

Ambassador Days



The Keep Safe Ambassador programme was developed in partnership with Police Scotland and I Am Me Scotland. The programme was launched in 2016 for pupils aged 14-18.

Keep Safe Ambassadors are trained on how to recognise and report hate crimes safely within the community and in a school environment. The Keep Safe Ambassador programme consists of one full day of training, with inputs from I Am Me Scotland, and Police Scotland. A certificate and badge is provided to each participant at the end of the training session.

The Ambassador Training takes place within your school and is a full days training.

Edinburgh Keep Safe Re-Launch



Edinburgh Police organised a fantastic day for the re-launch of Keep Safe in Edinburgh. This was held in Edinburgh City Chambers. The event was opened by the Right Honourable Lord Provost of Edinburgh, Robert Aldridge. The event was a big hit and thank-you to all the lovely speakers; Inspector Duff and Sergeant Gray from Police Scotland, People First, Sarah Robinson from one of our wonderful Keep Safe places Fort Kinnaird and Neil Aitkinson from RNIB.

The Keep Safe Police Officers have been working hard and there are currently 42 Keep Safe places in Edinburgh with the number constantly growing. If you are interested in becoming a Keep Safe place please contact; Iammescotland@outlook.com.

Sarah Robinson, Dual Services Manager at Fort Kinnaird shared her experience of the centre becoming a Keep Safe Place.

Fort Kinnaird was introduced to the Keep Safe campaign by PC Prince Durant who has supported us at the centre for many years. We immediately saw the value the scheme could offer and were keen to support the wider community of Edinburgh. The initiative also aligns with our commitment to creating a safe and accessible environment where people are comfortable to be themselves – both as visitors and employees.

We wanted to ensure the Safe Place training became an integral part of our training programme and are pleased to share that 30 members of our team have completed the Keep Safe training on site. This has been a great addition to the existing accessibility services offered at the centre including the Changing Places Facility, wheelchair hire and free sensory back packs, contributing to creating a safe space for all and empowering everyone to enjoy their time at Fort Kinnaird.

The Keep Safe training was delivered at the centre to ensure this was easy for the team to access and apply this to their roles at Fort Kinnaird. This included how to recognise a potential vulnerable person or situation and feel confident in dealing with the various scenarios, as well as ensuring every visitor to the centre feels safe and accommodated for.

The whole team found the training to be so rewarding and insightful whilst also challenged their perceptions. A recent example of this was one of our officers was approached by an autistic teenager having had a disagreement with his parent. Using skills acquired during the training, the officer spoke calmly and offered a safe space to both the teen and their parent. At the teenagers request the security officer stayed to support until the disagreement had been resolved. The safe space and the training undertaken by the team ensured the visitors had a positive experience.

The Customer Services building at the centre is the recognised Keep Safe property, however we have built on our strong relationships with our retailers to increase vigilance across the centre and call on the Centre Management team to support as needed. Along with this we have been working closely with our Community Police officers in tackling ASB to ensure that when a keep safe member looks at the map for a safe location, they can feel confident about getting of the bus, or walking to site, and asking for help.

As well as the benefits to our visitors, becoming a Keep Safe property has offered us opportunities to raise awareness of the Centre within the surrounding areas and drive recruitment through promotion of the training programmes, positive culture and community partnerships within Edinburgh.

We are proud to be a Keep safe property and would encourage all categories of businesses to embrace this scheme and promote a safer Edinburgh.

People First (Scotland) – Speaking out against disability hate crime

People First (Scotland) is the national Disabled Persons’ User-Led Organisation of people with learning disabilities in Scotland. User-Led means that our organisation is run by people with a learning disability.



