President David Freeman called the March meeting to order, and we had 26 attending and two guests, Wayne Fitzpatrick from Sarasota, and Travis Bryant from Houston.

Freeman then led an extended discussion about the value and usage of scripting in our shows. The conclusion was that for stage shows with cues, tight scripting was important for pacing and presentation. Smaller parlor shows could use looser scripting for a more spontaneous and free flowing presentation, especially when dealing the volunteers. Close up could even be looser but still must have copy points and structure. In all shows there should be a minimum of idle and meaningless chatter and body movements should be purposeful.

Our monthly show began with Bob Swaddling with delightful memories of his time in magic in England and a demonstration of the little-known Trilby deck. It can do amazing things. He explained the method of operation, which is best described as a Svengali Deck on steroids. It does much more. Bob now owns the metal stamping dies to make them.

Dennis Phillips showed his Card Castle and explained that it was an excellent and needed final startling effect for his card fan and card production routine. He then did Ace Gorham's Bingo Effect where a number is predicted as five spectators call out random numbers on five Bingo Cards.

Greg Solomon, as always, had some interesting novelty items such as a Hot Wheels Drawer Box that he found in the toy section. He showed a method from the late "Magic Ian" where you can use an ordinary coat hanger and make a Needle Through Balloon and no lubrication is needed. He ended with Billy McComb's card effect, "Must be Joking".

Ending the show was Terry Ward with baffling card magic. Four Spectators cut to four aces and Terry cut to four aces.




I also will add a picture of my spook show in 1950 – Aloom The Fiend and another awful picture of me posing with the guillotine."

As promised at the March 20th Ring Meeting, here it what I performed in the Ring meeting show:

(print the six number cards on card stock and have them laminated. Also print and laminate the key code)

Ace Gorham's Bingo Trick

Give the six bingo cards to an assistant. Have the assistant deal out the cards, one the magician, one to himself, and the other cards to four people.

The magician writes a prediction and puts it aside. He then asks the assistant to have each person call out a number from their card, first one calls out a number under the B and then next under the I, next under the N, then under the G and then under the O. Each person gives a number under a different letter including the assistant.

The assistant then is asked to add up the five numbers given. The magician then reveals that the prediction matches the total number given.

The secret is that the magician knows the answer by the card he is given. The answer is determined by a code from the number under the B. There are six different possible answers. Here are the answers for the six cards.

Interesting concept...a bit more themed than David Parr's Curiosity Cabinet type shows.





This "arm cutting" effect was said to be the creation of the late "Magic Ian"., who spent his final years in Central Florida.


