The April meeting was attended by 26 and one guest, Mark Austin, an American living in France. Popular Cruise ship magician, Nathan Coe Marsh, was with us. President David Freeman called the meeting to order. Our own Wallace Murphy,

showed us the cover of the February MUM, and he was a part of its tribute to Black magicians. Several members did a recap of the excellent Henry Evans lecture last week.

Phil Schwartz presented "Magic History Moment #102." His topic was "Magic Wands and other Sticks." Emerging from the caves of Mesopotamia and Egypt, Phil traced the history of staffs, scepters and wands from ancient cultures through the Renaissance to modern times. Phil explained the seven basic plots of defying nature that a magician does often using a magic stick. Then he showed seven wands crafted by his friend, Carl Williams, who he met at the first Los Angeles Conference on Magic History in 1989. Over a thirty-year period, Williams made wands with sculpted tips of Merlin (two versions), Dai Vernon, the Blackstones, Lance Burton, Jean-Eugene Robert-Houdin and Harry Houdini.

Martin Preston opened the monthly show with a series of card effects associated with David Hoy's "Tossed Out Deck". He explained the effect has its roots in UF Grant and Spencer Thornton. Hoy did not originate the effect but did revise it to make it more powerful. Bob Swadling changed a blue deck to a red deck. He was able to cut to any named card in the deck. His card work is amazing. Dennis Phillips showed the Abbott's feather flower Blooming Bouquet he has had since 1980. He plucked off white flowers and red ones bloomed.

Mark Austin, an American visiting from his job in France, showed us some hilarious novelties with gag lines. They were all based on puns of what you could do with bananas. Dan Stapleton showed an effect he created many years ago called "Stars of the Mind". Six cards are shown with a different color star on each. Dan marked an "X" on one secretly. The spectator is asked to remember one of the colored stars as they are being shown. When Dan turns around the card, it is the only one with a "X".

Wallace Murphy showed a deck of cards that he said was steam cleaned. The box was faded and the cards blank. The spectator chose one card and got a thumb print on it and he had her sign it. The card kept showing up on top when placed in the blank deck.

Henry Evans/David Momina Lecture

Our Ring/ Assembly hosted the lecture on April 10th.

The measure of how much everyone liked the lecture was that no one left and stayed glued to their seats for 2 hours and 15 minutes.

Henry Evans shared the lecture time with another talented magician, Daniel Mormina. Both are from Argentina.

Some highlights included Henry's advice to know what your character is and who you are and be likeable. His effects were very clever, and all done by building up the mystery in series and having an unbelievable climax.

He began with a blue deck that he tossed on the table, and it instantly changed to red. He followed with some color changing card boxes and a clever effect if putting 3 cards in an inverted paper bag an aways being about to be holding the one named by a spectator.

He used The Gilbreath Principle for a miraculous card trick that predicted which 5 cards a spectator selected after shuffling the stack many times. The late Max Maven called the Gilbreath Principle, "a thing of terrifying beauty".

Evans had a spectator take a cell phone picture of a card box and explant the photo and move his finger around the screen and have the spectator say stop. He then produced a card box printed just like the screen.

Daniel Mormina took over with some clever uses of the seldom used but classic Sanada gimmick. He then showed some clever uses for invisible thread. Red Balls moved from stem glass to stem glass, and a card stood on its edge.

Henry Evans resumed after an intermission and put a quarter though the small hole of a Chinese coin, and had red cards predict selected blue cards.

He had a drawing pad with an easel drawn on it and a selected card was found drawn in the easel.

He showed how to force a card from a line of 10 cards.

He concluded with a master class in character acting and the impromptu use of a shuffled deck. He would scan a spread deck and note where a few cards were and then build a routine based on what he knew, using culls and counting.

Finally, he was blindfolded and held a shuffled deck and was able to recite what each card was.

The lecture was enjoyable and very valuable to the working magician.

I want to give big "Thank you" to Dr. Ken Schreibman, MD, PhD, for the action photos taken at the Magic History Conference.


I used his photos and put this poster together using Microsoft Publisher, the standard software in the 360 Office suite. It took about an hour.

Drew Thomas, based in Orlando, has a clever "Egg Bag" routine using a shot glass with liquid and a great finale.

It is 6 minutes into his cruise ship routine.

At an Abbott's "Get Together" Show in Colon, Michigan, on a Summer night, a Chicago illusion builder presented an illusion where an upright girl is divided into 3 parts, by 2 blades and her middle is "Zig Zagged" to one side. The illusion was sensational and practical. It could be done surrounded and the assistant needed little more than a short instruction on how to move her body. It became, for the next 20 years, the "go to" illusion for many stage illusionists and inspired multiple variations.

Sadly, Jim Sommers, was not truthful and had copied the idea from its English creator, illusionist, Robert Harbin. Sommer's career and reputation was tainted, and he never was able to achieve the level of success that his on creativity and building skills deserved.


In August of 1968, after Jim Sommers finally admitted that he had made the Zig Zag Girl illusion without Harbin's permission, Harbin decided to write "The Robert Harbin Book of Magic" in order to provide the plans for the Zig Zag giving owners of the book the right to build and perform the Zig Zag Girl. To purchase the book, one had to send for a prospectus and sign a legal document agreeing to keep the secrets. The owner was only allowed to build things from the book for their own use.

Only 500 copies were printed and then Harbin had the plates destroyed.

In 1975, Xerox resolved an anti-trust suit with the United States FTC. The Xerox was forced licensing of the company's patients, mainly to Japanese competitors.

Within four years of the consent decree, Xerox's share of the U.S. copier market dropped from nearly 100% to less than 14%.

Cheap copy machines where everywhere and Harbin's book was massively and illegally copied. Today, most magic flea markets will have copies.

"Card Castle"

I love the elegance of card fans and single card manipulation. From Cardini, to Channing Pollack and many others like Craig Diamond and Jeff McBride.




The problem is that the act needs a strong visual finale. Yes, the "stream of cards from the mouth" is good but I wanted some more "wow".

That is where my Card Castle comes in. It is a six-card-high display.

The photos will tell the story.





The castle zig zags up and then can fold down. The cards are held together by filament tape and invisible tape. Each layer is supported upright by internal cards that are hinged at the top and fold down to lock the castle in place.

A metal washer is taped to the bottom of the folding cards that will lock them in place.

I toss the cards that I produce from the back palm card productions on the cloth-covered collapsed castle and throw Rice's 36-inch card silk over it and pull up the black tape as I lift up the zig zagged castle into standing position.

The black cover is carried away under the silk as the startling display is revealed.

The effect always gets an audience gasp and applause.
