As we celebrate the 50th anniversary of Collier County Parks and Recreation, we look back at its beginnings, the impact it has had on the community and what is in store for the future.

On February 22, 1972, the Board of Collier County Commissioners voted to create Collier County Parks and Recreation. The division started with a small staff of four, but with Director Dan Breeden at the helm, it would grow exponentially over the years.



With very little funding, the new division used community resources, including volunteers and innovative partnerships to meet the needs of Collier County residents and visitors. The first partnership was with the Collier County School System. Parks and Recreation added ball fields and tennis courts adjacent to school properties across the county. With a dedicated group of employees including Rollie Rice, Ed Torroni, Jim Thomas and Murdo Smith, the division began offering summer camps, league sports and more programming across the county.

In 1981, the Board of County Commissioners passed measures to provide more funding to Parks and Recreation. Shortly after that, the park system rooted itself by creating Golden Gate Community Park, East Naples Community Park, Marco Island Community Park (now Mackle Community Park), North Naples Community Park (now Veterans Community Park) and Immokalee Community Park. Then in 1985, the Board implemented impact fees, providing another source of funding for the growing division.

Over the years, the division added beach parks, community centers, fitness centers, and aquatic centers to enhance the quality of life for the residents and visitors of Collier County. This goal persists today. With programs including Adaptive Inclusive Recreation, Blue Zones Project, a robust volunteer program, sea turtle protection, and much more, the division has become a world-class system of parks, natural resources and recreational opportunities that will serve generations to come.

In addition to providing ball fields and summer camps, Parks and Recreation brings value to the community with a focus on health and wellness, environmental protection, and a positive economic impact to the county.

Parks and Recreation programs and services contribute to the health of children, adults and seniors. Taking part in regular leisure activities enhances well-being, reduces stress and lifts moods.

Collier County is best known for its beaches and tropical climate, with plenty of sunshine, water, wildlife, and a unique environmental ecosystem consisting of preserves, sanctuaries, swamps and estuaries. Parks and protected public lands are proven to improve water quality, protect groundwater, prevent flooding, improve the air quality we breathe and provide a vegetative buffer to development. In addition, through effective land management methods and green infrastructure investments, Parks and Recreation makes communities more resilient to natural disasters, reducing costs associated with disaster recovery and insurance premiums.

Collier County Parks and Recreation programs generate revenue directly from fees but, more importantly, provide significant indirect revenues to local and regional economies from sports tournaments and special events such as festivals involving art, music and holiday celebrations.

Economic activity from hospitality expenditures, tourism, fuel, recreational equipment sales, and many other private sector businesses is of true and sustained value to a local economy. Economic research has consistently demonstrated that homes and properties located near parklands have higher values than those farther away. Higher home values benefit the owners of these properties and add to the tax base of local governments.

With new projects on the horizon, a clear vision for a prosperous future, and 50 years of experience, Collier County Parks and Recreation will continue to grow and improve the quality of life for our residents and visitors in the years ahead.
