

Rightsizing Updates (2) A NOTE FROM YOUR SAN ANTONIO ISD DISTRICT 7 TRUSTEE: ED GARZA



Dear JNA Neighbors,

Over the past four decades the San Antonio Independent School District (SAISD) has realized a steady decline in enrollment; from its nearly 80,000 students during its peak, to 43,000 during the current 2023-2024 school year. Since 1998, the district has lost 15,000 students and just this year, the district has almost 1,000 students under projected enrollment. Even though enrollment has almost been cut in half, the district has retained and operated the same number (nearly 100) campuses during the decline. While the superintendent, board, campuses, and community don't want to close any schools, to ignore the 40+ year trend would not only be financially irresponsible, but also widen the disparity of funding between students attending various size schools.

The factors that have led to the decline in enrollment have varied through the decades. However, in recent years the decline in birthrates and lack of affordable family housing have added to the enrollment challenges. While bond improvements, new choice programs and district created charter schools have attracted almost 5,000 new students from outside the district, the innovative choice programs have not been enough to offset the decline.

On June 20, 2023, the San Antonio ISD Board of Trustees brought forward and approved a <u>resolution</u> calling for a study of school building capacity for the purpose of supporting thriving schools, classrooms, students, teachers, and school leaders. The result of the study led to recommended restructuring, or "rightsizing," school sites to better serve students. Rightsizing will involve closing school buildings, co-locating schools to the same campus, or consolidating multiple schools into one school. Recommendations from the study, will go into effect for the 2024-2025 School Year.

During the Sept. 18, 2023, board meeting there was a discussion about the preliminary recommendation package for rightsizing 19 schools in the district. The initial package outlined plans for various changes in schools, including closures, redesigns, relocations, co-locations and mergers in the upcoming years. In the Jefferson area, two elementary schools (Huppertz and Baskin) and one early childhood center (Nelson) were listed for rightsizing.

After careful consideration of comments from the public at over 4 dozen community and campus meetings, district staff reduced the total number of schools to be closed and repurposed at the start of the 2024–2025 school year to 11, with several other campuses to be modified. In the Jefferson area, Huppertz Elementary and Nelson Early Childhood Center remain part of the close/repurpose list for next school year. However, Baskin Elementary was recommended for closure in a future year, only if the receiving school, Maverick, can add additional permanent building space.

Upon returning from the winter break in January, the process of rightsizing will continue. SAISD is committed to repurposing facilities affected by rightsizing so that the buildings continue to benefit the community. None of these facilities will be sold, but rather leased to nonprofit organizations who will maintain the buildings and provided needed services to the neighborhoods.

First, the district is creating a citizen panel to guide the repurposing process so that a transparent, comprehensive, and consistent approach is implemented. A *Facility Repurposing Panel* was organized in December 2023, and the panel will begin convening in January 2024.

. This panel will:

- Collaborate with the District to issue a Request for Proposal for external entities interested in repurposing the facilities.
- Organize community engagement meetings in Spring 2024 to discuss proposals for specific campuses.
- Engage with the communities to evaluate proposals that offer continued value and services.

The Facility Repurposing Panel will operate under the Always Learning Children's Cabinet and include members from the Superintendent's Growth and Development Committee. Its aim is to respect the schools' history, the legacy of their namesakes, and the memories of the students and families connected to these institutions.




Feed the Fam

Neighborhood Concern

ADDRESSING ACS & COMMUNITY SAFETY

In a recent article published by Melissa Fletcher Stoeltje in the San Antonio Report, the escalating concerns surrounding loose and aggressive dogs within our local community were thoughtfully examined. Stoeltje's piece highlighted the challenges faced by dog owners, particularly in areas where high-poverty conditions coincide with increased incidents involving roaming dogs.

The article revealed a significant 70% rise in severe dog bite incidents from 2018 to 2022, emphasizing key insights from Shannon Sims, head of Animal Care Services (ACS):

- An estimated 30,000 loose dogs predominantly belong to owners rather than being strays.
- Approximately 75% of these dogs remain unaltered due to limited spaying and neutering access.
- Financial constraints and misconceptions about pet ownership hinder owners from utilizing available sterilization programs.
- Uncontrolled mating behaviors among roaming dogs often lead to aggression, exacerbated by misguided beliefs about dog ownership.

In response, District 7's Councilwoman, Marina Alderete Gavito, initiated crucial measures to tackle these concerns head-on. Building on ACS's efforts, she expanded qualifying zip codes for the free spay & neuter program to include 78201, 78228, 78229, and 78238.

Additionally, the Councilwoman launched an online dangerous dog map for our district, enabling residents to stay informed about dangerous dogs in their neighborhoods. Plans are underway to enhance this resource further. Access the <u>map here</u>.