Their National Hate Crime Group is a group of People First members from different areas of Scotland who are interested in tackling hate crime and prejudice against people with learning disabilities. Many of them also have lived-experience of being victims of disability hate crime. They meet every 2 months online. In the group, they share updates of the hate crime work going on in their local areas, and they focus on national consultations and projects. Last year they were involved in the making of a short film to raise awareness of learning disability hate crime. For this they worked in partnership with the Scottish Commission for people with Learning Disabilities (SCLD). They strongly believe that the voice of lived-experience always makes the point come across stronger, through real stories and faces; everyone appearing in this film has a learning disability and has chosen their own words. In early June, one of their Edinburgh Directors, Keith Lynch, attended the Edinburgh Keep Safe re-launch event at City Chambers. He gave a speech to raise awareness of learning disability hate crime and the lived-experiences that members share within their collective advocacy groups.



They work closely with Police Scotland to help the Keep Safe initiative work well in Edinburgh.

They raise awareness of the initiative with their members and they contribute our lived-experience to training new Keep Safe venues when they can.

One of their members said:

“I think it is a positive thing, to have a Keep Safe place in the community to go to, where we can go if we feel upset because of harassment or hate crime and where we can ask staff for help and contact someone we trust.”

Shetland Keep Safe Re-Launch



Shetland Public Protection Committee have done an amazing job in re-launching the Keep Safe initiative in Shetland!

The Keep Safe initiative is continuously being rolled out across Scotland and all Keep Safe places can be viewed on the free "Keep Safe Scotland" phone app available FREE on iOS and Android devices.

In Shetland, the SPoCs have been working hard on signing up new Keep Safe places and are identified so far as:-

- Islesburgh Community Centre, Lerwick
- University of Highlands and Islands – Lerwick and Scalloway Campuses
- Shetland Library, Lerwick
- All SRT Leisure Centres and Swimming Pools



All participating premises will have a visible Keep Safe window sticker and staff are be trained to support anyone who requires assistance.

Keep Safe cards are available for all members of the community. The card details information about communication requirements, health concerns and who to contact in an emergency. Anyone needing assistance can enter a Keep Safe place and show their card. The staff will be able to assist or call the named contact person on the card. Blank cards are available from all Keep Safe premises.

Lindsay Tulloch, Chair of the Shetland Public Protection Committee, said "The support shown already from local organisations to provide safe spaces and protect people in need of help demonstrates the value of community we have in Shetland. We must work together as a community and with Police Scotland to raise awareness of Hate Crime, and support those who are vulnerable and in need of assistance. We'd welcome interest from any other premises or organisations who wish to join this initiative."

Inspector Sam Greshon of Police Scotland, based at Lerwick Police Station, said: "The collaboration shown by the community and Police in supporting this initiative shows the commitment to prevent Hate Crime. It also raises awareness of the challenges faced and the need to support anyone who may experience Hate Crime, including exclusion due to a disability or perceived disability. The value of partnership working around such key topics and from a community perspective cannot be understated."

Blantyre Fun Day



"You Are Not Alone" resources coming soon!!

The Team have been working for the past few months, with Police Scotland and young people from Polmont, Good Shepherd and St Mary's Kenmure, to design and develop new exploitation awareness resources for the You Are Not Alone education package.



In the past few months, the group have been working to develop the outline for scripts, which will be used to develop 3 new films. Ryan's Story and Ally's story are in production and Liv's Story is in pre-production

Ryan's Story

The first of the three films is based on the real life stories from young people in Polmont and features a young boy and his journey from childhood, through criminal exploitation to prison. The film aims to generate an understanding of how criminal gangs target young and vulnerable people, offering them friendship, money, food, and a sense of belonging.



Ally's Story

Ally's story is a partnership development with Police Scotland PREVENT team and aims to raise awareness of how young people can be targeted online and radicalised into extremism. The film has been developed with SOLO Films and a trailer can be viewed by clicking the images below

Good News!




Causeway Coasts & Glen Policing & Community Safety Partnership (PCSP) have been working on their new Disability Hate Crime pack for schools.

Emergency SOS functionality on your mobile phone.

The NPSA (National Protective Security Authority) is the UK Government's National Technical Authority for Physical and Personnel Protective Security.

The NPSA collaborates with partners to identify risks and vulnerabilities to the UK's national infrastructure, and to offer advice to reduce them.

The NPSA also collaborates very closely with Police throughout the UK providing awareness advice and guidance such as Personal Security.

