## CDCWRT MEETING

*Our next regular meeting of the Round Table is the first meeting of the New Year, or the New Millennium, depending on your perspective. This will be our traditional POTPOURRI MEETING, where several members will present short but fascinating topics. Please note the site of this meeting will be at the GUILDERLAND PUBLIC LIBRARY.*

*RT member Bob "Tennessee" Rawls will demonstrate a working model of the second generation Burden horseshoe-making machine. Bob is a machinist, and last year built a working model of Burden's first machine, which he demonstrated at the Burden Ironworks Museum. More than 90% of the horseshoes made during the Civil War were made at the Ironworks in Troy, N.Y. The rapid mass production of horseshoes was one of the many facets of the industrial advantage of the Union over the Confederacy.*

*Carl Blazjewski, a stamp and ephemera collector, will talk about "what to do" with those old Civil War letters your great aunt left you in her will. Carl is the owner of B Trading Company, and does appraisals for collections and estates. If you have something interesting, why not bring it along for Carl to comment upon.*

*RT member Matt Farina will talk about the cachets you own RT produces and sells.*

*These are destined to become the CW collector items in the future. A recent catalog of American ephemera and letters listed a 1965 First Day of Issue cachet canceled at Appomattox for \$30. Our cachets are rarer, and one 1995 First Day of Issue was recently seen on E-Bay for \$25. Not a bad return for a 5-year cachet.*

He commented on the growth of the RT in its goal of stimulating interest in all aspects of the Civil War period. He encouraged the membership to express their passion for history, and challenged the membership to become more active participants in the RT. The Board surprised Matt with a signed sculpture of "Stonewall" Jackson by Ron Tunison. Matt was briefly speechless, but recovered and expressed his deep thanks.

Ron Tunison spoke at the December meeting about his passion for military art and sculpture.

He was honored as the Round Table's "Artist of the Year 2000." A spectacular exhibited in the library complimented his presentation. There are still 1 or 2 signed sculptures of a limited edition, available to RT members.
