the times" as <u>the</u> "end times"?

The Biblical witness about "end times" is far more about the ongoing expression hope rather than historical trends or predictions. If our understanding about the coming "end times" is tied to achieving political progress or "cultural renewal" as signs that Christ's return is on the horizon, then most of us will probably find ourselves in despair as we start the new year. Similarly, if some Christians try to bring about specific events by their own actions or through their elected leaders, they will be torn away from the person and work of Christ and the activity of the Holy Spirit. Further, as Princeton Theological Seminary Professor Daniel Migliore says in *Faith Seeking Understanding*, if the church pins its stance on being "safe in heaven when all hell breaks loose" on Earth, then it will be no surprise that church is once again absent in the discipleship struggles that lie immediately before us.

Migliore maintains that "discipleship in end times" should be no different than "discipleship in present times". "Christian hope is in the steadfast love of God that raises the dead and brings a transformed heaven and earth filled with God's righteousness, freedom, and peace" – today and all the next days of our lives. May it be so as we enter 2025 as disciples of the One whom we praise for giving us amazing hope. "For from God, and through God, and to God are all things. To God be the glory forever." [Romans 11:36]

Sunday Forums for January 2025

January 5: *"God is Flipping the Script on the Church"* Professor Craig Nessan Wartburg Theological Seminary (ELCA)

Prof. Nessan returns to OSLC with a prophetic view of the future of the church. Prof. Nessan states: "Whether we like it or not, God has flipped the script on what it means to be church. In the inherited 'attraction model' of church, the primary agents of ministry have been the clergy through the programs of the institution they lead. The goal has been to attract members to join the congregation, financially support the institution, and be active in the organization's scheduled events. This model of church has disintegrated in our lifetime. At the end of Christendom, the church is in crisis. While nostalgia for that era continues, there is no going back." January 12: Church Council Presentation: Changes to the Constitution and Other Procedures

January 19: Celebrating the Life of Bayard Rustin

In marking Martin Luther King Jr. Day on January 20, we will honor the life of a key leader in the civil rights movements of the 1960s. Bayard Rustin is credited with teaching Dr. King the practical strategies of non-violence during the Montgomery Bus Boycott. In 1963 he organized the March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom in which a quarter of a million people rallied to demand an end to segregation, to establish fair wages and economic justice, and to secure voting rights, education, and long overdue civil rights protections for all Americans. As a gay man, however, Rustin experienced discrimination within these political movements. His writings in *Time on Two Crosses* provide insights on how he was able to successfully navigate the social mores of race and sexuality in order to pursue his commitment to justice and equality.

January 26: Praying the Psalms: "Orientation, Disorientation and New Orientation"

Every Sunday we read a Psalm as part of our worship service, but have you used them in your prayer life? Walter Brueggemann, Professor of Old Testament at Columbia Theological Seminary, suggests that "in season and out of season, generation after generation, faithful women and men turn to the Psalms as a most helpful resource for conversation with God about things that matter most." As we begin 2025, praying the Psalms can become a new spiritual practice for you along the path of your discipleship.

Come and See

As we start the season of Epiphany, you are invited to gather with others who are exploring the Bible and the life of faith in weekly conversations. Our first meeting of the New Year will be on Thursday, January 9, 2025 at noon in the Patio Room. These one-hour sessions are led by Pastor Glenn and Pastor Amalia, and you are welcome to join at any time. Please bring your Bible or borrow a Lutheran Study Bible.

We are following Paul's letters to the early churches chronologically. For the next months, we will be exploring 1 & 2 Corinthians. There are strong parallels in the struggles that the church in Corinth faced nearly 2000 years ago and our present age. Our discussions also include tracing Paul's life and the transformations he experienced through the work of the Holy Spirit.

Generosity Team Update for Stewardship and Generosity in 2025

A total of 58 households have turned in Statements of Intent totaling a generous \$265,000. That is great news! Thank you to all who have responded.

In addition to continuing to support our ongoing ministry, we have developed two new ministry initiatives for 2025: 1) a water harvesting project to prevent flooding of our office space and create a new outdoor garden that uses the redirected water; and 2) expanding our small group gatherings and casual meetups in the coming year.

Our first goal for 2025 is to have 70 households turn in a Statement of Intent. Our second goal is to increase giving by \$15,000 in order to fund our current ministry and new ministry initiatives for 2025. In 2024, we received a total of \$272,000 in pledges. We are 12 households and about \$20,000 short of our goal for increased commitments for the coming year. If you have never filled out a Statement of Intent, or have questions about it, you can contact any member of the Generosity Team or Pastor Amalia.
