January 2023

Our new President, David Freeman, brought the meeting to order and welcomed guest David-David from Kansas City and returning longtime member Gary Adams to the meeting.

President Freeman gave a "State of the Union" pep talk and explained his agenda for the coming year. We thank Ryan Stiner for his recent two terms as President. Some of David's plans include forming some committees to manage our social media presence as well as fund-raising ideas since inflation has raised the monthly rental price for our meeting place. He also wants to explore attracting younger magicians to the group and more member participation with book reviews and mini lectures.

Our club magic historian, , Phil Schwartz, after a two-year pause in presentations, resumed his monthly "Magic History Moment" with his #100th lecture on an unusual magician or classic magic effect or magic event. Phil is a magic collector and history author, acclaimed

for his book, "The Ultimate Thayer" about Floyd Thayer and Thayer's props. In the style of Paul Harvey's "The Rest of the Story," he teased with photos and descriptions and finally a rare statue of the English performer, Arthur Carlton Phelps, known as "Carlton, the Human Hairpin" (1880-1942) . He was enormously popular. Carlton was very thin and wore a high skull cap to further exaggerate his height and become a popular London comedy magician. As was culturally acceptable then, he used performers in his act that included a large giant and a midget. Carton did not invent the Die Box but his sucker sliding routine is what almost all magicians use today. Phil showed photos of Carlton and had a rare 24-inch-high statue.

President Freeman then gave us an enthusiastic book review on Piff the Magic Dragon's new book. David noted the quality of the book's production and its humor, but also noted that it is not a standard "how to do tricks" book, but instead focuses on creative thinking in developing magical ideas. Piff is the popular novelty English act who performs dressed as a large green cartoon dragon.


The monthly meeting show began with Bob Swadling, our British master of magic and mechanics. He had two cards that magically changed when flipped in the air and a comedy coin-in-bottle routine. Bob also did a torn and then, in mid-air, instantly restored card. Mike Berlant's quarter ended up in and out of a glass beer bottle. Dan Stapleton had a delightful adaptation of Steward James' card effect "Miraskill". Dan did not use cards but used jewels, a goblet of diamonds and a goblet of rubies. Val Swaddling randomly selected two jewels from the pile and put them in the goblets depending on red or clear and both. Dan's prediction of how many of each in the goblets was perfect.

Adrian Lopez did some card wizardry. Notable was his ACAAN. A spectator chose a card, and it was the spectator's chosen number. Dennis Phillips had a car key that vanished in the palm of his hand and a ballpoint pen that floated up from his palm and then vanished when covered by a paper napkin. He wanted to get the jump on David Copperfield latest mega illusion, so he made a "moon" disappear in a sliding sucker two-side box. He explained that he repurposed an old Pac Man vanish.

Greg Solomon made a hit with some funny signs, Dick Stoner's "Grave Mistake", a shrinking mansion and a wordy sign for a starving magician.

Steve Nelson wrapped up the show with a Triumph Card effect on steroids. With two assisting spectators, who knew the classic effect, he fooled them and made the magic happen.

To you who sent cards, and came to my home, thank you, from me and my family.




Our hearts are broken but comforted by knowing that she lived a full 81 years and loved and was loved by her family




Cindy was an Elementary school teacher (Kindergarten) when I met her in Roanoke, Virginia in 1972.

I was working in Roanoke Television and Radio. We married and moved to Charlotte ,North Carolina.

I used no plans. I made a cardboard mockup to fit Cindy, and, like the Guy Jarrett technique, I kept making it smaller and smaller to exactly fit her.

She could still fit into it into her 60s!

I left working full time in broadcasting in Charlotte, and we opened our costume



business (Allied Costumes, Winter Park) and she had a big role in that business until we sold it in 2009.

She let her hair go to natural light brown and styled it in a late 1980s style in the photo when she was age 47. It was taken

during our illusion show, at the Homer Hester Armory in Tampa in 1989

Here she is assisting my comedy sidekick, the late Rob Labby, with the tear apart dove box




Cindy and I did ballroom dancing. She was artistic and creative in all her work and especially in making costumes and puppets.

used Ralph's Dancing Hank method for his own version of the routine in his Broadway debut (1974) in "The Magic Show" at the Cort Theater.


Ralph Adams (April 18, 1910 - July 8, 1998)

Adams made appearances on the television series Hollywood Palace and the Mike Douglas Shows the late 1960s just before the 2ndGolden Age of Illusions.

Adams worked hundreds of stages throughout the country in such prestigious entertainment palaces as Radio City Musical Hall in New York, The Astrodome in Texas .

He appeared for several seasons at Sea World in Ohio and played Las Vegas.

On his 85th birthday, Adams was honored by Lance Burton and David Copperfield during their show in Las Vegas.
