October 2024

President David Freeman brought the October meeting to order. We had 23 attending. Freeman and event chairman ,Craig Fennessy gave reports about the recent "Day of Magic and Flea Market". It was successful and all who attended had fun. As we do at each month's meeting, list of who is appearing around town and what shows are continuing, was given.

Club historian, Phil Schwartz, presented his 106th Magic History Moment on Magic Exposures. Magicians and others have exposed the secrets of magic to the public for many years in various ways. Phil recounted how the major magic organizations via their Expose Committees (SAM, IBM, and National Conjurers Association) and Committees of Member Conduct (Magic Castle and Magic Circle) attempted and often succeeded in reducing incidents of inconsiderate, irresponsible, and unnecessary exposures. Across history, many well-known names were criticized and sometimes expelled for the exposing of secrets. Phil cited one recent example of a magician's YouTube video where nine tricks were exposed which resulted in his separation from the Magic Castle (AMA) and IBM. Phil and President David Freeman led a discussion of Ring members regarding the issues of magic exposures to the public.

The monthly show started out with a Halloween Hand Chopper bit. Dennis Phillips showed the MAK hand chopper but added an extra surprise. The volunteer (Davd Freeman) seeming had his hand chopping off and it fell into the bag in from of the blade hole. Gerry Frey rushed in with a town and removed the wiggling and unattached hand (the old Kenin James gag) and took him off stage and sewed the hand back on David's arm.

Dan Stapleton, just back from a lecture tour in Ireland, showed some of his classic ball and handkerchief manipulation. He then did the "Piano Card Trick", a seldom seen classic of magic. In the spectator's hands, a card travels from one pile to another.

Greg Solomon wrapped up the show with some fun effects and puzzles. He had a "flow ring" that migrated down a rope, the puzzle that asked the 3rd name of Ken's Mom, a Harry Anderson dollar bill puzzle and a foldable poster that evolved into a funny outcome.



Face masks, if you wear one, will not be ridiculed. We are understanding that some people may be immunocompromised. We also respect your personal choices.






What's The Difference between a magician and a savings bond?

I saw Ike there while doing USO shows for injured soldiers from Viet Nam over a two-year period. Back then they kept him under an oxygen tent with clear plastic window. He had a secret service guard and a military aid or two, and it was protocol, if he was awake, to have all the entertainers wave hello and tell him your name and he or an aid would say, "Thank you for being here for us" and sometimes comment. I did that on most visits. His door was seldom closed. He had a private room that was at the end of the wing and was connected to an open ward with rows of hospitalized soldiers from mostly Viet Nam. Oddly, I did not appreciate what I experienced and only much later did I realize the historic value.

Eisenhower suffered a second heart attack in 1965, and his health deteriorated in 1968. He spent nine months in Walter Reed Army Hospital until his death on March 28, 1969.


My mother <u>on the left in the photo</u> is with her two sisters and they were part of a female singing trio before and during the World War Two years.