One such area the NPSA highlights is the setting of Emergency SOS functionality on your mobile phone.

You can set up your mobile phone so that when the Emergency SOS functionality is activated it will call the emergency services, share location information and message your emergency contacts. Once set up, activating the Emergency SOS will normally involve something like pressing the power button five times. You can programme Emergency SOS to be noisy or discreet and you can cancel it if activated in error.



Setting up Emergency SOS features will vary depending on the type of mobile phone you have and the operating system it runs on. It is easy to set up and information is available online to guide you through the process. Emergency SOS is also available on most smart watches with a mobile connection or Wi-Fi and is also available via the ecall feature available in vehicles manufactured since 2018.

Free Mobile Data

The National Databank is giving free mobile data to people who can't afford their internet connection. This is particularly important as more people fall into data poverty and need to stay connected. The National Databank is a 'national food bank for connectivity data'. It is run by Good Things Foundation, the UK's leading digital inclusion charity, and as of September 2022 has enough data to help almost 500,000 people, donated by Virgin Media, O2, Vodafone, and Three Mobile.

Any community-based organisation that directly supports people experiencing data poverty can sign up to the National Databank. Each month, the organisation can apply for SIMs to give to the people they support. SIMs are posted to the organisation which can then distribute to those in need. To find out more head to;

Keep Safe Scotland App—Download Now!

Keep Safe is a national initiative that works with a network of businesses such as shops, libraries and cafes who have agreed to make their premises a 'Keep Safe' place for people to go if they feel frightened, distressed or are feeling vulnerable when out in the community.

The Keep Safe Scotland app is available for free on Android and iOS devices.



The app can be used to:

- ◆ Plan routes with Keep Safe places highlighted along the way.
- ◆ View a list of all Keep Safe places across Scotland - broken down by local authority.
- ◆ Find out more information about Keep Safe places such as opening hours, website, telephone number etc.
- ◆ Find the nearest Keep Safe place to the app user and link with Google/Apple maps for directions to it.
- ◆ Link with Police Scotland's hate crime reporting form for a secure method of non-emergency reporting.
- ◆ Link with Police Scotland to dial 101 or 999 with an approximate location displayed before the call connects, so that if the app user is lost and in distress they can alert Police Scotland to their whereabouts.
****In an emergency 999 should always be dialled first. It is not recommended to delay help by going through the app in an immediate emergency situation****
- ◆ Find out more information about different local authorities, such as events, useful contacts, news, and links.
- ◆ Find out more about I Am Me Scotland, such as the YouTube Channel, Twitter, Facebook, and email address.

The Keep Safe card contains details of the person's name, any health concerns, any communication needs, and helpful contact details for friends or family. The card is for use in Keep Safe places or with Police Scotland to highlight any additional support or assistance a person may require.

Keep Safe places can contact someone from the 'People who can help me' section to collect a person requiring Keep Safe assistance.

An Overview of the I Am Me Project & the Keep Safe Initiative

I Am Me is a community charity that works in partnership with Police Scotland to raise awareness of and tackle disability hate crime.

Disability Hate Crime is one of the most under reported crimes in the UK, with an estimated 97% going unreported. Many incidents go unreported as disabled people accept abuse and harassment as part of daily life. There are 1 million people in Scotland registered as disabled or with a long term illness.

There are two key initiatives; I Am Me and Keep Safe:

I Am Me

I Am Me works with communities to raise awareness of what disability hate crime is and how incidents can affect individuals and the wider community. The project has worked with partners to produce a hard hitting film based on a young adult with autism and a learning disability, and the issues he faces within society. A teaching pack to accompany the film is available at www.iammescotland.co.uk and the film is available to view for free [here](#)—or by visiting our [YouTube](#).

I Am Me have also worked with a number of partners to develop a Primary School Resource which is available to download for free at www.iammescotland.co.uk. The resource aims to: introduce disability; increase understanding of the range of disabilities; highlight the effects of bullying and exclusion; highlight the consequences of hate crime.
