



Towards the end of March, I found myself in the Jewish Museum and Holocaust Center in downtown Tucson with a group of strangers learning about mending.

I sat at a table with four other people – we'd all shown up for a variety of reasons – two were in knitting groups with one of the teachers. Another was looking to reconnect with Jewish community. The other had seen a poster in the neighborhood. I'd seen something online – I've worked on a few projects now with Lynn Davis, one of the organizers of the event.

The workshop was called "Mending as Metaphor: Holding it Together One Stitch at a Time." In a description about the workshop, the organizers wrote about the Jewish understanding of tikkun olum, repairing or healing the world. The purpose of the workshop was to give a tangible way to mend something in order to think about how to do greater repair.

I brought dog toys. Recently, a member of the congregation had wonderfully stitched up a bedraggled one for me and she inspired me to try it myself. When it comes to handiwork, I often feel like I have two right-hands – and I'm left-handed! As we sat around the table, we talked about our lives. I love the easy conversation that flows when you are working on a project with others. As I mended Cholla's dog toys, I found out about a nearby preschool and a fantastic local program called "Mending Souls." I shared about our quilting group and prayer shawl ministry, and other signs of repair at Our Saviour's.

At the beginning of Lent, on Ash Wednesday, we read from Isaiah 58 (using Eugune Peterson's version, the Message). The reading included these words:

You'll use the old rubble of past lives to build anew, rebuild the foundations from out of your past. You'll be known as those who can fix anything, restore old ruins, rebuild and renovate, make the community livable again.

What can you build anew, rebuild, fix, restore, and renovate? Maybe something in your own life or the life of another. We have many repairers and menders among us. Very recently, I've been wondering – what if we started tending the bus shelter closest to our congregation? I think of how many times Ms. Ellie arrived and departed by bus. Perhaps we can do some mending work together, removing litter, adding some joy, creating some loveable space on the corner near us.

As we continue through Lent and towards Easter, may you see new life and hope, one step and one stitch at a time.

# **Council Corner** - Ted Adams, Secretary

The official business of the Council began with the election of officers for the 2025 year. Council has unanimously approved the following officers: Patty Sirls, President, Meg Hughes, Vice President, Pam Hardman, Treasurer, and Ted Adams, Secretary. Other elected members of Council include, David Johnson, Paige Marty, Melanie Bowman, Jennifer Strand, and Pastor Amalia.

Several members of the Congregation, including Jennifer Strand, Patty Sirls, Mary Lou Forier, and Pastor Amalia have gotten together and proposed an interactive play highlighting the history of Our Saviour's as a way of celebrating our 80th anniversary. It is proposed to engage Kristen Underwood, who specializes in creating these types of events using information gathered by the team. A funder from within the Congregation has been identified. The date is to be determined to schedule a Congregational but most likely it will be in the Fall around the end of October or early November. Last year the Council voted to take the quarterly interest from the ELCA Mission Investment Fund and use it for Mission Outreach rather than reinvestment. Council voted to donate the most Easter Sunday and in hopes that recent payment to Lutheran Social Services of the Southwest to support refugee settlement. This

recognizes the unprecedented need due to the sudden and unexpected elimination of Federal funding. The donation will be for approximately \$2000.

At the request of Congregation Member Asher Havenhill, Council voted to support the ongoing collection of food and hygiene items for Youth on Their Own. This organization supports the high school graduation and continued success of youth experiencing homelessness. We will continue our ongoing collection of items for Interfaith Community Services (ICS) and periodic collection for Tucson Interfaith HIV/AIDS Network (TIHAN). We hope you will be generous in support each of these deserving organizations, as they work to supply their clients with much need items.

At the request of the Reconciling in Christ team, the Council voted Meeting on either April 6 or April 26 to affirm the decision to become a Reconciling in Christ congregation and discussed the wording of the Welcome Statemeeting, the Council and Reconciling in Christ team unanimously affirmed final language for the Welcome Statement. The Congregational Meeting was scheduled for April 6, so it does not conflict with Palm Sunday or many members will be able to attend.

