

A NOTE FROM YOUR SAN ANTONIO DISTRICT 7 CITY COUNCILWOMAN:

Dear JNA Neighbors,



It is exciting to reach out and directly address one of the oldest associations in District 7. The JNA's history of neighborhood advocacy and sense of community make it such a special part of our district. You all have such a wonderful neighborhood to be proud of.

Since I was sworn in on June 21st, my team and I have been able to meet with the JNA at every one of your monthly meetings. At each meeting I strive to address each one of your concerns, listen to your ideas, and make sure your issues are resolved. If you haven't connected with my team yet, we would love to make time to meet with you. Here are some of the ways to stay in the know with my office and find out about city updates, upcoming events, District 7 news, and more:

My team and I have been working hard to deliver on promises I made during the campaign. Your top concern was public safety, and I heard your message loud and clear. From animal control and homelessness to crime and infrastructure, I placed a priority on these issues in the recent budget session. I advocated and worked hard to approve:

- 117 new police officers
- 24/7 staffing for the SA CORE Team who handle mental health crisis calls
- 32 new firefighters
- A 26% budget increase to ACS to add more 'boots on the ground' officers to pick up loose dogs
- A low-cost spay and neuter clinic for District 7 in order to focus on the root-cause of the stray dog population
- Addressing homelessness by ensuring the unhoused population are directed toward city resources and that encampments are removed within 2 weeks of being reported

Additionally, here are several infrastructure projects in your area:

- Several new stop signs along Lake Boulevard where many accidents have occurred
- Further traffic calming solutions for rest of Lake Boulevard going toward Woodlawn Lake
- · Improving the condition of St. Cloud Road
- Traffic calming solutions for Wilson Boulevard

Thank you so much for your trust. My team and I work tirelessly for you and we want to help empower the JNA to continue to be the great association it is. As always, feel free to reach out to us.

Community Focus: Key Takeaways from the JNA Meeting

The October 9, 2022, JNA meeting featured insightful guest speakers, including SAAFE Officer John Garcia and Jose Escobedo, who addressed vital community concerns like driving safety, education reform, and voting.

The meeting also highlighted the pressing issue of teacher shortages in SAISD and explored creative solutions to tackle the problem. In discussions about proposed school closures with the Rightsizing Recommendations, there was a strong focus on preserving high schools, while the importance of equity in education funding and the specific criteria for school closures were emphasized by Brad Jones and SAISD Board Member Ed Garza.

Additionally, the meeting unveiled secondary criteria for closing schools and announced a schedule of forthcoming community meetings. Important membership details and future meeting information were shared to engage and inform attendees.

VOTE Election Day


Don't forget to exercise your democratic right and cast your vote during this important election season in Bexar County.



VISION ZERO IN JEFFERSON NEIGHBORHOOD: MAKING OUR STREETS SAFER

In the heart of San Antonio, Texas, our very own Jefferson Neighborhood is taking a stand to transform our streets into safer, more livable spaces for all residents. This mission is driven by Vision Zero, a global traffic safety initiative that holds a powerful goal: the complete eradication of traffic-related fatalities and severe injuries. In a state known for its expansive highways, our commitment to this vision underscores our dedication to the well-being of our Jefferson Neighborhood residents.

Backing our mission are compelling statistics that underscore the urgency of the situation. Between 2011 and 2020, nationwide fatalities in traffic crashes involving bicyclists and other cyclists surged by 38%, reaching a staggering 938 fatalities in 2020. Jefferson Neighborhood recognizes that these injuries and fatalities are preventable, and we've wholeheartedly embraced Vision Zero as the solution.

Our approach is multifaceted and data-driven. It includes creating safer streets for all road users, with enhancements like bike lanes and crosswalks. Data analysis plays a pivotal role, enabling us to prioritize safety measures in high-risk areas, including the trends in traffic incidents on our side streets.

As a community, we are committed to driving at safe speeds on our neighborhood side streets. Keeping within the designated speed limits ensures the well-being of all residents. While we've made progress in improving road safety, challenges persist, including issues like speeding and distracted driving. Nevertheless, Jefferson Neighborhood remains steadfast in our commitment to the ultimate Vision Zero goal: zero traffic fatalities on our streets.

As Jefferson Neighborhood forges ahead, we extend an invitation to all residents to join the mission for safer streets, and let's embrace the vision of a future with zero traffic fatalities in our very own community. Together, we can make a difference in the safety and well-being of our neighborhood.

Exploring the Boundaries of JNA: Where Our Community Thrives

Nestled in the near northwest side of San Antonio, the Jefferson Neighborhood Association (JNA) stands as a prominent and respected community organization. With a rich tapestry of culture, diversity, families, and businesses, the JNA takes great pride in preserving the essence of this vibrant neighborhood.

Most of our neighborhood's development took place between the 1920s and 1960s, resulting in an architecturally diverse landscape. Home to over 3,000 residents, JNA has a distinctive character shaped by its history.

In response to the city's 1997 Master Plan and the 1998 Community Revitalization Action Group Report, the Jefferson Neighborhood Conservation District (NCD) was established. This district serves as a proactive tool to address neighborhood sustainability while preserving the area's character-defining features.







JNA is marked by four prominent assets that contribute to the fabric of San Antonio, including Woodlawn Lake Park, Thomas Jefferson High School, the Monticello Park Historic District, and Jefferson Village. Each of these elements enriches our community and reflects our commitment to preserving our neighborhood's history and character.







Did you know? The Jefferson Conservation District


The Jefferson Neighborhood Association (JNA) covers an area with diverse boundaries, including parts in City Council Districts 1 and 7. The area is marked by overlays like the Monticello Park Historic District and intersects with the Woodlawn Lake Community Association's boundaries. A key feature is the Jefferson Neighborhood Conservation District (NCD), safeguarding homes built between the 1920s and 1970s. This NCD, spanning from Babcock to St. Cloud Road, serves as a protective zone preserving the area's architectural heritage.

Designated to maintain the neighborhood's architectural character, the NCD serves as a proactive tool for sustainable development in specific zones of the city. San Antonio hosts eight NCDs, primarily focused on the original inner core.

The Jefferson NCD comprises approximately 475 acres, with over 97.95% of structures exceeding the 25-year benchmark. The predominant residential architecture consists of one-story suburban houses from pre and post-World War II, incorporating varied design elements like Tudor and Mediterranean styles, despite most being considered typical tract homes of that era.

Emphasizing design standards over architectural style, the NCD aims to preserve historical building layouts, encourage neighborly interaction, and enhance the area's visual appeal. Its implementation evolved over years, aligning with the city's Neighborhood Conservation District Program's objectives.







While this article focuses on residential design standards, the complete document includes both residential and non-residential design matrices, alongside helpful appendices. Residents within the NCD must obtain building permits from the Development Services Department for any home alterations, ensuring compliance with designated standards, under the risk of municipal court prosecution for violations.

For inquiries regarding the Jefferson NCD, residents are encouraged to engage with JNA board members. The NCD stands as a vital component, enhancing the neighborhood's distinctive charm, attracting both current and prospective homeowners.
