1. How did you start with horses?

I went to a school holiday riding camp at Forest Park and rode the faithful old Poncho. After years of lessons I was lucky enough to find Dawn Delaney. Dawn leased me Candy, who lit my passion for jumping and the rest is history!

2. Do you have a horsey role model?

I try to watch and learn from as many riders as I can! I've been watching a lot of Beezie Madden lately.

3. What was your most proud horsey moment so far?

I've had many! Backing my homebred youngster was very rewarding. My thoroughbred jumping his heart out at the 6-bar at Stonewall was amazing, as was competing in my first Ammies.

4. What was your most challenging horsey moment so far?

Getting back on to jump in the final at DJWTS after a stack on the second day; we'd qualified for the final on the first day. Our sport is a real mental challenge and I'm grateful to my coach, Stephen Dingwall, for helping me through those challenges. After a headspace reset, we ended up going double clear and finished top 10! Just because you make a mistake, doesn't mean that you aren't good enough.









5. What was your scariest horsey moment so far?

The first time I had to deal with colic and fence injury, when I was new enough that I didn't have a support network built yet. It's always scary when you don't have the experience to know what to look for or expect.

6. Aspirations for next year?

I've been out with injury for the last half of 2022, so I'm really excited to just get back in the saddle and enjoy jumping again, to get back to where we were and then step up later in the year. I'm also keen to get my youngster out to his first comp.

7. What's your 2 cents piece of advice for the horsey folk?

I've taken home many tips and tricks to remember for next time I'm in the ring, like using the time between when the bell goes and approaching the first jump and choosing control over speed!"











In The Know - Jumping Etiquette & Draw Order

With many riders in classes, it's important to follow the draw. This enables our hard-working volunteers to plan as efficiently as possible to ensure that everyone gets to ride before the day ends. We understand that unexpected things happen but when everyone is proactive in running to draw order, it makes a smoother day for everyone.

Tip #1: Check the draw at least the evening before the competition! This helps you to plan when you need to leave to arrive in time to walk your course, saddle up and warm up. If you're early in the draw, saddle early and bribe a friend to hold while you walk your course and then warm up.

Tip #2: Riding in both rings? Ring 1 takes priority over Ring 2. If you think you might have a clash of draw times, communicate with the Ring 2 Marshal early to let them know you may run late. Unfortunately, an entire class cannot be held if a rider is running late!

Tip #3: Present to the Ring Marshal well in advance of your number being called. This lets them know you're there and helps them to manage the order of riders.

Tip #4: Decided not to ride? Let the Ring Marshal know so they know not to expect you and can adjust the flow of the draw.

Tip #5: Listen to the Ring Marshal's calls. The Marshal lets everyone know how many horses are waiting and will call you to be 'on the gate' in advance of your turn. When you're 'on the gate', be ready to go!

Tip #6: Your turn! When you enter the ring, present to the Judge as quickly as possible to state your name, horses name and draw number. Safety tip - the Ring Marshal may suggest how to get there without interfering with the current horse in the ring.

Tip #7: Ring a ding ding! When the bell goes, it is time to commence your round.

Remember you've got 45 seconds before you must have passed the start line, so take your time and use it wisely! Most importantly, have fun!!

Lastly, remember to schedule some time into the day to help volunteer. As a volunteer club, we need your help to make these days possible