"Call" has to do with service to a God who summons us with irresistible power. It is not simply an informal notion or an energizing experience. Rather, this calling has real

substance that relates to the will and purpose of God. Often it concerns yielding up our individual safe worlds and then calling our Christian community to do the same. We need to recognize that such a sense of call in our time is profoundly countercultural. The primary voices of our time are the voices of "autonomy", that is, "to do one's or self-fulfillment. The primary ideology of the West's modern focus is to actually

propose that a person can life an "uncalled life", one not referred any purpose beyond one's self. The "disease of autonomy" - also referred to as "individualism" - is unbiblical. In fact, it leads us to settle for idolatries that may feel and sound like a call. These are diversionary activities that keep us from facing the yielding in obedience that belongs to all who are called by God. The holy purposes of God move in upon and against all of our individualized arrangements. Just as the prophetic messages of the Hebrew Bible, evidence is growing that the longstanding concentration of individual power, knowledge and status which constitutes our human world is under heavy assault. own thing", self-actualization, self-assertion, Reception of a new world from God – a new way to be human in the world – is underway.

# **Update on Becoming Reconciling in Christ**

# **April 2025**

The Council has scheduled a special meeting of the congregation following worship on Sunday, April 6 to affirm becoming a Reconciling in Christ congregation. This is an exciting and wonderful next step in our journey to be a Reconciling in Christ congregation. The Reconciling in Christ program recommends a margin of at least 75% voting in support in order to show strong engagement from the congregation.



Over the past year, we've had forums, discussions, movies, Road Runner articles, and one-on-one conversations to learn what it means to become Reconciling in Christ and to live up to the commitments we make. We did a straw poll of a welcome statement summarizing those commitments at our Annual Meeting in February, receiving 90% support. After some feedback and follow-up conversation, we made some adjustments to the statement. The Council and RIC team have unanimously affirmed this statement and will present it to the congregation as part of the decision to move forward with becoming Reconciling in Christ. We will not be modifying or amending the statement at this point - we can update it in the future in order to best reflect the welcome and commitments of the congregation. Here is the proposed statement:

Welcome. Your presence builds up the body of Christ. We welcome and affirm God's diversity, including all ethnicities, cultures, races, sexual orientations, gender identities and expressions, abilities, ages, and life experiences. You are invited to full participation in our congregation because of who you are. We lament and confess how the Christian Church has withheld Christ's love by misusing the power of institution. We commit to advocating for God's justice and mercy for all of creation, including humans. We commit to anti-racism and other ways of ending systems that cause harm. Christ is our peace and breaks down the walls that divide us (Ephesians 2:14). Our communion table is Christ's table. You and all people are welcome without exception.

The Reconciling in Christ (RIC) designation is a public way for faith communities to see, name, celebrate, and advocate for people of all sexual orientations, gender identities, and gender expressions in the Lutheran church. In recent years, the RIC program expanded their work to include address systemic racism. RIC congregations publicly welcome people of all sexual orientations, gender identities, and gender expressions to full participation in the congregation (including leadership and marriage) and commit to anti-racism. The program began in 1983 and there are now over 1,000 Reconciling in Christ communities in the ELCA - congregations, synods, colleges, seminaries, camps, and others. Lutheran Campus Ministry in Tucson, Santa Cruz Lutheran, Sierra Evangelical (in Sierra Vista), and Lutheran Church of the Foothills are Reconciling in Christ congregations (with others like Our Saviour's working on becoming RIC).

We have also scheduled a Sunday Forum on April 26 to recognize the progress that Our Saviour's has made in becoming an RIC congregation - looking both at what we have achieved and what work lies ahead. Thank you to all in the congregation for your continued work to make public and intentional our long history of welcome.

#### Ways to be involved without being overwhelmed

Wisdom from our partners at Lutheran Social Services of the Southwest (LSS-SW)

When the world seems in chaos, it can be overwhelming, daunting and disorienting to know where and how to get involved. A sociologist, Jennifer Walter gave the following suggestions on how to stay focused, oriented and regain a sense of power:

- 1. Set boundaries: **Pick 2-3 key issues you deeply care about and focus your attention there.** You can't track everything. *Impact comes from sustained focus, not scattered awareness.*
- 2. Use aggregators & experts: Find trusted analysts who do the heavy lifting of synthesis. Look for those explaining patterns, not just events.
- 3. Remember: Feeling overwhelmed is the point. When you recognize this, you regain some power. Take breaks. Process. This is a marathon.
- 4. Practice going slow: Wait 48hrs before reacting to new policies. The urgent clouds the important. Initial reporting often misses context.
- 5. Build community: Share the cognitive load. Different people track different issues. Network intelligence beats individual overload.
