I have a folder in my file cabinet labeled "Pastor Notes." It has grown thick over the last three years with notes, emails, and cards. There are a few critical emails, some angry, some civil. But mostly they are notes of gratitude, reflections on a sermon or other new faith or Biblical insight, or something a person thought I might appreciate reading.

I received one such note this week, during what has been a rather difficult time in the life of our congregation. We have had a series of deaths in and

close to our congregation – Ruth Strand, who lived for 100 years, and was a long-time member of Our Saviour's. Vicki Becker, who served as the youth minister for a number of years and who became a treasured member at Lutheran Church of the Foothills. Jerry Larsen, who used to faithfully bring his grandchildren to worship and youth activities and who many remember for his stylish hair and active presence on Tumamoc Hill and the Tucson Zumba scene. Ms. Ellie Johnson, who brought joy to every place she went and who took time to pay attention to the smallest details and most overlooked people. And Emma Larson, whose now adult children grew up with Vicki Becker as their youth director, who has remained a steadfast supporter of Our Saviour's even though she was unable to worship in person for years.

Many are also feeling the weight of the recent election. Elections come and go with winners and losers each time. But the policy results of an election have lasting implications. As followers of Christ, we are freed in Christ to obey God's commands to love God and love our neighbors as ourselves. In Luke 10, Jesus clearly teaches that to love one's neighbor is to show mercy to the vulnerable, the harmed, the one in need. "Go, and do likewise," Jesus teaches. There is important work to be done together in Love.

There is also a need to rest well so we can work well. So, as we enter the season of Advent, it was with deep gratitude that I received a note this week that read, "Pastor, I've always loved the text of this anthem and thought that you might appreciate it too." Indeed, I did and now share it with you.

Lord, before this fleeting season is upon us, let me remember to walk slowly. Lord, bless my heart with Love and with quiet.

Give my heart a leaning to hear carols.

Grace our family with contentment, and the peace that comes only from You. Lord, help us to do less this busy season; go less; stay closer to home; kneel more. May our hearts be Your heart. May we simply, peacefully, celebrate You.

Council Corner - Ted Adams, Secretary December 2024

We had a full agenda for the month of November.

Council Treasurer, Pam Hardman, reviewed the October financials. Although our weekly giving is slightly behind our projected 2024 budget, it is likely to be made up in November and December, when giving is typically higher. It was noted that giving this year is ahead of last year to date.

We then plunged into a first review of the draft 2025 Mission Plan (budget) that was prepared by the Finance Committee. The Council will continue to review the Mission Plan and will send a final recommendation to the Congregation for adoption at the Annual Meeting.

Earlier in the year Council voted to take the quarterly interest earned from the ELCA Ministry Growth Fund and use it for outreach and giving. After considering several possibilities, Council voted to use the first distribution of \$2000 to support the Super Youth program, which is a collaboration of Tucson Lutheran churches to host group events for Lutheran high schoolers. Funds in the amount of \$250 will be provided to each congregation that hosts a Super Youth event during the 2024/2025 school year. The balance of funds remaining will be distributed to Casa Maria.

The Generosity Team reports that our annual appeal has gotten off to a great start. On Giving Sunday, a total of 36 Statements of Intent were received pledging over \$220,000. Although one of the "Living Water" projects featured in the appeal is water harvesting, keep in mind that this is not a special appeal for a single project but is our Annual Stewardship Drive to support the full operation of the Congregation for 2025. Council is grateful for the congregation's continued generosity.

A final version of the lease agreement between OSLC and TIHAN was reviewed and unanimously approved. If the TIHAN Board also approves this final version, Pastor Amalia and Scott Blades, TIHAN Executive Director, will sign the agreement. We are hopeful that all will proceed as planned and TIHAN will begin moving into the office space in December.

A final note, the meeting to discuss updates to the Congregational Constitution, previously scheduled for November 10 will be rescheduled to January 12. This will give sufficient time to consider the changes prior to the Annual Meeting which will be scheduled in early February 2025.

Discipleship at OSLC - Pastor Glenn Schrader

What obstacles do you encounter along your path of faith? Indecision, temptation, distraction, inertia, exhaustion? There are many that can deter us from hearing God's call and taking the next steps. But one I think is abundantly present in our current context is fear. We have been surrounded by the voices of fear – especially in the past months – which have clouded our vision and drained our energy. The negative power of fear can become so great that we may no longer know what a life without fear would even feel like. Fear can

enclose and entrap us as hostages in a "house of fear", as the great spiritual writer Henri Nouwen once observed.

Yet, as we start the church year in Advent focused on readings from Luke, the first messages from God's angels are "Do not be afraid!" First to old Zechariah concerning his wife Elizabeth who would soon bear a son; then to young Mary in her house in Nazareth about the birth of Jesus. Throughout his ministry, Jesus taught his disciples not to fear. When they were caught in a storm on the Sea of Galilee, Jesus told them not to be afraid as he calmed the violent wind and turbulent seas. The women visiting the empty tomb on Easter morning were told by an angel "Do not be afraid!" And Jesus when he greeted his disciples in the upper room after his resurrection said "Take heart, it is I. Do not be afraid!" The message of "Don't be afraid!" resounds throughout the New Testament.

In a popular book of years ago *Love is Letting Go of Fear*, Dr. Gerald Jampolsky, a child and adult psychiatrist, maintained that the opposite of love was not hate but fear. The subtle control that fear exerts on our lives can become pervasive so that we feel powerless, isolated, and drained of hope and we cannot do what we truly want to do. But God invites us to move out of our "house of fear" into where God lives in the "house of love" (Nouwen). Jampolsky also said that with "forgiveness as my only function...! learned to listen to the inner voice of love directing what I thought, said, and did." God's "house of love" offers safety, intimacy, and healing, and it is where we who are Jesus' followers gain the strength to say "Love is the way I walk in gratitude" as we travel ahead along our path of discipleship.

Reconciling in Christ Update – What does "Welcome" Look Like?

The Reconciling in Christ program, founded in 1974, helps Lutheran congregations understand how to welcome gay and transgender people in meaningful ways. Throughout history, many Christian spaces and communities have been closed or unwelcoming to LGBTQ people. Now, over 1,100 Lutheran communities are Reconciling in Christ!

Our Saviour's is good at welcoming people. Many comment that they feel "at home" when visiting our congregation. We try to make sure that people feel welcome in our space. Last year, we made pew cutouts to make room for people using wheelchairs and walkers. We also have large print bulletins and hearing devices available. We have plenty of accessible parking. For those with young children, we have added a play area up front in our worship space. Our weekly liturgy, well-worn pews, and beautiful organ music let those who have grown up Lutheran in America know they are at home. We provide gluten-free and alcohol-free options for communion. These are just a few ways that we visibly and vocally make people feel welcome at Our Saviour's. We hope people feel welcome and tell their friends about us. What has made you feel welcome at Our Saviour's?

Thank you for the wonderful response to our 2024 Generosity Appeal – Living Water! It was wonderful to see many in worship on November 17 bringing forward statements of intended giving for the coming year.

We have received 47 Statements of Intent – our goal is 70, so we are already over halfway there!
