





What Do You Fear?
Insisting on Hope this Advent

We have entered a new Church year and the season of Advent. This time fills some with joy, some with stress, and some with grief. Or a mix of all this and more. In this, we gather for worship on Sundays and Wednesdays to revisit the story of Christ's birth.

From the season of Advent to the festival of Epiphany this year we will be using worship materials from Sanctified Art (a collaborative worship resource). We will follow a different pattern than the Revised Common Lectionary for our readings and our worship words will reflect the theme "What Do You Fear? Insisting on Hope."

From the authors of the series:

We've crafted an Advent series that takes seriously the angels' message and trusts that Christ's birth truly is good news of great joy for all people. This series looks closely at the fear and terror looming in the background during the time of King Herod and invites us to consider the fears we hold now. Fear can divide and paralyze us, and even be used as a tool for oppression. But what if we formed a different relationship with fear? Can we acknowledge fear without letting it rule us? Might we catalyze our fears into love and action? What if naming our fears helps us see more clearly how God is breaking in and where God is at work? This series gently invites us to identify where fear is present—both in the Advent story and in our lives—while also finding our way toward hope, with the angels' voices in our ears. Every Advent, we light candles, sing carols, and pray for Christ's coming because we believe God entered a frightened world to bring good news. We hold onto hope because we believe that Christ did come—that's the promise of the season. Our hope is not flimsy or fleeting. It's gritty, resilient, and can endure—no matter what we fear or face. This season, let us insist on hope and trust that good news is greater than fear.

Council Corner - Jennifer Strand December 2025

The Council meetings begin with a devotion and end with prayer. The devotion this meeting focused on care for our neighbor. Using a summation of Martin Luther's essay The Freedom of a Christian and an excerpt from 1 Corinthians it was emphasized that we are redeemed in Christ, not bound to external rituals, but we are free to love our neighbor as ourselves.

Thank you for your continued generosity. The rental houses are in good shape. The property insurance is going up. With the list produced by Quality Air, that indicates when the HVAC units were installed, we are aware of possible future needs. The fire panel in the Activity Building will be replaced. This was necessary for safety reasons. The Church Office is working with Tucson Electric Power to see about rebates for the upgrades we have made to the lighting on the campus.

The Finance Committee continues to work on the 2026 budget. The Pie lunch hosted by the Generosity Committee was delicious and much appreciated. The Council noted that the brochures and lunch were well received. A big thank you to those who have returned their pledged card for next year. It is never too late.

Two topics from last month were examined. Lutheran Campus Ministry has conducted the feasibility study for the Center of Grace. They will be talking with the Synod and our church before anything is finalized. The "Open Stage" proposal by Paula Miller was discussed and the Council voted to move forward with the idea of a place and time for unhoused musicians to play. Further logistical information is needed before implementation, but we wish to support this part of our community.

Generosity Update

We had pie! We have purpose! Thank you for being part of conversations this fall about stewardship, generosity, pie charts and pies.

We have received 46 Statements of Intent. We are off to a good start toward our goal of 70 returned Statement of Intent card. This practice of considering what you can give and then making a plan helps – our goal is 70, so we are already over halfway there! Please send in your Statement of Intent – you can place it in the offering plate or bring it to the office.



December 2025

The last month and a half have been a turbulent time for many of us. Federal government closures have left our family, friends and neighbors stranded in airports, without jobs, paychecks and critical services. Most recently without critical food assistance.

Our Saviour's responded to these crises as we always do... Thank you to all who have offered extra support by volunteering, donating funds and collecting food and supplies! This was evident by the overflowing ICS shopping cart last Sunday! Last week the Endowment committee funded additional grants to keep important medical and mental health services available to unhoused and veteran neighbors!

As you plan your holiday and contributions for the following year, keep the momentum going. The Tucson community has many people who remain in need of our support. Here are just three suggestions:

- 1. Take the SNAP food challenge. This challenge was promoted by the Food Resource Action Center last Lenten season. It is "simple" way to learn the limitations of the SNAP program. The average SNAP payment is \$6.00 per day per person. Purchase 5-day's groceries for yourself using ONLY \$30.00. Do not use food items you already have stored in your home. Additionally, you cannot spend money on "hot food" items like the COSTCO roast chickens we all enjoy. I have tried this myself. It's quite eye-opening. I look forward to hearing about your experiences.
- 2. Continue to support community resource agencies. Following are a few agencies Our Saviour's actively supports:
 - · Grace Saint Paul Episcopal Church (St. Joseph's Pantry) Community outreach.
 - · Interfaith Community Services (ICS) Food and household supplies.
 - · Pay it Forward Tucson Veterans.
 - · TIHAN HIV/Aids.
