

Brothers and Sisters:  
Blessings from your St Mary’s Evangelization & Outreach Ministry team

Our past few weeks have been filled with preparing our Stewardship forms and we are moving forward to continue serving, or joining, ministries or committees and becoming productive in our roles. As I worked through this process and lost my wife, in a manner of speaking, to updating the roster for our many ministries at St Mary, I spent time praying to Jesus to guide us through this process with love, joy and humility. My thoughts gathered around my joy of being blessed to know our Catholic Faith and, that the Holy Spirit guides me. Those who know me well, know that I deem myself a man who acts. I see a problem and act to solve it! Sometimes Margaret tells me that’s annoying, but that’s the way I was raised. I am trying to slow down and hear God’s voice and then act. After 50+ years in the ‘C’ suite of corporate America and financial consulting, it takes a bit of prayer to follow God’s lead and not get out in front of Him. Are any of you in this situation and understand the impact of trying to change? I’m guessing there are a few of you who are reading this! So, I have decided to share some of the readings and prayers which help me to listen, ask for His guidance, and then act.

*“How is it that you have called me, allowed me, welcomed me, sustained me, into faith alone? How is it that I turned from unbelief to belief, not from my own construct, but from your grace and love alone? How can I trust more that faith alone is sufficient for your love and your grace? May I find peace and sustenance that these questions are sufficient, and that the equally sufficient answer is you alone, in you, through you, with you.....and you alone.”* **Father Glen Chun, SJ.**

When I face really serious or seemingly impossible problems, I like to pray to St. Jude the Apostle, who is the patron of impossible or desperate cases, so named because of revelations from God. **St. Bernard of Sweden** had a vision where our Lord asked him *“to accept St. Jude as the ‘Patron Saint of the Impossible’”*. We know that God is the One who answers our prayers, but we can also turn to those whom *“Christ has given a share in His own Kingship” (Revelation 20:4-6)*. Our holy brothers and sisters in heaven can pray to the Lord (intercede) for us, because Saints have already “run the race” **(1 Corinthians 9:24)**, and they share in the Beatific Vision, no longer able to sin. I try to remember that *“With God nothing is impossible” (Luke 1:37)*.

May I offer you another alternative by which to seek God’s design for us here on earth? A prayer to His Mother to seek Jesus’ help and guide us forward. *“I beg you to present my petition to your Divine Son. If you will pray for me, I cannot be refused. I know, Dearest Mother, that you want me to seek God’s Holy Will concerning my request. If what I ask for should not be granted, I pray that I may receive that which will be of greater benefit to my soul.”*

Dear Padre,

Is Advent a penitential season?

Strictly speaking, the penitential times in the Church are “every Friday of the whole year and the season of Lent” (*Code of Canon Law*, 1250). Advent is a time to prepare for Christmas when Christ’s First Coming is remembered, and this remembrance directs the mind and heart to await Christ’s Second Coming at the end of time. (See *Universal Norms on the Liturgical Year and the General Roman Calendar*, 39.) While Advent is more anticipatory than penitential, the US Conference of Catholic Bishops states, “Advent also includes an element of penance in the sense of preparing, quieting, and disciplining our hearts for the full joy of Christmas.” Although, historically, Advent was similar to Lent as a forty-day period of prayer and fasting, it was less severe than the season preceding Easter, and it lacked uniformity in the Western Church. The Eastern Church still begins the Nativity Fast on November 15, while in the Western Church, Advent begins four Sundays before Christmas. Regardless, the significant focus of Advent is our Lord’s coming (*adventus* in Latin). The Church reflects this anticipation of Advent through such practices as limiting floral arrangements in the sanctuary, simpler liturgical music, and omitting the Gloria at Mass until Christmas. We can also reflect the anticipation of Advent through such spiritual practices as participation in works of charity, moderation in shopping, celebration of the sacrament of penance, fasting on Fridays, and prayerful contemplation on our Savior’s Incarnation. ●