Efforts to advocate for a State law change empowering ACS to spay/neuter dogs upon retrieval are ongoing, emphasizing long-term collaboration with State-wide officials. The Councilwoman also emphasized the urgency of addressing loose and dangerous dogs as a vital public safety concern, ensuring monthly engagements with ACS for effective service delivery in District 7.

Stoeltje's article resonated deeply, emphasizing responsible pet ownership and community involvement. The Councilwoman echoes this sentiment, calling for collective action to create a safer environment. Residents are encouraged to contribute suggestions and ideas for collective efforts.

ELIA REYNA: A LIFE WOVEN INTO JEFFERSON'S TAPESTRY

In the heart of our beloved Jefferson neighborhood, a tale of resilience, education, and unwavering community spirit unfolds through the life of a treasured resident, Elia Reyna. Born on June 25, 1942, her life story is intricately woven into the very fabric of our community, painting a vivid portrait of Jefferson's evolution through the ages.

Elia's early childhood years on Zarzamora and West Martin Street spanned an era when our Jefferson neighborhood was both untamed brush and pastures. Her parents, Evelia M. Reyna and Gilbert F. Reyna, envisioning a haven for their future family, gravitated towards Jefferson despite its distance from the West side. Her father's tenure as a custodian at Jefferson HS since 1932 laid the foundations for their connection to our community, while her mother's altruism shone through her volunteer work at the House of Neighborly Services and Red Cross.

"Moving to what was then the North Side was quite the adventure," chuckles Elia, reminiscing about the family's leap from a modest three-room dwelling to what she felt like was a "North side mansion" across from Woodlawn Academy. Purchased for \$6,500 with a \$50 down payment, this house became the cornerstone of the Reyna family's life in Jefferson, evolving from humble beginnings into a beacon of their legacy.

Elia's mother, Evelia, a force of initiative, approached Woodlawn Academy's principal with aspirations of starting the Girl Scout program, while her father, echoing her passion for community engagement, sought to establish Little League baseball at Horace Mann Middle School which is now Young Women's Leadership Academy. Elia recalls, "oh, those were the days! My friends practically sprinted to our house for those Girl Scout meetings, fearing they'd miss out on homemade flour tortillas with butter from my mother." She also delightfully shares how they didn't have any furniture at first so it was an added delight to the girls to be able to sit criss-cross applesauce on the floor.

Elia's mother, a trailblazer in her own right, became San Antonio's first crossing guard, stationed dutifully in the heart of the community at Woodlawn Academy, ensuring the safety of children as they traversed the streets. This act of service not only safeguarded the neighborhood's youth but also epitomized the Reyna family's unwavering commitment to nurturing a secure and closely-knit environment. Their new home soon became a center for fostering unity and camaraderie among neighbors, laying the foundation for a legacy that continues to thrive in our cherished neighborhood to this day.

Transitioning into secondary school, Elia's formative years at Jefferson High School nurtured aspirations for higher education, driven by her mother's unwavering support and the school's emphasis on college preparedness. "If I could turn back time," muses Elia, reminiscing about the golden era at Jefferson, where her sister commanded the Cadet Corps and her brothers serenaded with clarinets and violins.









In 1990, Elia and her mother Evelia embarked on a new chapter, joining the JNA to bolster the scholarship program. Her mother's leadership from 1990 to 2003 was a testament to her dedication. The scholarship program, now named in her mother's honor, as the 'Evelia Molina Reyna Scholarship', continues to be a cornerstone of the JNA. Students are eligible if they attend Jefferson High School (or live within our JNA boundaries), have an acceptance to any college or university, and maintain a GPA of 3.0 or higher.

Reflecting on the neighborhood's transformation, Elia fondly remembers about Jefferson's enduring customs – the vibrant picnics at Woodlawn Lake, piñata parties, and swimming at Woodlawn Pool, cherished activities in an era where vacations were often unattainable. The community once walked everywhere or took buses to downtown Fiesta celebrations or indulged in Broadway's Kiddieland and Playland. Amidst the nostalgic reflections, Elia fondly recalls the exuberance of childhood memories at the Woodlawn Pool. "Learning to swim at the Woodlawn Swimming Pool was something," she reminisces. "We were like little fish, splashing around and having the time of our lives."

Elia's steadfastness in preserving Jefferson's heritage mirrors her mother's commitment to our community. Their family home, a testament to time, stands as a beacon of tradition and unity. As Elia looks out at her yard, filled with memories of raising her family in the same house she grew up in, and her son's nearby home next door,she stands as a guardian of laughter, tradition, and the vibrant spirit that defines our Jefferson neighborhood.

Whether one resides in our neighborhood for a month or over seven decades, the imprint left is invaluable. Each individual, woven into Jefferson's story, contributes to its colorful tapestry. As we reflect on Elia's impactful journey, it prompts us to consider our own legacy within this vibrant community. What mark shall we leave behind? How do we aspire to be remembered?


